The following is a list of the ships & the number of immigrants sent out to New Zealand during the six months ending 30 August last, by the Attorney General: The 'Michael Angelo', for Otago & Canterbury with 160; the 'Jubilee' for Wellington, 45; 'Cospatrick' for Otago, 32; the 'James Nicol Fleming' for Otago, 246; the 'Halcione' for Wellington, 337; the 'Shieballion' for Wellington, 8; the 'Mary Shephard' for Canterbury, 358; the 'Columbus' for Canterbury, 160; the 'Berar' for Auckland, 810; the 'Allabahad' for Otago, 276, the 'Punjaub' for .Canterbury, 340; the 'Peter Denny' for Otago, 321; the 'Douglas' for Wellington, 389; the 'St Leonard's' for Auckland, 195; the 'Celestial Queen' for Canterbury, 154; the 'Dover Castle' for Otago, 161; the 'Edward P. Bouverie' for Wellington, 168; the 'Otago' for Otago, 147; the 'Adamant' for Canterbury, 151; the 'Hydaspes' for Auckland, 237; the 'Lady Jocelyn' for Otago, 195; the 'Merope' for Canterbury, 173; the 'Helen Denny' for Wellington, 157; the 'Hodvig' for Hawkes Bay, 259; the 'Chile' for Auckland, 85; the 'Cardigan Castle' for Canterbury, 252; the 'Jessie Readman' for Otago, 198, the 'Zealandia' for Otago, 219 - making in all 5,711 souls, or with the previous numbers sent out, a total of 13,123 since July 1871.

NEWS FROM NATIONAL ARCHIVES

In response to an ever increasing volume of requests from out of town and overseas researchers for information, National Archives has established new chargeable research services.

Level 1: Basic Search
You supply accurate details (name, place, date etc.).
National Archives staff will identify or verify and provide
you with information from their series lists, card and other
indexes and registers for up to three items, twice per
calender year for free. Verification of up to three items
per letter including transcripts. Turn-around time 5 working
days from receipt of request.

Level 2: Targeted Search
You supply accurate details or nominate the series to be searched.

Time limit: 30 minutes. Cost: \$22.50 incl. GST Turn around time 10 woring days from receipt of request.

Level 3: General Research Service
You describe what you know about a particular topic and what
it is that you want to find out. Archives staff will consult
and interpret relevant documents held, consider wider
sources, recording the work done and the results. Future
search strategies will be outlined highlighting lesser known
sources.

Time limit: 1 hour as often as required. Cost: \$45 incl GST

Level 4. In-depth Research Services
This is a continuation of a Level 3 service. Steps in the research proposal are carried out. If requested the search can be extended to other institutions.

Time as requested. Cost: \$45 per hour.

Copying charges (A4): Standard 40c Urgent 80c Express \$1-20

Handling fee: Up to twenty pages \$1

Faxes: \$1 per page Transcripts: \$2.25 each
