Convenor's comment

The NZSG AGM and conference was held in Christchurch over Queen's Birthday Weekend. There was a ballot for President and council positions which is a good sign as the Society faces enormous challenges. The new president is David Bryant (Auckland), a councillor for several years and convenor of the Genealogical Computing Group. The Treasurer is Bob Matthews, and the council members are: Joseph Gillard (Auckland), Pauline Miller (Alexandra), Lynne Blake (Auckland), Noeline Verheyen (Auckland), Janet Connochie (Christchurch), Barbara Wyley (Kaitaia) and Brenda Joyce (Wellington).

Constitutional amendments passed have major implications for branches. To be in line with

the parent body and comply with the new Charities Commission Act and IRD requirements (many community and voluntary organisations are tax liable from 2009), the financial year of branches will be from April 1 (previously October 1). NZSG has been granted charity status and is thus tax exempt. Now the amendment is in place, branches can also apply for charity status. NZSG will be submitting a bulk application for branches who wish to proceed down this path and we have asked to be included.

Your committee will seek approval of NZSG members at a Special General Meeting to be held in October (which would have been an AGM before the new requirement), for the consequential changes required. This includes a new date for the Annual General Meeting in early 2009, ratification of the subscription arrangements for what will be an extended period and a proposed carryover for the currently elected committee until the new AGM date.

July will be focus month for NZSG. We will be alerting our associate members to the advantages of full membership to include the parent body with its vast resources and services. At our July monthly meeting, senior NZSG personnel will hold a special session to answer your queries and explain what is available.

Member Interests

There was a good response from members interested in having details of their family enquiries and research experience listed for sharing with other members. The 2008 listing is now on our website, a copy posted at the Alison Procter Family History Centre, Paraparaumu Library, and on the Branch Research Officer's notice board at monthly meetings. Each listing is prefixed with a number. If you wish to follow this up, contact the Research Officer who will put you in touch with the member concerned.

Computer Corner with Sue Greene

At our July meeting, Bill Carter will be doing a demo on interviewing relatives. Below are some questions that you may find helpful if you get the chance to meet with relatives.

- ☐ What is your full name? Did you have a nickname?
- ☐ When and where were you born?

- How did your family come to live there?
- □ Were there other family members in the area? Who?
- What is your earliest childhood memory?
- What was school like for you as a child? What were your best and worst subjects? Where did you attend school? College?
- What school activities and sports did you participate in?
- What was your religion growing up? What church, if any, did you attend?
- Who was the oldest relative you remember as a child? What do you remember about them?
- What do you know about your family surname?
- Is there a naming tradition in your family, such as always giving the firstborn son the name of his paternal grandfather?
- Are there any special heirlooms, photos, bibles or other memorabilia that have been passed down in your family?
- □ What was the full name of your spouse? Siblings? Parents?

Family History magazines collection

In the Alison Procter Family History Centre, upstairs at Paraparaumu Library, is to be found our growing collection of Family History magazines. Being on open shelving, these may be freely accessed by anyone and everyone any time during library hours but, being for "Reference Only", the magazines cannot be borrowed. Together they contain vast amounts of Family History material, much of it localised to specific geographic areas, and they make for absorbing reading.

Several are national magazines (Family Tree Magazine, Australian Family Tree Connections, Irish Roots) and these may be subscribed to through our Round Robin system. Nearly all

through our Round Robin system. Nearly all the rest are produced by various Family History Societies located mainly in Britain. Many members of those societies have donated back-issue magazines to us, and it is these magazines that are on shelf.

For people with whose ancestors came from Britain, if the matching geographic area magazines can be found, then it is an investment of time to read all of them from cover to cover, no matter how old the magazines may be. The solution to one of your long outstanding research problems may be sitting on shelf just waiting for you to read about it. If pertinent information for one of your research lines is there, it matters not whether the magazine was published in 2008, 1998, 1988, or even earlier.

Inevitably some of the information will be stale or irrelevant to today's reader, but other information is timeless, as I was to find when sorting the Essex FHS magazines into date order. In the Feb 1990 issue (Pages 28-30)

there was a fascinating article on British World War II "National Registration Identity Cards". I still have mine (and my Mum's), just in case!

The range of magazines is continually expanding, but listed below are the areas currently covered, plus the dates quoted in brackets being the first and last years in the run. There is no guarantee that the run is unbroken.
