What's different about WikiTree? It's free. It's a "one world tree" where any particular person should only appear in the tree once. It has great privacy and trusted list controls to aid collaboration and avoid nonsensical merges. It has a great <u>Hono(u)r Code</u> and great dna links.

WikiTree

WikiTree is free, but it's not a free-for-all. Our wiki genealogy community is creating something special: a single, shared family tree that will make genealogy free and accessible for everyone. This grand project requires **mutual trust** and a **common understanding** of how the community works.

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If you were invited by a family member and are just creating or editing a few private family profiles, the following isn't critical. Those who participate at a higher level must agree to this shared code of ethics and principles.

Our Honor Code

- I. We collaborate. When we share ancestors we work together on the same ancestor profiles.
- II. We care about accuracy. We're always aiming to improve upon our worldwide family tree and fix mistakes.

Last Name

III. We know mistakes are inevitable. We don't want to be afraid to make them. We assume that mistakes are unintentional when others make them and ask for the same understanding.

IV. We know misunderstandings are inevitable. We try to minimize them by being courteous to everyone, even those who don't act accordingly.

- V. We respect privacy. We privacy-protect anything we think our family members might not want public. If that's not enough for someone, we delete their personal information.
- VI. We respect copyrights. We don't knowingly copy information that's owned by someone else. If we ourselves want to preserve a copyright, we're clear about what's copyrighted so others don't accidentally copy it.
- VII. We give credit. Although most genealogy isn't copyrighted, researchers deserve credit for the work they've done.
- VIII. We cite sources. Without sources we can't objectively resolve conflicting information
- IX. We are united in a mission to increase the world's common store of knowledge. We always respect copyrights and privacy, but we keep information as free and open as possible.

Anyone registered may collaborate on the combined data for a person, within the constraints of the Trusted lists and Privacy controls for the living.

Profiles, ie people, over 200 years old are considered "open".

This "One World Tree" concept is the same as FamilySearch FamilyTree, WeRelate and Gen-i where the former has no restrictions for updating other than the living, and Gen-i has some controls operated by the profile manager. WeRelate does not allow living people on the site, other than world famous public figures.

WikiTree has a range of privacy options able to be set for the living and those born within the last 200 years. Which make it a good choice for working together with family members wherever they are. Don't panic if a contribution of yours gets deleted. Restore it from the change history!

As for WorldConnect (last newsletter) WikiTree is a great place to refer people to for a quick overview. It has a great range of viewing options.



How can you update it?

By gedcom, then directly online, or just directly online. HINT: best NOT to upload a large gedcom at once, you wont be able to cope with the potential merges that will be highlighted.

Each Gedcom is reviewed at two stages" both by your yourself in the review of the potential duplicates suggested; and by a WikiTree volunteer to ensure it has at least a date for every person and not too many duplicates to be merged with existing people, and that your data is sourced.

I tend to upload small, new, branches of my tree at a time., once my research is reasonably complete, connecting them to existing parents if applicable. Which leaves only minor tweaks for new information to be added manually as necessary

The selection process from my genie program is a great way to revisit data often untouched for years and see what else can be found and documented more fully before publication.

HINT: creating a gedcom and doing a trial upload, without submitting it for the final stage, gives you a



New resources to explore

FindMyPast

Over 1,776,000 UK parish records from the historic county of Nottinghamshire, over 1,500 detailed monumental inscriptions from Norfolk and a fascinating index of newspapers notices from Eastbourne in Sussex. Over 2,600 WW1 officer biographies from both volumes of the British Army Bond of Sacrifice, over 92,000 Parish Marriages from London's Docklands and East End, over 1,400 Derby Railway Servants Orphanage records and substantial new additions to our collection of historic British Newspapers.

Quite a few new Irish resources mentioned in their new blog, including:

Over 1.1 million new newspaper articles, including 10 new titles. The new additions include 4 new Dublin newspapers as well as 3 from Munster, 2 from Connaught and 1 from Ulster.

The Irish Newspaper Collection now stands at over 5.3 million articles and 60 different titles. They cover 152 years (1749-1900) of history in the cities, towns and villages of Ireland.

Ireland, Poverty Relief Loans 1821-1874

The Irish Reproductive Loan Fund was a micro credit scheme set up in 1824 to provide small loans to the 'industrious poor.' Local associations and committees administered the scheme, most often from a small town in a rural area, and county committees oversaw their work. The records of the local associations and county committees are in The National Archives at Kew, reference T91. The majority of the records cover the years 1824 to 1846 across ten counties in Munster and Connacht. Over 700,000 records, Ireland, Poverty Relief Loans 1821-1874 span the period of the Irish Potato Famine and provides unique insight into the lives of those living in Ireland during one of the darkest periods in its history.

UK, Army Registers of Soldiers' Effects, 1901-1929 This database contains records detailing the money owed to soldiers of the British Army who died in service from 1901 to 1929. Records typically include the name of the soldier, his next of kin and their relationship, the date of death and sometimes the place, plus other details.

South Africa, City and Area Directories, 1813-1962

Various sources. In this collection, you'll find a variety details extracted from South African directories for locations from Cape Town to Pretoria. They include residential and business directories, telephone books, local almanacs, and court calendars. Extracted details include names, professions, addresses, dates, and other pieces of information.

November meeting report

Speaker: Michael Gaffaney: Lessons from Ireland - an account of a visit to Ireland to undertake family research and insights from the Back to Our Past conference in Dublin.

Michael did a brief outline of his Gaffaney (Gaffney) family history. Then he gave a report on the programme and lectures of the Back to our Past Conference in Dublin Ireland. He stressed that although many historic records were destroyed in the fire of the Public Records Office in 1922, there are still lots of records available. Some of the records destroyed were: many Parish registers, wills, commissions of enquiries, and some census records. However Michael gave a list of some Strange and Unusual Sources, including (not an exhaustive list): Irish reproduction loan scheme, Register of Trees, Freedom of slaves - Sligo, gamers certificates, voter lists, register of illiterates, whiskey makers tax list, 1796 spinning wheels list (over 2,000 names), hearth tax records, trade directories and Griffiths Valuations.

Michael touched briefly on Genetic Genealogy and gave some rather interesting facts that have come out of this field of research; I in 4 Irish carry the hemochromatosis gene, I in 23 cystic fibrosis gene and the Irish are the most tolerant to milk!
