Branch Resources "Wish List"

The Committee is always on the look-out for suitable new resources to add to our Branch collection located upstairs at Paraparaumu Library. In general it is genealogically-specific material that is sought, in the form of CDs, fiche, or books, and ideally if the material itself is not an index, then at least it must include a good index. NZ material tends to get priority of attention, closely followed by Australian and British/Irish, although for non-New Zealand material the strong emphasis is on the references being general/national rather than being local (e.g. In the British Isles alone there are some 110 Counties, and those interested in one or two of those Counties are better advised to directly join the Family History Societies of those particular Counties).

A "Wish List" of prospective acquisitions is maintained, and periodically the Committee either simply purchases items out of Branch Funds, or, submits concisely worded grant applications to various Trusts set up for that purpose. We

are given to understand that, in general, Trustees are more likely to look with favour on applications for funding to purchase New Zealand material, rather than overseas material. Although most of the items on the Wish List have been suggested by Committee Members, in fact any Branch Member may, at any time, submit suggested items to go on to the List.

The Committee expects to be prioritising the List at its March Meeting, so if Branch Members have in mind anything that they would like to have considered, would they please send in their *submissions by 28th February.

* "Wish List" submissions should be made on paper or by email, and must be precise and specific. Required is (1) The exact name/title (2) The form - CD?, fiche? Book? (3) Any Code/Reference Number, or ISBN (4) The current costs, in any major currency (5) The full email/snailmail address from which it may be obtained.

Digitisation of 1901 and 1911 Irish Censuses

Minister for Arts, Sport & Tourism, John O'Donoghue TD, will announce on Tuesday 6th December 2005 a ground-breaking cultural agreement between the National Archives of Ireland and Library and Archives Canada, which will see the Irish Census Records for 1901 and 1911 digitised, indexed and placed online for free access by the 70 million Irish diaspora around the world, from December 2006.

Library and Archives Canada, the leading experts in the cutting-edge archival digitisation process involved, anticipate strong interest in Canada where 13% of the population claim Irish ancestry. A similar online release in recent years of Canadian Census Returns evoked a huge response.

A fascinating first-hand record and evidence of their forebears' household, family, social circumstances and location one hundred years ago will be available to view online and download to anyone from December 2006, when the first phase comprising the Dublin Census Records 1911 will be released. The Records detail the name, age, sex, marital status, occupation, county and country of birth of everyone listed in every domestic dwelling, prison, hospital, industrial school etc, including their literacy level, ability to speak Irish, the number of years women were married and total number of children born.

The 3-year digitisation project will ultimately allow anyone in the world to search for an Irish ancestor with minimal basic information, quickly and efficiently, and view a myriad of contextual historical information and imagery on contemporaneous events. Currently, records can only be seen at

the National Archives in Dublin and searches are manual, can be cumbersome, and require specific information prior to searching.

At the agreement/signing, the Minister remarked, 'Our records hold precious insights into Irish family history for millions at home and abroad - we hope this service in collaboration with our Canadian partners will connect many people globally to their cultural roots.' Ian Wilson, Head of Library and Archives Canada, commented, 'We share an ethos with the Irish Government of free access for all to their heritage and we welcome this opportunity to use our expertise in connecting even more Canadians to their history.' Notes about the Irish Census

The 1901 census is the earliest surviving government census for the thirty-two counties of Ireland. The 1911 census also survives in its entirety. The first full government census of Ireland was taken in 1821 with further censuses at ten-yearly intervals from 1831 through to 1911. The original census returns for 1861 and 1871 were destroyed shortly after the censuses were taken. Those for 1881 and 1891 were pulped during the First World War, probably because of the paper shortage. The returns for 1821, 1831, 1841 and 1851 were, apart from a few survivals, notably for a few counties for 1821 and 1831, destroyed in 1922 in the fire at the Public Record Office. The census returns for 1901 and 1911 are now the most frequently used archives in the National Archives, accounting for approximately 40% of our productions

British Censuses (i.e. England & Wales, plus Scotland)

The digitised, online, and free, access to the 1901 and the 1911 Irish Censuses (as outlined above) can only be described as being excellent news.

For England & Wales the 1851, 1861, 1871, 1881, 1891 and 1901 Censuses (1841 is expected in the next few months) are already digitised, online, and free, via the ancestry.com website, although it is first necessary for individuals to become paid-up subscribers to be able to make use of it. However, there is fully free access via the screens in the National Library Wellington, and as I myself make use of these on a regular weekly basis, I would be happy to follow up specific requests from Branch Members submitting our GenForum Forms (see this Newsletter, page 1, top of the 2nd column). Please allow me a few weeks processing-time.

For Scotland, I am not aware of any process of obtaining digitised, online, and free access, but would be delighted if someone were to be able to advise me otherwise. Of course their 1881 Census continues to be available within the set of LDS "1881 British Census" CDs located with our Branch Resources in the steel cabinet at Paraparaumu Library.

LDS Church to put Microfilmed Records Online
