Convenor's Comment

The last month has just flown by and during that time I have been consumed with an avenue of research I never expected to take part in. It all began when my curiosity was aroused at seeing on an Ancestry message board that a 9 x great grandparent of mine was an 8 x great grandparent to a researcher in Ohio, USA.

It seemed that our common progenitor John TENNENT and his spouse Jean McTAGGART who lived in Alloway, Ayrshire, Scotland had amongst others a child named John and another named Elizabeth. I am descended from John and Heidi in Ohio is descended from Elizabeth.

On further inspection of documents found on Ancestry.com we found that John senior who was a miller, was listed in Burke's Peerage and a small comment appeared there to the effect that John was often consulted by none other than Robbie Burns before he published any of his now famous poems.

A close inspection of birth records showed Heidi and me that John Snr b. 1635 was 64 years of age when he married Jean in 1699 when she was 30 years of age, by which time the couple had had 5 children. Jean died in 1723 aged 54 and John in 1728 aged 93 years.

Our combined research did not end there. Over the past week we have found further generations of the Tennent family back to 1430. From that point to today there are 22 generations listed!! I think I might just visit Alloway when I'm over in Scotland again next year and even stop off in Ohio to meet my newly found 9th cousin I x removed.

It is unfortunate that the monthly Saturday Members Only Personal Sessions have been discontinued through lack of patronage. But good to see that our members are managing their research without the help on offer.

"They Used to Work on the Railway"

Come to the next Branch meeting on Tuesday 25 June and hear Hugh McCracken speak on this interesting subject.

He has been interested in Rail since a young boy and in 1990 obtained a grant to rescue two Wb engines from the West Coast, bringing them back to the North Island to preserve. He has these stored at the Rimutaka Incline Heritage Railway site at Maymorn, near Upper Hutt.

He will give a quick review of the roles and titles that railwaymen had, from the more commonly known through to the more obscure: from stationmaster to porter, locomotive driver (or locomotive engineer as they are now called), firemen, cleaner, fitter and turner, boilermaker, navvy, platelayer, ganger, lengthman, signalman,

shunter, guard, refreshment room staff and illustrate these with photos, stories, memorabilia, some recollections and oral histories.

The railway used to be the hub of the community, and almost every New Zealand family will have had someone work on the railway at some stage in the past - a bit like the post office in some respects.

The Rimutaka Incline has a unique history, with remote communities looking after the day-to-day running of the Fell-worked incline, and all within a stone's throw of Wellington.

Railway communities were closely knit, brought together by the shift work, the long hours and the railway housing that was provided for the railway worker and their family.

Tour of Archives New Zealand

On May 9 a group of 12 went on a guided tour of Archives New Zealand. Some of the group were on their first tour, others were regular visitors. As usual it was a very interesting tour and included a visit to view the original Treaty of Waitangi. Most were there to discover what records were held at Archives New Zealand and learn how to access these.

The tour covered the usual Land Deed, War Records and War Diaries, court records and intention to marry records.

Also on display were some fascinating documents of Chinese immigrants including photos and finger prints. Should a Chinese person leave the country in the late 1800's, very detailed and extensive records were required if the person wished to return to New Zealand.



New to most of the group was the relatively new initiative of placing archival film clips onto YouTube. There are thousands of film clips covering New Zealand history including advertisements and events. It was time well worth spent in this section. The wonders, and perils, of online trees

Many of you will be familiar with the idea of sharing your research in online trees. Just some of the sites are Ancestry, MyHeritage, WorldConnect, WikiTree, FamilySearch, Geni, WeRelate, and FamNet, but others do exist.

They divide into two basic types, those where each tree is in its own independent tree (Ancestry family trees, MyHeritage, WorldConnect, FamNet), and those where there is a One World Tree concept where collaboration is encouraged and each person should only be on the tree once (FamilySearch, WikiTree, Geni, We Relate).

Each site has their own strengths and weaknesses as to controls over who can view, and/or update, the data, and how to update (by keying, or GEDCOM or direct from your program)
Costs range from free (WorldConect, WikiTree, WeRelate, FamilySearch, Ancestry - without a data subscription) to expensive, and all points in between.

In general: some may only be updated online, either initially loaded via a gedcom, or keyed; some may be fully integrated with your genealogy program; Of the latter, some individuals may be selectively published/shared online (FamilySearch via eg RootsMagic and Legacy), or your tree published in full (Ancestry, MyHeritage) with two-way

synchronisation of the data.

All have the benefits of sharing your data, and finding long lost relatives who may have that elusive clue as to where great uncle Johnnie ended up, or why that branch of the family lost touch, or a photo you don't have.

All also have perils of rampant inaccuracy from careless "research", copied many times over.

We don't "own" our ancestors, but we do "owe" it to them to be remembered, accurately. So do check the data you find.

THINK before you share. Would YOU be happy with what is there? Also remember the privacy constraints on the living.

THINK before you copy. Is that really "my" relative? Is that his/her photo? Is the information accurate?

Once online, data and photos tend to get "legs" and run very fast, and somehow, it's always the inaccurate bits that run further and are harder to correct.

Not that this is a new problem that only arrived with online trees. I'm sure you all have inherited old paper trees with rather fanciful genealogies. Above all, explore, share, and enjoy, but be sceptical.


Also in the latest magazine is an article about one of our members, Derek Griffis', indexing works that is now available via the, free to members, Research Service.
