ON A PAPER CHASE

Genealogy is like a paper chase, clues can lead you in many directions and sometimes you wonder which one to follow.

My husband's great-grandfather was a retired paper maker according to the 1881 UK Census, living in a place called Sutton At Hone in Kent. I couldn't find this on the map, but correspondence with someone (unrelated) who happened to be chasing the same surname revealed that it was a small village near Dartford. In the same Census I found that his eldest son, a paper maker (finisher), lived in a nearby village with his family.

But the interesting thing is that the senior paper maker was born near Midhurst in West Sussex, while four of his family were born near Chichester, not far away and by the 1841 Census the family was living at Godalming, where another two sons were born. However, there was a connection with Woking over a period of a couple of years for the youngest children were born there although the family was living back in Godalming by 1841. So Great-grandfather HANDS migrated across from West Sussex to Kent during his lifetime.

His oldest son, again referring to the 1881 Census, married a girl from Felling in County Durham and over a period of about 6 years must have lived there, for most of his children were born in the North. Can I assume that he went up visiting his two brothers that were working in the shipyards in Sunderland? He later returned South where his youngest child was born and was living close to his parents
