#### Weekend wedding break

Gretna Green in Scotland used to be synonymous with so-called "quickie marriages". Up to the not too distant past couples desperate to marry speedily, and mainly from England or Wales, used to elope to Gretna Green, and to other places just over the bornder into Scotland, to take advantage of the more lenient forms of Scotlish marriages. Places like Gretna, Coldstream, Lamberton Toll, Chain Bridge, Paxton, Ayton and Ladykirk, etc., sprang into prominence after clandestine marriages south of the border were abolished by the Hardwicke Marriage Act of 1753, effective from 25th March 1754.

But how many family historians realise that Portpatrick, a tiny coastal community in what is now Dumfries and Galloway, was also noted for providing a similar service to Irish lovers? Auriel Richards of Peterborough very kindly reminded me of this when she sent along a photocopy taken from one of the 1986 copies of *People's Friend* which mentions Portpatrick's marriages of convenience under "An Irish Gretna", as follows:-

Until 1849, steamers from Donaghadee in Ireland, sailed the twenty-one miles to Portpatrick in Wigtownshire, and the town became something of an Irish "Gretna" Couples would land on Saturday, have their banns called on Sunday and marry on Monday. However, the danger of severe gales led to Stranraer being developed as the main port and, gradually, the harbour of Portpatrick silted up.

As far as I can recall, there was a good article by Arthur Brack on this very subject in the Society of Genealogists' *Genealogists' Magazine* for June 1984 If you can't find a marriage for a couple from the Lisburn, Bangor of Belfast areas of Ireland, or even further inland, before 1849, then Portpatrick could easily be worth a try.
