Birstall Sunday School Feast:

Friday 24 August— Today the Church Sunday School Festival was celebrated. The ladies and gentlemen connected with the school, the teachers and children, met in the school at half past one. A hymn was sung and prayers were read by the Vicar, af-

ter which the prizes in books were distributed. to the Church where there was singing and an W. Heald junior to parents, teachers and then walked round the village and returned to they sung in the school yard, and after this all regaled, the girls with buns and tea, the boys and porter. per was introduced, consisting of the Old English cheer, roast beef, plum-pudding and good beer, to which from 80 to 100 sat down. The day concluded with music and dancing.

Mr White, who was interested in the manufacture of SHODDY, visited Batley in the 1850's and wrote the following:

On alighting at the station, the sight of great packets or bales piled up in stacks, or laden on trucks, every bale branded 'ANVERS'; and casks of oil from Sevila, gave me at once proof that I had come to the right place; for here were rags shipped at Antwerp from all parts of northern Europe. Think of that. Hither were brought tatters from pediculous Poland from the gypsies of Hungary, from the beggars and scare-



crows of Germany, from the frowsy peasants of Muscovey; to say nothing of the snips and shreds of monks' gowns and lawyers' robes, from postilions' jackets and soldiers' uniforms, from maidens' bodices, and noblemens' cloaks. A vast medley, truly! And all to be manufactured into broadcloth on Yorkshire. The walk into town gives you such a view as can only be seen in a manufacturing district: hills, fields, meadows and rough slopes, all bestrewn with cottages, factories, warehouses, sheds, clouded here and there by smoke; roads and paths wandering ap-

parently any where; here and there a quarry, and piles of squared stone; heaps of refuse; wheat-fields among the houses; potato-plots in little levels; and everything giving you the impression of waiting to be finished. Add to all this, troops of men and woman, boys and girls — the girls with a kerchief pinned over the head, the corners hanging behind — going home to dinner; and a mighty noise of clogs; and trucks ladened with rags and barrels of oil; and you will have an idea of Batley as I saw it on my arrival.

DID YOU KNOW?.....

That except for the 1841 Census, Scottish Census Returns are the day <u>AFTER</u> the English ones?

Your ancestors just might be in both the English Census and the Scottish Census for the same year - if he was traveling between the two! The reason for the different dates is that Scotland would not hold their Census on the Sabbath, so it had to be on the Monday instead.

And ... Did You Know???

Section 14 of the Birth and Death Registration Act gave the Registrar General the power to register the birth of any person born in New Zealand whose birth has not been previously registered in New Zealand. It provides for late registration. This helps to solve some problems.

Still-born Children—it was from the 1 March 1913 that it became compulsory to register still-born births, but death registration was not required. In 1907 it became a requirement for a doctor or midwife in attendance at the birth to notify the local register. Before this date many

births were not registered; the death was registered but not the birth. (from Palmerston
