HUNDREDS/- RIDINGS etc.....according to the Concise Oxford dictionary a HUNDRED is a subdivision of a county or shire having it's own court. RIDING is an administrative division, East, West or North riding of Yorkshire. Similar divison of other UK. or Colonial county, (one third). RAPE, any of six divisions of Sussex. (first in Domesday Book, origin unknown). WAPENTAKE, old name in Yorkshire & some other shires for hundred or division of shire.

OCTOBER MEETING.....this is the night we shared with Jan & Alex Bonnett their prize-winning trip to San Diego. Little did Jan imagine when she entered the competition, the tremendous fortnight of events that lay ahead. As Jan said it was the experience of a life time. From the moment they landed in LA, their time was fully organised. experienced the utmost in true San Diego hospitality. Lunch in the ward room of the Harry W Hill as guests of the Navy, talkback radio & TV interviews, a dinner cruise, the official opening of America's Finest City Week, Mayoral welcome, shakedown cruise on the Magic Kiwi, presented with illuminated address from the County of San Diego. Breakfast at Clayton's Diner, The Miramar Airshow, as VIPs (temp over 100 deg.); followed by a welcome party at the home of Mr Simon Feilding, president of the San Diego - New Zealand Business Association, & visits to local homes. Finally the big day arrived, a cloudless blue sky & a pipe band welcome at the wharf, followed by a Maori challenge to Captain Bowman, 85 years of age who is the only person on the West Coast of America Licenced to sail Euterpe. Then the moment arrived to board the ship, the absolute highlight of the trip. & to set forth under canvas! A truly remarkable experience for Jan & Alex & the other cowinners of the competition. They also viewed the movie Treasure Island, screened on the sail of the Euterpe, & enjoyed a reception on Broadway Pier which was a gala charity affair, & there they met Charlton Heston & his family. Jan calls the Euterpe a lucky ship, although a slow ship, who ran into difficulties on her voyages to NZ, there was no loss of

life. The journey on which Jan's ancestors sailed took 134 days. She is a lovely ship, launched in November 1863 it firstly took men & freight to India, later purchased by the Shaw Savill Line. She is supposed to have made 18 voyages to NZ. 1902 bought by Alaskan Packing Co, sailed up & down the coast of Nth America, salmon fishing, 1927 found in Oakland California, towed to San Diego in 1957, in a very forlorn state. Has only sailed six times since restoration. Hundreds of thousands of people watch the great event from the shore. It costs \$100,000 every time she is taken out to sea. There is a turnover from vistors on board & sale of Souvenirs of

\$800,000 annualy for the Maritime Museum. There are 15 full time staff & 15 part time selling paintings & souvenirs etc. Three ships are at the Museum, the Barclay a former San Franscisco ferry, with pew seats & stained glass windows, (\$800.00 to hire it, for an event!) Next is a steamer yacht Medusa. The saloon & main cabins of Euterpe (re-named 'Star of India') are in beautiful condition & the staircase. It must have been very hot & uncomfortable to say the least in the days when she carried 407 people below decks. Later voyages carried only 92 passengers.

Jan & Alex Bonnett with Malcolm & Lauren Francis were guests of the city of San Diego to celebrate the 'America's Finest City' week, & as winners of a contest sponsored by Air New Zealand.

This month marks the 130 birthday of launching of Euterpe.

THE WEARIN' OF THE GREEN.....The 16ft long pike was last used by British foot soldiers in battle in 1663, when it was replaced by the bayonet. Replaced by everyone, that is, except for the Irish Regiments who continued to use it for many more years, It was the Duke of Wellington in the late 1700's who decreed that Irish Regiments tie a two foot long piece of green serge on to the ends of their pikes in order to be recognised in battle - thus was born the expression which is dear to every Irishman: 'The wearing of the green', Cot. lain Swinnerton at Launceston Conference 1991, per 'Biarney' Irish Ancestory Group, a Special Interest Groupp of the Genealogical Society of Victoria, May 1991.

Please note that by courtesy of the British Council, Col.lain Swinnerton TD DL JP FSG, President of the Federation of Family History Societies is to be keynote speaker at the 27th Annual General Meeting & Conference, at University of Waikato, Hamilton, 6-8 May 1994. COINCIDENCES..... Have you ever noticed how places, names or dates often recurr in family research? One such place has played it's part in my family's history - Hargreaves yard, an area of six houses, accessed through a small passage between shops on Penny Street, Lancaster. In 1881 we find my Great Grandfather's brother living at No 1 Hargreaves Yard with wife two sons, mother-in-law & a lodger. It appears that son No3 was born there too. A lot of people in a tiny one-up one-down house with no toilets or running water. Then, about 1920 my Mother's two brothers from Blackburn bought a block of four shops in Penny Street & included in the property was Hargreaves Yard. They opened a cycle shop in one of the shops, & my Grandfather bought into the business for my Mother. In 1922 my father left school & got a job - in the cycle shop! Over the years he collected the rents from the tenants in Hargreaved Yard & was still doing so when Albert & Mary-Ann Humpage, newly married moved into No 1 in 1930. Of my Mother often visited her Brother's shop, & consequently met my Father. One Uncle also met his future wife when she visited cousins living at No 6 Hargreaves Yard. Finally my husband, Ray, was born in 1932 in No 1 Hargreaves Yard! The shops were sold in the 1940's but when we searched out the area in 1992 the few remains of the houses attached to the Penny Street shops, are we are sure, part of No 1 which had it's place in our families' lives over the years.
