
### Tonight's Meeting

# Reviews January Meeting - Unusual Sources

Looking at unusual sources for the genealogist, Barbara Humpage took us to the Census records in Liveropool that covered families waiting to migrate to the colonies. Deborah Shuker encouraged us not to ignore old postcards - these often contain valuable information. Carol Procter showed us the Hong Books, lising Eurpoeans in Shanghai, China in the 1860s. Rosalyn Smaill suggested rereading old greeting cards and "Christmas" letters which often contain the latest family information.

Mountjoy made us aware of the Miscellaneous Box of Microfiche which contains such treasures and NZ Bankrupsies, Passenger and Shipping Lists, Military Records, Newspaper BDM notices. There is so much information out there, if you just know where to find it.

February - Computers & Genealogy Are you totally overawed by modern technology? Which genealogy programme is for you? The Computer Group had a very professional set up waiting for us, 3 computers, able to feed in to the 8 monitors, positioned so that every had a good view of the screen. Kay Carter acted as "anchor man", while Allan Kenning showed us the PAF Genealogy Programme, the value of Family Tree Maker, Bill Carter demonstrated Reunion and Brendan Wilson whetted our appetites with his database of Marriage Witnesses, downloaded from the Genboard and able to be accesses by brides. grooms and witnesses. Everyone was riveted to their seats, with even the noncomputer folk absorbed in the benefits of going electronic. The meeting ended with a question and answer time and It would appear that the Kapiti Coast computer dealers may well be advantaged by the meeting.

### Research Services

offered by Society of Australian Genealogists

The Society operates a library for researchers in Kent St., Sydney, open Wed, Thur & Sat from 10.30am to 4pm. Access to SAG members is free, nonmembers needing to pay a daily fee of A\$12 per person.

They operate a limited mail research service for non-members:

- \* a fee of A\$30 is payable in advance, payment being made by cheque or bank draft, Bankcard, Mastercard, or Visa.
- this fee covers a brief check of records held by the Society
- \* photocopying charges are additional to this fee, 40c per A4 page, 60c for A3.

### A Grave Business

Mangere, Auckland, florist Val PAYNE is involved in more than flowers at the moment. She has taken on the task of locating the descendants of 41 people buried in the local Methodist Graveyard.

Auckland Airport announced that the 130 year old cemetery lay in the path of the proposed new runway, which spurred Val to becin looking for descendants of those buried there for permission to exhume and rebury their relatives' remains.

Finding family members of 28 of

the deceased proved no problem with the assistance of Methodist records, the NZSG and LDS archives. Help was needed to find the rest however. This is compounded by the fact that some graves are unmarked.

The NZ Herald covered the story and Val has since been interviewed by Radio Pacific, Auckl; and TV, Radio NZ, and Airport Radio. Months later people phone with possible leads.

A search of Herald Archives solved the the mystery of a 100 year old grave marked "Nora, died May 16 1896". She turned out to have been the 21 year old daughter of Rev.W J WATKINS, and had drowned in Manakau Harbour

### Grannies Galore

A photo in the *Dominion* 1 Aug 1996 showed new-born baby Nathan Moroni James MOLONEY with his parents. The accompanying acticle described the baby as possibly the first New Zealander to have a living great-great-great-grand-parent. There are six generations of his family living: Nathan himself, mother (18), grandmother (37), great-grandmother (58), great-great-grandmother (76), and great-great-great-grandmother (97). house of memories this little boy will grow up with.

On 16th Dec 1975 to mark 125th Anniversary of the arrival of the First Four Ships in Canterbury, bronze plaques were set in the pavement of cathedral Square outside the then central Post Office. These listed the settlers on those ships.

At the time objections were raised about the failure to recognise those settler who arrived before the organised settlement represented by the First Four Ships. It was not until 29 Aug 1985 that a further plaque was added, recognising the Pre-Adamites as the earlier settlers came to be called, but none was individually named. This is the wording of the 1985 plaque:

"From 1830-1850, the territory now known as Canterbuty, long the home of the Maori, saw its first Pakeha settlers. Referred to later as Pre-Adamites, these settlers came from the British Isles, Europe, Australia, North America and other parts of New Zealand. Most lived on Banks Peninsula. Akaroa erstwhile became the French settlement in 1840 and principle community. They worked mainly as flax traders, whalers, bush workers, boat builders, carpenters, farmers, housewives, clergy, artisans, nurses, hotel keepers, merchants, domestics and general labourers. Active in this area also were the agents and surveyors preparing for the arrival of the first Canterbury Association Settlers in December 1850."

### Pre-Adamite Index

Is it possible that one of your ancestors could be a Pre-Adamite? Then you may be in luck because 20 or more years ago a group of NZSG Canterbury Branch members got together to compile an index of "Pre-Adamite" settlers, being the ones to coin that expression. This is available in the Canterbury Museum Library (the master index) while a copy is in the Canterbury Public Library. The Master Index is updated as more material comes to hand.

Pioneers of the Plains - The Deans of Canterbury
The author of this book about the Pre-Adamite Dean family
is Gordon Ogilvie, one of Canterbury's best known historians and biographers. It is published by Shoal Bay Press,
