
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Editorial

Gerard's Genealogy Journey

My interest in genealogy and family history goes back many years. I started life in Ireland and migrated to New Zealand as a child in the 60's. A number of the pupils at school were also immigrants or children of immigrants mainly from Europe but also a few from the Pacific and Australia.

Whilst in Ireland I remember a radio programme on a Sunday in which people could ask questions about their family names and where they might have come from. My father or his sister had enquired about our surname and that of my grandmother. These names (Denton and Pitt) were not very common in Ireland. Both were very English with several Lords and Earls having the surname Pitt. There was also a story my father told of some weavers from the town of Denton outside Manchester coming to Ireland in the 1600's and adopting the surname, Denton.

The New Zealand connection came on my mother's side. During the 1920's some of her family had settled here in Auckland. We had contact with members of this family when we moved here. I remember my mother's first cousin having old photo albums and talking to my parents about them and the people in them. I had little interest at the time, but this set the stage for a desire to find out more.

During the 80s and 90s I dabbled into some genealogy reference books (GDR) in the library. This tended to be self taught and haphazard. I made some charts, including pedigree and family charts, which I sent with questions to relatives in Ireland to try and expand. The replies gave me a few children of the current generation, but limited knowledge going back.

I had joined NZSG but it was not until moving to Kapiti that I joined a local group. I have found the community aspect of the branch encouraging. The regular interactions provide knowledge and support as well as some interesting local history.

In 2016, the extended family of my mother, siblings, their children and grandchildren were celebrating with a nephew and his wife who had been married overseas and were meeting the family in New Zealand. We gathered for a picnic lunch near my father's favourite fishing spot. It was a momentous occasion – that year was 50years since we had arrived in New Zealand; the reason we were in New Zealand, and not some other country, was that some of the earlier family had visited Ireland for my mother's parent's 50th wedding anniversary and had spoken about how great it was to live in New Zealand.

I prepared a poster, for each of my siblings and their families, covering the 6 generations of my parents, their parents, grandparents; my siblings and partners, their children with partners and children. This has been a useful reference chart.

At this stage I know further research will be required from New Zealand, Australia, Ireland, England, Scotland, Netherlands, USA, and Canada. Being retired now and with access to resources not readily available in the 1980s I hope to be able to unravel some of the stories of people in the wider family.

We have really enjoyed running the NZKLUG and have all learnt a lot ourselves, so what's changed? **For me,** I retired from full time work towards the end of last year. Putting the PowerPoint presentations together for each meeting also takes up a lot of time.



Changes to Archives NZ reading room services

From Monday 2 March 2020, the opening hours for our reading rooms with be changing. Our new hours will be 9am – Ipm for our Auckland, Wellington, Christchurch and Dunedin reading rooms. This change does not impact on our remote research services. To help make research time more efficient, we will be halving the retrieval time to a 30-minute turnaround in Wellington, to align with our regional offices.

Reducing reading room hours allows us to put our energy into digitising records and making them available online. This provides better access for a greater number of users. The work is well underway with the June 2019 launch of our new website and the work of our Digitisation Programme now in its third year of operation. Since 2017, we've made available over 385,000 digitised items, comprised of over 6 million images.

I understand that this announcement will be disappointing to some of our supporters. It has been a hard decision to make but one that will support long-term benefits for all our valued users.

A microfiche is available. You are encouraged to save the results of your searches on a USB memory stick or send them to your own email address. We have a printer if you wish to print a hard copy.
