BRITISH POST OFFICE HISTORY.....two information sheets, Nos 16 & 29 are available for researchers interested in British Postal History.

HAMPSHIRE PARISH RECORDS.....from GENBOARD, A COMPUTER BULLETIN BOARD via Wellington Group newsletter, March 1993. The Wellington Public Library has 16 volumes of Hampshire Parish Records published in 1906. These books are from a limited edition of only 150. The records are mostly marriage records but there are also some baptisms & burials for what appears to be most of the Hampshire parishes from around 1650 to around 1812. There is only an index to the names of the parishes, not the persons. Names are listed under parishes, & then in date order of the event & so it would take some time to go through every entry in the sixteen volumes.

FROM GROUPS TO BRANCHES.....We are now the KAPITI BRANCH of the New Zealand Society of Genealogists. At the recent Conference a remit proposed by Council was passed changing society 'groups' to branches of the Society, Branch being the acknowledged terminology in the Incorporated Societies Act.

CROWN The crown of the Christian martyr, whose reward awaits him in

Heaven, after his suffering on earth.

DOVE The Holy Spirit, peace.

HANDS Shown clasped, they symbolise farewell.

IVY Either immortality or evergreen, undying friendship.

LAMP
This, the symbol of innocence, is found most often on children's graves.
This means either immortality, the undying flame, or the light which

leads one to a knowledge of God.

LAUREL Found most often on the tomb of a writer, musician or artist, it means

fame.

LION Like the horse, a symbol of strength and courage, it can also symbolise

the Resurrection.

PHOENIX The Resurrection of Christ. ROCK(S) The Christian Church.

SCYTHE Death. Human beings are eventually cut down like ripe corn.

A pilgrimage to God or Heaven. The shell was the badge of the

pilgrims who went to Compostella in Spain.

SHIP The Christian church, carrying the faithful on their journey through life.

SNAKE Usually shown with its tail in his mouth, it symbolises eternity.

TORCH If shown upright, it means immortality, but if on its side or inverted,

the light of life which has been put out.

URN If it has flames coming from it, it signifies new life. If it is empty and

draped, it means death.
