NZSG News Rules Change

Rules Change

NZSG members will have received voting papers for changes to the Society's rules with the February issue of *The Genealogist*. The priority in what is stage one of the review process, is to strengthen the way in which the Society is governed and managed at a national level. This involves a change from what has been a management-operational involved Council to a governing Board. Recent staff changes at national HQ, will strengthen the process of transferring management and operational tasks to the staff and volunteer teams. It has also been an opportunity to update some very outdated sections of the current rules. Concomitant changes to the By-Laws will be voted on at the 2015 AGM to be held in Auckland on June 27.

This is the culmination of work over the last four years which has included the completion of the 2014-2016 Strategic Plan. Some of the proposed rule changes reflect the directions of the plan. The next stage of the process is to review the structures and membership of branches and interest groups. This second stage will proceed after the 2015 AGM and involve consultation with branches and interest groups, with a view to making any changes agreed to during 2016.

Members are encouraged to use the Society's website where there is a full explanation and Q&A section on the proposed changes to the rules and by-laws. The strategic plan can also be viewed there. The voting paper for the rule changes must be returned by Friday April 27. This gives time for members to direct any queries to the NZSG Manager and through their branch committee who can raise questions at the upcoming regional meeting. NZSG Council member Gill Knox is speaking at the February monthly branch meeting which will provide further opportunity for information exchange.

This package of changes is designed to strengthen the Society in an increasingly competitive genealogy world and the way in which it manages and delivers services.

The NZSG have announced that Ancestry.com now offers the NZSG cemetery records, previously only available on microfiche and in hard copy.

This data set includes records up to 2009.

NZSG have licensed these records to Ancestry.com who have digitized them, and in return will be receiving an electronic copy of these records shortly.

Once the electronic copy has been received, NZSG will be working on a members only service to these records from their own website.

New resources to explore

FindMyPast

Australia The New South Wales Will Books, 1800-1952, contain over 415,000 wills containing beautiful images of the original handwritten documents only available online at Findmypast. The records are copies of original Will Books held by the State Records Authority of New South Wales and include the wills of a number of individuals from other states and countries, typically in cases where the individual was a resident of New South Wales but their last place of residence was outside the state, or where they had originated from overseas and left legacies to family members back home.

Also Tasmanian BDMs, which, as for NZ contain different degrees of detail depending on when the event was registered. At least some of these are images, not just transcriptions, but indexed. So whereas you can browse some of the images for free on FamilySearch, the indexes aren't necessarily available there

UK Over 861,000 Baptism, Marriage and Burial records (transcriptions of the original document) from the Gloucestershire have been added to their collection of UK Parish records: Bristol baptism index 1660-1914, Bristol marriage index 1644-1939, Bristol burial index 1625-1950

Other records from North West Kent, Warwickshire, Wiltshire, Dorset and Essex (this is starting to sound like the local song "I've been everywhere man")

US Records: 75 million records have been added to the collection of <u>US Immigration and travel</u> records. Over 11.5 million records have been added to their collection of <u>US Census & Substitute records</u>, including censuses from the States of California, Minnesota, South Dakota, Alabama, Florida and Colorado.

Over 13 million records have been added to their <u>US</u> <u>Life Events collection</u>. including birth, marriage and death records from 11 different states.

Kindertransport records comprising 1,500 passenger list records and 41 volumes from The National Archives relating to the Kindertransport refugee programme during the Second World War. These fully searchable scanned documents are a digital facsimile of the files kept by central government to record the details of the thousands of young Jewish refugees, sent to Britain to escape Nazi persecution



1883

South Africa, Estates Death Index, 1999-2014 Original data: Master of the High Court (South Africa). Indices to Deceased Estates. Republic of South Africa. Gloucestershire Baptisms, Marriages, Burials, but I'm sure I read somewhere that this collection excludes Bristol (see FindMyPast)

Other worldwide collections include: Icelandic census 1870, 1880, 1890, assorted German BDMs

And this treasure for me from the California Prison and Correctional Records 1851-1950.

January meeting report

We hope that you all went home and used at least one of the Advanced Search options in Google - in spite of the technical challenges of our How To session!

Seven members shared a variety of 'News', showing that clearly the news is not just a newspaper. We saw that behind a news item there is often social history as well. When two 14 years old boys were caught stealing chickens, the penalty was 10s (a lot of money) and 6 strikes with a birch rod.

In the past the language used to write news was often very detailed. Sometimes it was beautiful as in describing the 100th birthday of an old man in Whitehaven, England. At other times it was very explicit such as describing the suicide of Mr. Alfred Carson Cooney. This website was new to most. Well worth looking at: http://

We were reminded never to ignore even the simplest writings, such as that of a letter from an 11 year old girl. Within the letter were clues to places and people of interest to this family's research.

It is surprising what a simple 'google search' of a name will bring up.

Of things regarding Gallipoli we were directed to a website which has the personal diary of Brian Milligan. We were not able to access this site properly due to the virus in the laptop, so here it

is. www.gallipolidiary.co.nz

We also heard the Gallipoli story of Lewis Cuthbert Turton. This young man was wounded at Gallipoli but subsequently died of his injuries in Malta. He was not included in the statistics of those killed at Gallipoli or on WWI memorials in New Zealand. However, being of British birth he is on a memorial in England. Something to be aware of when researching military history.
