

## A family secret revealed



Kathy Callaghan gave a very interesting talk about her father, Eric Oscar Andersen, who was in the 11<sup>th</sup> NZ Forestry Company during World War II, and the repercussions of his time in the war that follow into today.

Eric was brought up in Pukemako Bush Camp, a two -day horse ride from nearby Mangapehi, so he was around the forestry environment most of his life.

He went to Tiroa Native school, where he was described by his teacher as indolent.

At about 14 years old his mother, Rene and the children moved to Mananui, because she did not want them working in the bush, which was dangerous. Eric's first job was in a box factory cutting the boxes for butter storage, where on his second day he cut his little finger off. The family then moved to Ongarue, where his mother ran a boarding house and Eric worked for Ellis and Bernand, with his father.

In 1940 there was a plea for forestry workers to assist in the war effort. Eric was one of 153 chosen for 11<sup>th</sup> NZ Forestry Company. They sailed for Europe on 2 May 1940 – Eric was on the Andes, one of 7 ships in the flotilla. An advance party and equipment had been sent to France ahead of the NZ Forestry Company convoy, but Hitler invaded France, and all the equipment was lost. This resulted in the NZ 11<sup>th</sup> Forestry Company being redirected to Britain, travelling via Freemantle and Cape Town.

They arrived in Britain on 6 June and were sent to Cirencester, Gloucestershire to work making antitank barriers, and railway sleepers. They also cut down Balsa trees which were used to make the Mosquito bombers.

In February 1943 Eric was sent to London to man the NZ Forces Club and be a fire fighter. He was traumatised by his experiences in London. He met and married Joyce Jones on 7 September 1943 at Tonbridge, Kent. Shortly after his marriage he was recalled to New Zealand and had to leave his pregnant wife in England.

In February 1945 Joyce and Eric's first child, Patsy, arrived in New Zealand. After the war Eric and Joyce lived in Hamilton and raised a family of six. Eric passed away in October 1987, aged 69.

But Eric's story does not finish with his death.

In April 2024 a new DNA match appeared for Kathy. Tracey was listed as a first cousin. When Kathy did her research, she found that Tracey had two family trees, one named "Dad's adopted side". Kathy contacted Tracey asking how they could be related, suggesting her father's family.

Tracey's response led Kathy to believe that Tracey's father could have been related to her, particularly on the Scandinavian side. Tracey's father's birth certificate showed he had been born in 1942 in Cirencester.

Tracey then provided Kathy with access to her DNA results which, showed no matches to his "birth" father; many matches to his birth mother and many matches to Kathy's father!

Photos of Tracey's father beside Kathy's father showed was no doubt about their relationship. Unfortunately, Kathy did not meet her new brother as he had passed away at the age of 61, in 2004. But

Kathy has contact with Tracey, who also appeared on the presentation talking from England. Thanks for the great talk Kathy, it was very interesting and moving.



A microfiche reader is available and there are books on a variety of topics that can be borrowed. Boxes of copies of 'Who do you think you are' and 'Family Tree' are on the shelf.

You are encouraged to save the results of your searches on a USB memory stick or send them to your own email address. We have a printer if you wish to print a hard

copy. Please put 10c per copy in the honesty box on the cupboard door.
