Well, the best laid schemes of mice and men! The Official Opening of the new New Zealand Society of Genealogists was due to take place in Auckland on 22nd February 2002 by the Governor-General, Dame Sylvia Cartwright, but, as she welcomed the Queen that day, she has had to defer this undertaking. However, the NZSG held an unofficial opening on that day (it will be all over by the time you get this) and members are invited to look around the new premises anyway. The Official Opening will take place at a later date to be advised.

THE NEW ZEALAND REGISTRY OFFICE (BDM)

It was a big shock to leam of the increased prices for an "inspection only" copy of Birth, Death or Marriage Certificates last October, jumping from \$9 to \$30, which is now the cost of all Certificates. For those of you who are members of the New Zealand Society of Genealogists, the November/December 2001 issue of "The New Zealand Genealogist" gave a great deal of information on alternative sources on what is available to members through the various NZSG services as well as other sources outside NZSG, such as newspapers and church records. It strongly suggests that all members should boycott the BDM records, and calls on them to add to the NZSG files by sending copies of their Certificates, (not all of which refer to their own research, as we know that sometimes we get copies that don't "belong") that may help someone else. Who knows, you might possibly find another link to your own chain in doing this!

A CAUTIONARY TALE

Although genealogy programs for PCs were not available, even in Eric Linklater's own lifetime (he died in 1978), they are today and such a (literally) fatal outcome could be avoided!

From the autobiography of Eric Linklater "The Man on My Back" (1941): "Great-grandmother Dodd had a first-cousin called Boys who, having been a civil engineer, retired in middle life and devoted his remaining energy to the discovering of his ancestors. He laboured long, and finally - except for a worrying lacuna during the War of the Roses - he succeeded in tracing his descent from the Countess Judith, a niece of William the Conqueror; and then disaster fell upon him. He got a new housekeeper, a tidy woman, and while he was away from home searching in graveyard and parish register for the innominate Boys who should fill up the hole in his argument, she made a fine spring-cleaning in his house. He came back to find that she had burnt all his papers; and a little while later he died of a broken heart."

Well? Wouldn't you? Seems to me to be a good argument for keeping your genealogy data on computer (properly backed-up, of course!)

GI ADIS

Archives New Zealand is moving away from its traditional paper-based finding airds and into the 21st century, with the launch of an automated documentation system called GLADIS (Government Locator Archival Documentation and Information System). It will be built over the next five years and will cost \$7.6 million.

GLADIS will complement the recently commissioned ELMS (Electronic List Management System) and will also provide the documentation base needed to support inte/dependencies between Archives and agency systems in the creation and management of electronic records.
