

Glossary of Terms

GRO CERTIFICATES

These documents are either birth, marriage or death certificates held at the Family Records Centre in Myddleton Street.

CENSUS RETURNS

The census is taken every ten years. The public may only see returns that are over 100 years old, so the censuses that are available for genealogists are those from 1841-91. They are held at the Family Records Centre in Myddleton Street. The returns give details of names, addresses, occupations, place and date of birth.

IGI

The IGI is the International Genealogical Index compiled by the Mormons. It contains over 80 million British baptismal and marriage entries from parish records, which can be viewed on microfiche at county record offices, libraries and family history societies.

PCC WILLS AND ADMINS PRE-1858 An admin is a letter of administration which was granted by the probate court to the executor of the estate in cases where no will was left. Before 1858, all wills were dealt with by ecclestastical courts in each diocese. After 1858 they were passed to the High Court. If a testator owned property in more than one diocese, his will had to be proved in the Prerogative Court of York (PCY) or Canterbury (PCC). PCC records are held at the Family Records Centre. They also deal with people who owned property in England and Wales, but who died in Scotland, Ireland, abroad or at sea.

- ⇒ Mens' baggy suits 1860s
- ⇒ No crease in trousers until 1890s
- ⇒ Handlebar moustaches 1890s
- ⇒ Boater (men & women), sailor suits (young women & children) - 1890s
- ⇒ Hobble skirts 1910 1915
- ⇒ Other clues include the type of skirt, collars, styles and hairstyles.

Storage and Handling of Photographs.

The enemies of photographs are: People, Light & Dampness. DO NOT NEVER EVER NEVER:

Write on the front of photographs

Overlay

Over-handle

Over-cram

Expose to artificial lights

Lay face to face

Store in wooden drawers and shelves

Store in attics, near furnaces or

in other hazardous places

Store with newspaper clippings
Store negatives and photos together

Laminate

Use paper clips, pins etc.



- * Colour photos begin to deteriorate in 6 10 year. Get a black & white copy made of your important photos. Slides are more stable, can last 75 100 years, with Kodachrome lasting longest. Polaroid prints are also good for 75 100 years.
- Pre-1950 negatives are nitrate based and are a fire hazard.
 They should be isolated from other negatives.
- * Store all photographs in acid-free housing in controlled humidity. **NEVER** use those sticky type albums they contain acid and you may not get your photos out of the album without damaging them.
- * DON'T display what you want to keep. Make a copy and store the originals.
