What's new?

FindMyPast has announced the launch of their **Six Counties in Six Months** project which will see the online publication of vital parish records from six counties across England over the next six months.

First up is Wiltshire's parish records published to mark the opening of Who Do You Think You Are Live! 2017. The Wiltshire parish records will be followed by Berkshire, Buckinghamshire, Nottinghamshire, Somerset and Warwickshire.

The Wiltshire collection comprises transcriptions of nearly 5 million parish records of baptisms, banns, marriages and burials dating back to 1538. They form the largest online collection of Wiltshire records available. They are full of fascinating details of life through the ages. Anyone can go online and search for their Wiltshire ancestors by name, location and date.

Ancestry has just released the Metropolitan Police Registers from 1852-1932. They contain birth and marriage records and, from 1923, details about spouses.

Papers past. Jenny Martin has passed on information from Emmerson Vandy that the following will be added to Papers Past from late April:

Manawatu Times (1924-1928); Patea Mail (1921-1941); Pelorus Guardian and Miners' Advocate (1911-1919); Rangitikiei Advocate and Manawatu Argus (1907-1920); Southern Cross (1893-1935); Waihi Daily Telegraph (1924-1935) and Western Star (1873-1920.

The following snippets come from the GenealogyInTime_Magazine.

If you haven't found it yet, do look. It has some really interesting articles.

FindMyPast has created a collection of 37,000 **University of New Zealand Graduate records** spanning the years 1870-1963. Records include name of graduate, year, university and degree. Access is by subscription from Historic University of New Zealand Student Records.

France – Family Search has indexed some 600,000 records from the Saone-et-Loire census of 1876. This district (or department to use the formal French name) is near Burgundy between the Saone and Loire Rivers. The collection covers part of modern-day Burgundy.

This was a population census. It lists the name, address, gender, age, marital status, occupation and nationality of every household member. The collection can be searched by first name, last name, gender and marital status. Access is free. Saone-et-Loire 1876 Census

US – The Danish National Archives has just launched a free new website to commemorate the day 100 years ago when the Dutch transferred the Territory of the Virgin Islands over to the United States. The website is called Danish West Indies - Sources of History.

Known as the Danish West Indies or Danish Antilles, it consisted of the islands of Saint Thomas, Saint John and Saint Croix. The Dutch West Indies (1754-1917) was transferred to the United States on 31 March 1917. This new website contains some 5 million images of original documents, maps and drawings related to the time when the Dutch controlled the islands. More than 150 volunteers have been working on digitizing these records for genealogical research. It is a treasure trove for anyone looking for ancestral records, including slave records.

New Zealand, Kapiti, Legacy Users Group

If you are new to genealogy, Legacy is a database programme which is owned by Millennia Corporation, the commercial arm of the Later Day Saints. It is based in Arizona, USA, has a staff of 12 and turns over about 2.5million(US) dollars a year.

The Legacy programme is: based on Microsoft Access (MS database programme); is straight forward to use; free to download; and appears only on your computer (not on an online genealogy website (Ancestry etc.)

People come to our meetings from as far away as Palmerston North, Wellington and the Hutt Valley. 25- 40 attend each of our meetings. Attendees bring their own laptop so as they can follow and practice what is being demonstrated. If a person doesn't have a laptop they sit next to someone who has, so no one misses out.

Because of the distances some people travel to the meetings, the doors open at 12:30p.m. and we have a cuppa before we start. You can bring lunch and eat it in the hall before the meeting. Cost for each meeting is \$2.00 to cover the hall hire, tea, coffee, milk, council cordial and biscuits.

DNA

Ancestry/FamilyTreeMaker/RootsMagic/MacKiev

You may recall an initial announcement back in Dec 2015, along with subsequent updates about Ancestry retiring their FamilyTreeMaker software.

As with all such software changes, things take time.

The software world continues to evolve.

Ancestry have also now announced that as at 29th March 2017 the ability to synchronise your Ancestry tree with FamilyTreeMaker will cease (the initial announcement was to I Jan 2017). And so it seems to have done so.

Two companies were announced as having an ability to access your Ancestry online trees, MacKiev, who have taken over the supply and support of FamilyTreeMaker software, and RootsMagic. At the moment, they are the only two licensed to use the new interface being developed.

Neither have quite made it yet, but progress is being made. The latest announcements from these companies are:

None of the above means that your existing FamilyTreeMaker program will stop working on your desktop, nor that your tree on Ancestry can't be added to. But if you wish to continue synchronising between desktop and ancestry, you need to consider the alternatives. This can include simply using the Ancestry app to have a copy on your tablet/ipad http://www.ancestry.com/cs/ancestry-app

Not that I recommend only having an online tree. Your data is too precious to have only one copy, and that at the whim of the service provider. Keep your master copy in the program of choice on your computer with lots of backups, including off site ones separate from your computer/location.
