Australasian Federation of Family History Organisations congress (AFFHO)  
16-20 January 2009  
Kings College, Auckland  
The New Zealand Society of Genealogists is hosting this congress, which is held every three years. It will replace the Queen's Birthday conference in 2009.

The theme is Preserving the past for the future, and there are four streams: Migration, History, Technology and Preservation. Over four days there will be 14 lectures in each stream, as well as eight plenary lectures and a number of two-hour workshops.

#### Introducing . . . . Liz Matthews

My ancestors' photos hung on the walls when I was growing up in Canada: grandparents in oval portraits, and family groups in my father's study, with one grumpy looking great-great grandmother relegated to an upstairs room.

My mother did a lot of family history research in the 1970s, writing to a researcher in England and searching local land titles. She drew family trees in pencil on pieces of roller blind fabric, easily rolled and kept handy to the table where they could be spread out. She helped establish a local archives in the town where my parents both lived for nearly all their lives, and was a volunteer there for more than 20 years. I'd heard from her about the importance of acid-free boxes before I left school (but I still haven't got any).

A few years ago I discovered genealogy websites and used them to try to extend her records. Through a surname forum I "met" a sixth cousin. That's when my husband said he didn't even know where his grandparents were buried. Just the challenge I needed!

In the last nine months I've been working near the National Library and the Archives, and I've spent some (okay, most) of my lunch hours reading microfiche and searching New Zealand databases. I've found his grandparents and great-grandparents, and I'm now trying to

pinpoint which counties in England, Scotland and Ireland that immigrant generation came from, so I can go back further. I try to fill in the gaps for my own family too.

When the August branch meeting is on, I'll be in Canada visiting my mother for her birthday (she's turning 84). These days talking on the phone with her can be a bit tricky, because her short-term memory is not so good.

Fortunately, she remembers enough about our family history for it to be a continuing topic for discussion. It's great for me to have someone to enthuse with about small discoveries, and she's delighted that her research is being carried on.

Over 15 million parish burial records and memorial inscriptions are available to view at [www.findmypast.com](http://www.findmypast.com), with a total of seven million baptism, marriage and probate records being made available online later this year. Parish records from over 1000 parishes across

Britain are being added to the existing collection of online family history records, offering access to baptism, marriage and burial records dating back to 1538.
