Introducing . . . Hanley Hoffmann, Kapiti Branch convenor

Thank you all for your welcoming messages and congratulations, and to the committee for their having the confidence to take me on.

As an Australian, and thoroughly hooked on family history, I have to say "there are no convict felons sitting like crows in my family tree" (Robert Hughes in *The Fatal Shore*). My ancestors were German (Hoffmann), Welsh (Lewis), Irish (O'Reilly), British (Beasley), and as I said, there are no convicts in my background. I don't have that outback accent that many tend to think is typically Australian.

But many of my ancestors are as elusive as anyone else's. My grandfather Hoffmann was illegitimate, born in 1877 and registered under my great-grandmother's name, and he possibly had a sister likewise, before my great-grandparents married seven years later in 1884. They went on to have eight more children after marriage.

There were no convicts transported into South Australia. Its first settlers were German Lutherans and Catholics all fleeing from an oppressive Tsar in the mid-1800s. My Hoffmann line was Catholic but that obviously did not make any difference to the way my greatgrandfather behaved. He was also, I am sure, an alcoholic and probably the reason for the long lead time in his getting married! I suspect Maria Amelia Kirchner's parents were not amused by his getting their daughter in the family way twice, and into the third pregnancy they must have relented. Johann Hoffmann and Maria Amelia Kirchner married just three months before their third child was born.

Getting started with your family history research

Saturday and Sunday, 19-20 September, 9am to 5pm, Masonic Hall, 10 Tararua Street, Paraparaumu, \$40 for two days. Tutor: Lynne Blake, Educator, Family Research Centre NZSG

Registrations have started to roll in for this two-day course, so get yours in now to avoid missing out. Not just for beginners, the course will also benefit those who have been researching family history for many years. It introduces (or reminds us of) research skills for family history. While many people use the internet as their primary research tool, it's still important to understand the development of records and different research methods to get the best out of your research time.

The course helps with questions such as:

- Where do you start to answer your questions?
- What are you looking for and why? (What are your questions?)
- Where might you find what you are looking for?
- How do you record this information when you find it?
- Where do you file all this information?

We also explore using your computer

- What genealogical programmes are available?
- How can you use them for recording?

Then we look at what to do when you have all that information.

- Share it on the net?
- Write your 'Family History' book?

Members' interests survey

We ask you to list the family surnames you are researching, along with districts and countries of origin, and timelines, but this is, of course, voluntary. The information goes on our website, and on information boards at the Alison Procter Family History Centre and at monthly meetings. However, the names of members providing the information are coded to satisfy the Privacy Act.

Jill Palmer, who has worked in genealogy research support at Salt Lake City, gave us a guided tour of the LDS www.familysearch.org website, and news of the way the website is going to be expanding, making it even more useful. You can now find indexes for the censuses for England and Wales from 1841 and 1861 in the website's record search pilot area. They link to findmypast.com to show the actual images – and it's free. Historical books are being digitised now, with some 29,000 books already able to be read through the site, and many more to come. The library link also allows you to watch videos of research classes offered at Salt Lake City.
