BACK TO THE BASICS

Names as registered on BDM.

Registrations of marriages & deaths do not always use the first names registered at the person's birth. Informants often give the known or used name, sometimes never having known the original. (e.g. Inspector Morse on the TV show).

Some common usages to check for as an unintentional alias:-

Jessie, Janet.

Anne, Agnus, Hannah, Joanna.

Jane, Jean, Jinny.

Elizabeth, Betty, Elspeth, Lizzie, Beth, Bessie.

Mary, Minnie, Molly, May or Polly.

Sarah, Sally.

John, Jack.

Helen, Nell, Ellen, Eleanor

Richard, Dick.

Alex, Sandy, Lex.

Frances, Fanny.

Margaret, Maggie, Meg, Daisy.

Francis, Frank.

Anthony Camp "Occupations in Towns" National Library Jun 1999

Copies of the four-page bibliography on which Mr Camp based his talk had not arrived. This made it more difficult to take in all the information he gave, but they will be sent on. Some interesting facts:

Between 1630 and 1800, 10% of the population lived in London.

In 1852 the average age of death in London was 29.4 years. This low age was caused by the high number of infant deaths and the living conditions in the city. In rural Wiltshire it was 41yrs and 16 years in industrial Dudley.

10% of Londoners were Non Conformists i.e. not Church of England. Tradesmen advertised in directories and newspapers when they moved.

Liverpool Freemen records show many ex Waterford and Wexford, Ireland.

A Poll book is a list of people who voted

Guild records and Apprentice records are a valuable source of information. Often have family details.

The Guild Company you belong to is based on your Freeman status not necessarily your occupation. e.g. If you are a freeman because you were born in London a son of a butcher, you join the butcher guild even though you are a jeweller.

A shop usually means a workshop, from which you may also sell. Quarter sessions have Publican licences, Browser licences from 1750's onwards. Innkeeper records show the Inn sign and have the names of two sureties.

Public Office employment records are usually still existing to some degree, at the PRO.

Confirmation Certificate from the C of E shows the place of residence and referees.

The National Register of Archives is on the Internet.

Firemen records usually give father's name and where applicant from. Rates books for different towns show both the owner and the occupier's names.

"Town Records" and "Village Records" books by John West are good explanatory books. (Both in Kapiti Library)
