

NEW ZEALAND MARRIAGES

Are there marriages that you can't find on the NZ RGO Marriage Fiche? Well, it is possible that the ones you are looking for were missed of the Index! There were some 214 names missed off or incorrectly inserted into the wrong list, ie., males in the brides list and vice versa, in the years 1855 to 1900. Another error was that first names were given as surnames, the surname then becoming the first name, ie, WILLIAMS, John became JOHN, Williams.

The NZSG has published a list of those that were missed, etc., and it is in the back of the NZGS journal for 1994. A copy of that list is now kept with the Marriage Fiche.

AUCKLAND CATHOLIC DIOCESAN ARCHIVES - a helpful genealogical source

Colleen Pounsford has kindly provided the following information:

The Auckland Catholic Archives Dept. holds registers of baptisms, marriages, burials & confirmations. The earliest registers date from 1840 & are open until the late 1940s. The Auckland Diocese from 1848 to 1980 reflects the old Auckland provincial boundries (which include Gisborne).

Catholic publications held include *The Tablet* (1878-1915), *Month* (1918-1934), *Zealandia* (1934-1989), & the *Australasian Catholic Directory* (1903-1975). These publications contain information on laity, priests & religious.

Historical files include photographs, newspaper cuttings, booklets, etc., on parishes, schools, associations & societies, laity, priests & religious.

When writing for information from the registers, please provide the following:

- full names of person being researched
- names of both parents, including mother's maiden name for baptisms
- name of parish
- type of records, eg., baptism, burial
- approximate date of event
- any other relevant information.

Basic research fee - \$11.25

(note that registers are not yet indexed). If basic search takes longer than one hour, there is additional fee of \$11.25 per hour. Inquirers are contacted to acertain if they wish to continue beyong 1st hour. An SAE would be appreciated.
