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TONIGHT.....We warmly welcome Professor Rollo Arnold, whose subject is 'The Revealing Flames: The Lambton Quay Fires of 17 May 1868 & 29 Dec 1885'

APRIL MEETING.....Postal carriers travelled up to 25 miles per day, on foot, & postage was payable on receipt; coach & horses plied along the coastline as far as Wanganui from Wellington at 10 miles per hour; the first recorded Post Master on the Kapiti Coast was in 1860, salary 10 per year!

Mr Robin Startup of Masterton, postal historian, addressed Kapiti members on Postal History in our area, outlining the routes over which mail was carried, & illustrating the link between Family History, Postal History & New Zealand History, as areas became inhabited, so Post Offices came in to being, often being in homes or attached to shops, & becoming vital links in developing communities. Robin illustrated his talk with a collection of interesting historical postal data, some items showing numerous postmarks covering the journey made by items of mail.

40 members plus 5 visitors were present. We welcomed two new members, Robin Scott & Eric Rose.

## "STRAYS" IN SWANSEA, WALES

have recently been searching for my husband's Cornish great great grandparents on the 1851 census for Swansea, Glamorganshire, Wales, following a clue from the Victorian marriage certificate of their youngest child which listed his place of birth as Swansea (circa 1846). My interest was aroused by the large number of people living in Swansea who had been born in other parts of the world. I started to list these "strays" but found it to be impossible in the time available, so I have listed the birthplaces with the hope that it may prove helpful for other family historians with missing ancestors.

Every country of England, most counties of Scotland and Ireland, Austria, France, Holland, Germany, Italy, Poland, Barbados, the Channel Islands and America.

· Many people in Australia who are researching their family history fail to see the connection with Brazil. It should be remembered that a large number of sailing ships, including the First Fleet, called at Rio de Janeiro on the voyage from the British Isles to Australia, and Brazilian records of these ships exist. In the 19th century, much of the commerce in the larger Brazilian cities was controlled by the British, and Rio de Janeiro and Sao Paulo in particular had large British and Irish communities. There were frequent instances where British and Irish families emigrated to Brazil, and after some years continued on to finally settle in Australia. In these cases, births, deaths and marriages which took place in Brazil are of course recorded in the church registers. Perhaps you might like to mention this information in your journal as an item of general interest, as I believe that many of your members have not imagined the possibility of records of their ancestors and the voyage to Australia existing in Brazil. It could be a new and unexpected source of information for them.
