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Convenor's Comment

I've just had the best part of a month in Australia. Not particularly exciting you might say but to me new avenues of Family Research were opened up.

There was a Ground Radar Search (GRS) carried out eighteen months ago on the Yanakie Cemetery grounds where of the five persons buried there only one was identified with a headstone. The other four burials were my gg grandparents and two infants. Now this is where talking about your research to strangers has results. I spoke with a volunteer at the Foster Museum who told me to contact the owner of the Yanakie Store who had organised the GRS at Yanakie Cemetery. I had to go to the cemetery first but caught up with the store keeper later on. I noticed that the GRS had located an adult sized grave and the searchers had marked it out with granite stones with a larger one for a headstone. Michael told me some amazing stories about my gg grandfather. He

also said that cemetery records

confirmed that three bodies were in the adult sized grave they located. This had to be my gg grandparents and an infant child from my gg grandmother's second marriage.

As if that wasn't enough I am being sent documents relating to the financing and refinancing of the run and station. These documents note the stock numbers on the property and even the brand marks on the animals.

The next day I went searching for evidence of my gg grandfather's slaughter house on Camp Hill outside Beaufort. By talking about this to a local in the "I" office I found out that there was a Slaughter House Lane not far away and many of the locals had wondered why it had that name. Maybe my gg grandfather's business was the reason for this? The site where buildings and stock yards had been is being cleared but the remains of a building still stand amid all this rubble. I have yet to sight documents relating to the purchase of this property but it looks promising.

YURU 2013 Rodger Fox - A story of three generations



YURU 2013 Family Jazz with Rodger Fox, opened at Southwards Theatre, Sunday August 18 with almost 300 tickets sold plus 18 members of the Fox family from all over New Zealand. Also great to see one of our original guests, Anna Kenna of Raumati, in the audience. She and Kevin Milne (formerly of Fair Go), where our first guests at an Expo in Coastlands Mall in 2008.

Rodger's band, minus singer Erna Ferry due to illness, gave us a range of jazz numbers and CD excerpts intertwined with the script written by Clive and Merrilee Palmer and Sue Greene. The story recalled the lives of three generations of professional music talent through Harry, Louis and Rodger Fox. At the end of the show Sue, wearing her research hat, presented Rodger and his sister Liz Maxwell with a book containing their family history with copies of all the research material she collected, photos, memorabilia, the audio-visual presentation and script.

The following night's presentation at Circa Theatre in Wellington was another good performance on a very appropriate stage set of period furniture - that of Arthur Miller's The Price, but with a poor audience turnout. Door sales were limited probably due to mother nature providing some competition from the previous Friday's strong earthquake.

The show moves to Hawera on November 15, a town where Rodger's grandfather Harry Fox and father Louis Fox became

household names in the brass band and music scene. Special guests are the Hawera Brass Band and the production will feature items that can be played jointly by a brass band and jazz ensemble. The producers are working on a revised script to acknowledge the work the Fox family did in the Hawera community. The centenary of New Zealand's participation in the First World War will be marked over several years with many different commemorative projects and activities. Just one of the exciting projects are plans underway for Archives New Zealand and the National Library to make World War I memorabilia available to view online, including diaries, photographs and records of thousands of New Zealand soldiers.

Monthly Meetings

August: Tom Hayes "Finding Joe Flynn"

Tom gave a lively presentation about 'Finding Joe Flynn'. His causal and amusing presentation kept everyone connected and eventually we did indeed 'find Joe Flynn!' Tom has done a lot of his research the 'old fashioned' way. He reminded us again that whilst computers have significantly increased our chances of obtaining information, there are many things that can only be found by visiting places, reading books and asking questions.

He had some little tips that are useful specifically for Irish research, such as:

Census records; 1901 the ages have been rounded down by 5 years; Many streets did not have street numbers, so the census officer would allocate a number from which end the houses were visited – in other words for one census the census officer would start at one end, the next census at the other.

Names: For a number of reasons, in particular illiteracy, there is often more than one way of spelling a

name. Try different combinations such as changing vowels.

Also, there may be a local, unofficial, name for a place that has become the more oft used name. This means you may not find it easily it on a map.

Asking the right questions at the right time and the in the right place can make the difference to solving mysteries or brick walls.

September: How DNA can help you

Lorna Henderson will explore the mysteries of DNA and will explain why so many are now using this very useful tool in the genealogist's toolkit. Who to choose to test for whichever problem you are trying to solve? How and where do you test? Along with several real life examples of brickwalls that tumbled and new families that were found.

APFHC News: British & Irish Society Magazines

In recent years the focus of attention of genealogists in general (but especially in the case of newer members) has moved strongly over into the world of computers, both as a source of information and also as a means of communication. It should not be forgotten however, that "genealogy" has been around for a very long time, and that therefore there are vast quantities of noncomputer resources still out there just waiting to be tapped into by researchers.

I have heard this assertion recently quantified by a statement from a competent authority that "barely 3% of genealogically relevant information currently available is accessible via computers", and whilst the quoted percentage might be arguable, one could well believe the underlying thrust of the statement. It can't all be done by just sitting at home slumped in front of a key-board!

So, let's consider our local Branch collection of Family History magazines - located in the Alison Procter Family History Centre (APFHC), upstairs at Paraparaumu Public Library and being on open shelving, may be freely accessed by anyone and everyone anytime during library hours. They are "Reference Only" so cannot be borrowed, contain vast amounts of Family History material, and are mainly localised to specific geographic area — particularly in the British Isles. These magazines have been, and still are, donated

to us by various local members, so coverage is nowhere near to being 100%.

Current holdings include good runs of: Aberdeen & North-East Scotland, Buckinghamshire, Cleveland (South Durham/North Yorks), East of London, Essex, Huddersfield, Irish Roots, Isle of Man, Lancashire, Midlands (Warwickshire, Worcestershire, Staffordshire), Norfolk, Northampton, Northumberland & Durham, NZ Nth-East England (Northumberland, Durham, Yorkshire, Lincolnshire), Scots Link OZ & NZ, Society of Genealogists (London), Somerset & Dorset, Sussex, Waltham Forest (Essex), Wiltshire, and Yorkshire. There also one or two single issues for various other Counties.

For those people whose ancestors came from Britain or Ireland, if the matching geographic area magazines can be found, then it is an investment of time to rapid-read their way through all of them, from cover to cover, no matter how old the magazines may be. The solution to one of your research problems may be there sitting on shelf at APFHC, just waiting for you to read about it. If relevant information for one of your research lines is there, it matters not whether the magazine was published in 2013, 2003, 1993, or even earlier, and the "gold" may be there just waiting for you to strike it.
