# **Oral History Workshops**

The Oral History Centre of the Alexander Turnbull Library is offering workshops for people considering using oral history in their work, community or personal projects. The workshops are taught by Judith Fyfe and held at the Wellington Girls' College Library.

#### Day 1: Introduction to Oral History, Saturday 11 September 8.45 am to 4.30pm

An introduction to oral history methodology. How to plan an oral history project, choose the best equipment, achieve clear audio recordings, select informants, follow ethical procedures, develop questioning techniques, process oral history and make the material available for use.

Exercises to be completed before Day 2 will be discussed. Fee: \$150 (\$110 unwaged) Limit: 14.

#### Day 2: Recording Seriously, Saturday 16 October 8.45 am to 4.30pm

Recording Seriously builds on Day 1, reviewing work completed and covering in more detail interview techniques, equipment standards, project planning and ethical and legal issues. Some experience in recording or processing oral history is necessary. Completion of an earlier essentials course or a recent equivalent introductory course is required.

#### New NZSG Councillor



Acting as the agent for our parent body, Kapiti Branch has been granted a trademark for YURU, by the Intellectual Property Office of New Zealand. ### Introducing . . . committee member Lyn Lee

Lyn says: I had been vaguely collecting bits of family information as it came my way for about ten or fifteen years, when in 2000 we decided to have a GOE (Geriatric Overseas Experience). We were going to go and live and work in the UK for an indeterminate period, but we guessed somewhere between one and three years.

While there I contacted Spurgeon's Orphanage in London, where my father had been sent at the age of ten after his father had abandoned the family, and his mother had died. Spurgeons had sent him to New Zealand at the age of fifteen, to work on a farm in the Waikato, and I wanted to find the reason for this decision. They were not able to give me a plausible explanation, but I did find the house in East Ham, London where he was born.

We returned to New Zealand in 2003, then in 2005/6 we went to work in Timor Leste for eighteen months, and while there, with time on my hands in the evenings, I started to do some research on the net. Then I was hooked!!! When I retired and we shifted to Waikanae, I joined this branch of the NZSG, and have now joined the committee to give a little back. I enjoy helping out at the Alison Procter Family History Centre on occasional Wednesday mornings, and nearly always learn a little bit more for myself.

# Pub Charity support continues

Our thanks go to the charitable trust Pub Charity, which continues to be a major supporter of branch activities. As announced in the July newsletter, the most recent grant of \$8300 was to support our negotiations with NZGDB for a two-year subscription.

Over the past five years, Pub Charity has contributed nearly \$30,000 to the branch. This has helped us with major upgrades to our PC suite at the Alison Procter Family Research Centre and allowed us to get a new data projector which has vastly improved presentations at the Kapiti Community Centre.

Another grant allowed us to purchase the NZ Gazette Archive, the official monthly publication of the New Zealand Government which goes back to the early 1840s. It can be viewed at all three Kapiti Coast District libraries, including at the Alison Procter Family History Centre. Pub Charity has also been a substantial supporter of national NZSG activities.

Ancestry.com has today released probate calendars for most English and Welsh wills between 1861 and 1941. This collection forms an index to wills and probate records for this period, and information found there is:

- probate date
- full name of the deceased
- death date
- · death place
- registry where issued.

The library edition of Ancestry.com is available free at all three branches of Kapiti Coast District Libraries, and at the Alison Procter Family History Centre.
