I've been told that starting with a small summary, which you can later flesh out, is a good way to start.

Another idea is to write a small narrative every time you find another fact. For example, you learn from the Kiwi Index that your grandmother Mary started school in 1906. A simple line such as: "*Mary started attending Main school in February 1906. She was in good company, of course, as her two older sisters Ann and*

Jane were already there to keep an eye on her. The down side was that she was probably wearing her sister's "hand-me-downs" with the family being on such a limited income."

And, there you have it, a story is born!

Our guest speaker for the next meeting is Kay Carter, who will be developing this subject further with her talk "Writing stories for your grandchildren". It should really help those of us who are still thinking about it.

The next meeting is also our AGM. To date we have not received any nominations to take on the role of Convenor. After some discussion with the Committee, who have offered to take on some of my duties, I have decided to put myself forward again this year.

One of the duties that we discussed sharing is the chairing of Branch meetings. While I am happy to do this from time to time, I would like other members to participate. Alison Proctor Family History Centre opened April 7th 2008

So who was Alison Proctor?

For those members who did not have the benefit of knowing her, Alison was a long standing member of NZSG and Kapiti Branch, She was first elected to the committee in 1999 and remained an active participant until her death in 2007, having held the positions of Publicity Officer, Newsletter Editor and finally Librarian.

Alison Proctor (nee Elder) was born in Hastings (NZ) in 1931 to Norman and Kathleen Elder. Her father came from Waikanae and Alison travelled with her parents to Britain in 1950, where she met her future husband Ron Proctor. They came back to NZ and were married in Havelock North in 1955.

The Proctors lived overseas for fifteen years and produced three sons before Ron died in 1970. Alison moved back to NZ and to Waikanae in 1978. In 1986 she enrolled as an extra-mural student at Massey and eleven years later completed a her BA degree.

Alison was a dedicated member of the Branch and NZSG. In 2006 she was presented with an NZSG Branch Service award.

The Kapiti Genealogy Menu

Remember that you no longer have to load physical cds.

Simply click on the image of the cd beside the resource you want to view, then click on the title. If there isn't a cd image, just click on the title.

Relocation at the library

The APFHC is located on the ground floor of the Paraparaumu library. Turn right inside the door. The keys for the APFHC cupboard are now being held at the Welcome Desk opposite the entrance.

The desk layout does not allow much space for notes etc. so have your research well organised to make the most of your time. Please replace the cover on the computer when you have finished your research session and lock the keyboard in the cupboard.

Any matters relating to the Genealogy Society should be taken up with a committee member, **not** library staff.

Computer Password at the APFHC

APFHC computer password changes regularly: check the red folder in the drawer. Members need to get the cupboard key from the library Welcome desk. We also request that you sign the blue sign-in book found in the drawer - such statistics help us when applying for grants.

Printer, Paper and Toner

Please remember that you are asked to contribute 10c. per copy for the printing service provided. This amount does not even cover the cost of the toner used.

Where possible you are encouraged to use memory sticks instead to record the results of your research. Remember that if you cannot print, you can usually save your search results to a USB stick, supplies being available for purchase at a bargain price at the Wednesday morning sessions



NZSG News

Revised rules and postal votes

NZSG members will have received the papers for the NZSG AGM including the Agenda and revised set of rules with their April issue of *The New Zealand Genealogist* magazine. Do read them carefully and use your postal vote as the new rule at **12.2 - Branch and Interest Group Local Membership** could have favourable implications for our Branch.

At present only members of NZSG are eligible for the Branch Committee. This new rule will allow members to become Local Members of NZSG at the cost of a levy on the Branch rather than the full subscription. Although they will not get access to NZSG research facilities, it will permit them to be on the Branch Committee. This will give us much more flexibility in attracting members with particular skills to come on to the Committee.

The 49th AGM of NZSG will be held on Sat. June 4th at the ASB Arena, Mt. Maunganui

Postal votes close at 4pm, Friday 20th May 2016. A two-thirds majority of valid votes cast (existing Rule 9.1) is needed for the new rules to be adopted.

Message from local Councillor, Peter Gibson,

"Most NZSG members will be aware that nominations for the 2016-18 Council closed last December with six of seven council positions filled, and no nominations for President or Treasurer. Consequently I was elected (along with others) for 2016-18.

Since then I have decided to seek election as the NZSG Treasurer. I believe I have the background and skills, including 30 years in banking and 13 years as secretary/manager of a nation-wide friendly society, to enable me to fill the role and I ask for members' support in an election for the position at the 2016 AGM in June.

National Library talk

The **Old Friends** site previously operated by Trademe has been closed.

The National Library has taken over the data in this site, but will not be operating the site as an interactive one. Essentially it preserves what was there at the time Trademe closed in just the same way as if you donated a collection of written material to the Library.

Amy Watling talked about the new site, called **Tiaki** Tiaki will replace the site that was used to access the National Library's unpublished collections and will be up and running from January 2016. To gain access you need to register using the digital system Real Me - the same one used for Passports and several other Government agencies. You just need the one password for all. Is a single online ID.

You can register online and order material to be waiting for you when you arrive. If you are seeking restricted material you can request an appointment online and the time will be confirmed. This does not apply to Archives where I waited 45 minutes for some records. But they do have a good cafe which makes up for the delay! A visit to Archives fits in well with the Midday talk at the National Library, as you can go to Archives after the talk and still have time to catch the train before 3pm.
