This Life Membership recognises the outstanding service Derek Griffis has given to the Kapiti Branch, NZSG and as a genealogist for many years.

Derek became Secretary of the Branch at the AGM in 2003 and shortly afterwards added the responsibility of Research Officer to his list of duties. He introduced a new rigour to the Secretary position as a stickler for precise records and protocols. His insistence on maintenance of archival material will hold the Branch in good stead for many years to come. He stepped down from the Secretary and Research Officer portfolios at the end of 2008 for health reasons, but remained on the Committee as Assistant Secretary to April 2009 and then Communication Assistant through to April 2011.

Earning a well earned break from Committee work, Derek has continued to offer his services off Committee. Until very

recently he has been a proof reader of the newsletter, the creator and purveyor of the All Points Bulletin and operated the Help Desk at monthly meetings. His editorial rigour is mirrored in his very thorough approach to genealogy.

His personal delivery of the newsletter and other documents to Branch snail mailers is legendary. Rain, sleet or sun, Derek is a familiar sight on his frequent brisk walks across the district, a credit to not only his fitness but to the postage savings for the Branch.

Online News:

Ancestry now has **UK**, **Outward Passenger Lists**, **1890-1960** (previously only available online via FindmyPast. <u>Chris Paton's</u> blog adds that the collection includes sailing from across Britain, and the whole of Ireland prior to Partition, with sailings for Northern Ireland only from 1922 onwards. Also noted in Ancestry "New records": <u>UK</u>, <u>Commonwealth War Graves</u>, <u>1914-1921 and 1939-1947</u>, (freely available from the CWGC website, but useful to have elsewhere), <u>New Zealand</u>, <u>Registered Ships & Owners</u>, <u>1840-1950</u>, <u>New Zealand</u>, <u>White Wings</u>, <u>1924</u>, <u>1928</u> (Volumes 1 & 2), <u>New Zealand</u>, <u>Auckland</u>, <u>Chapman's Gazetteer</u>, <u>1867</u>; FamilySearch is always added indexes, many with images attached, some with links to where images can be found - eg Manchester records indexed, images on FindMyPast.

Another award



Kapiti Branch member, Beverley Chappell has been made a Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit in the New Year's Honours List. The Kapiti Observer of 7 Jan 2013 reported the following:

"Beverley Chappell, a nurse and midwife for 43 years, said she was surprised to receive the letter from the Governor General's office in October telling her of the nomination.

In Kapiti she works a raft of voluntary positions including Meals on Wheels, Civil Defence Emergency Welfare, Save the Children and the Parkinson's Society.

Part of the reason for the work came down to the "wonderful role models" in the community where she has lived for 16 years.

"I think that comes from my philosophy in life, and my values. As a nurse it was always [about] the health and welfare, whether it was the small frail newborns or the elderly people."

Her work with older people includes membership in the Ministerial Advisory Council for Senior Citizens from 1997 to 2002.

She helped develop the Positive Ageing Strategy, the Retirement Village Code of Practice and Enduring Power of Attorney."

We however know Bev as the stalwart for the Wednesday morning help sessions and a dedicated committee member for a number of years.

The award is a well deserved recognition of the many hours of voluntary service to the community.

Local BMD records offer more

The Lost Cousins newsletter (http://www.lostcousins.com/) reminds us of the usefulness of the UKBMD website (http://www.ukbmd.org.uk/index.php) with it's links to all of the local BMD projects in England & Wales - it's an easy way to find out whether local indexes of births, marriages, and deaths exist for the areas where your ancestors lived.

Remember that although the GRO indexes cover the whole

country, local indexes are still relevant. Some events don't appear in the GRO indexes or are grossly misrepresented.

Local GRO indexes however sometimes include additional fields that aren't recorded in the GRO indexes (eg the spouse's surname, or the mother's maiden name prior to when they appear in the GRO indexes).

YURU Report

Kapiti Computer Friendly User Group

The aim of this group is to help members with their genealogy on computers.

We are a diverse group with many members having different levels of expertise in genealogy, genealogy programs, web sites, and use of computers. The meetings are informal and all members of the Kapiti branch are welcome to attend.

where members can ask about their computer related genealogy problems.

There is a door charge of \$2 to cover costs.

This is a chance for members to seek help with some of the problems with computers and genealogy when there is not enough time to deal with these at the main branch meetings.

Marking the Centenary of the Commencement of WWI

Some time in the late 1990s when a building in Cuba Street, Wellington, was being renovated, approximately 3000 glass plate negatives were found in a cupboard. These were from the photography studio of Berry and Company, who had the building purpose -built in 1900.

The glass plate negatives have found their way into the specialised care of the Museum of New Zealand, Te Papa Tongarewa, in Wellington. The plates are named and approximately ninety of

them are of WWI soldiers including some with their wives and families. It is assumed the photos were taken before the soldiers left NZ for the various overseas theatres of war and that the subjects are not necessarily all from Wellington.

As a special project to commemorate the centenary of the commencement of World War I, before July of 2014 Te Papa is hoping to confirm the identity of all the soldiers, learn of their military careers and what happened to them.

The portraits have been digitised and appear in the 'Collections Online' section of the Te Papa website.

Check www.tepapa.govt.nz and you may find a member of your family. Te Papa's Photography Curator, Lynette Townsend will be grateful to receive any information that may assist her and you may be lucky and find a photograph of a member of your family that you could not identify or were previously unaware of. National Library Tour

On Dec 6th eighteen Kapiti branch members ventured to Wellington to go on a tour of the National Library NZ, recently reopened after a significant refurbishment. The tour was conducted by Margaret Hurst, family history specialist.

What strikes you first is the lack of books! There are huge open spaces making room for the world of the future – the virtual library. There is lots of comfortable seating so you can relax and search the library electronically via your own computer or smart phone. Rows of computers are available too.

Margaret spent some time demystifying this new world! Everything (and more) that was in the 'old' library is still available but accessed differently. Not everything can be accessed electronically.

Check the catalogue on the website http://natlib.govt.nz for an extensive list of what is held at the library.

We of course had come especially to see what had happened to the family history books and to our relief they

were all there, stacked on shelves ready to be looked at the old fashioned way! We were given a tour and explanation of the Microfilm (LDS) Service ably run by NZSG volunteers.

Free public tours of the library happen every day at 11am. The way the upgraded library is set up encourages visitors to explore for themselves. So if you are visiting Wellington it is worth popping in and having a look around.
