FamilySearch Family Tree (<u>http://FamilySearch.org/tree</u>)


Need to be registered (free) and logged in.

Very useful for keeping track of source data found when searching records. Yes you can add found records to your shoebox, but why not add them to the correct people in your FamilySearch Family Tree? Easier if you've found, or added, the person before trying to attach the

source as they are then in your history list

To add an unrelated person to the tree/people associated with your account.

- use the top left Tree pull down menu
- click on the Add Unconnected Person at the bottom of the Go To list To jump between people use the Person ID, it will look something like LDLK-M2D



Want an overview of your tree, try out the add-on <u>Puzzilla.org</u>. Has some very useful analyses.

FamilySearch Wiki (http://wiki.familysearch.org/)

Google Image Search

Has anyone had any success identifying photos using Google's Image Search? This article about its uses for genealogy caught my attention

Whereas I'd love to report a great success at identifying a mystery photo from my Nana's album, I did get a chuckle or two out of the results.

The photo I used is of an unidentified young lad looking somewhat startled at being the focus of attention standing against a stone wall on a stony bit of ground. My helpful aunt had tucked a note into the album "a nephew of Grandfather Davidsons name Dodds".

Research indicated that he was probably therefore a son of AgnesRobertson DAVIDSON who married a William DODDS in 1869 at Chirnside (Berwickshire) who had moved to Gateshead sometime between 1874 an 1877. But which one? No clues whatsoever on the photo itself, no studio, no writing, just the photo.

Google firstly reported that none were found of the same size*, and then presented a set of what it considered visually similar results.

I'm sure William, James or John would be rather insulted to find that these included very few humans, but all were similarly coloured (washed out sepia).

I followed the suggestion to add some descriptive words to the search - didn't really help, but it does seem rather likely that very few people will have this photo in their album, let alone posted online anywhere. The example in the article was much more successful. I'll probably try again with other photos, but also try publishing them to my blog, probably to greater effect.

*the uploaded image wasn't actual size, so that wasn't a clue. However in Colleen Fitzpatrick's "The Dead Horse Investigation Forensic Photo Analysis for Everyone" (Rice Brook Press, 2008) she provides information to be gleaned from the shape/size of an original photograph.

FindmyPast

Prisoners of War records 1914-1920are the first in a series of prisoners of War records digitised in conjunction with the National Archives, which will eventually form part of a wider collection to span 1715-1945, dating back to the Jacobite rebellion. **Yorkshire records.** Over 5 million parish records released in conjunction with the Yorkshire Digitisation Consortium, covering 1538-1989. Additions include: Yorkshire baptisms 1538-1914, banns 1653-1930, marriages 1539-1930 and burials 1538-1966.

BillionGraves Cemetry Index records.

BillionGraves is the largest resource of GPC-logged headstone and burial records on the web. Partnership with FMP will make them free to search. Records include the deceased's name, birth and death dates, cemetery, city, county and image link.

Kumara Times Project

Kumera is a settlement on the southern banks of the Taramakau River in Westland between Greymouth and Hokotika. One of the great gold rushes on the West Coast started here in 1876 and within just a couple of years the population had risen to 6000, when it became a Borough..

The *Kumara Times* was first published in 1876 as an afternoon daily and continued for 40 years, covering all the aspects of daily life that are involved with the development of a rural town. It details the political career of Richard John Seddon who was the town's the first Mayor, going on to become the Premier of New Zealand.

The Kumara Times Project aims to digitise tone of New Zeeland's goldfields newspapers and make it available on *Papers Past.*. The only original copies are held by the Hokotika Museum and have been put on microfilm. Two copies exist, the other is held by the National Library.

However only the first 20 years are know to exist (1876-1896) and several copies are missing. The project has to raise \$10,000 and is asking for donations, but is also asking people who have connections with the West Coast around that time to keep an eye open for copies of this rarely-seen newspaper.

So if you are researching goldfields, the *Kumara Times* could give you a good idea of the life and conditions for gold seekers.
