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KAPITI MICROFICHE HOLDINGS

New members might not be aware of the amount of information held by the Kapiti Genealogical group on microfiche. I recently delved into the box marked "New Zealand Miscellaneous" to find so much information on:- Government and Gazette lists, which included New Zealand Public School Teachers 1907, Public Service Appointments 1912-1927, Sheepowners Returns (yes, my grandfather was mentioned!). In the Military section were NZ contingents to the Boer War as well as WWI and WWII. There is guite a bit on Otago and Southland Settlers, and also Public Trust (1901) and Death Duty registers (1867-1914) for Canterbury. Petitions to Parliament for 1854-1975, Machinery and Mining Accidents. And so much more. I was hunting the Shipping Records, but most of these were prior to 1890, and I am trying to find what ship my grandmother came out on. It would have to be late 1891 or early 1892. The microfiche gave me where to find some of the shipboard diaries for that time frame, giving me another avenue to pursue.

The Australia and the United Kingdom are not forgotten, as New South Wales and Victoria and the Southern British counties are prominent. Scotland and Ireland are also mentioned. Then the Internation Genealogical Index for 1988 is there, too. This means you can borrow a microfiche and study this information at leisure in your own home.
