DNA news from Wellington Open Day

How many of you interested in exploring DNA went to the Wellington Open Day for Family History Month on the 5th August?

If you missed any or all of Michelle Patient's talks you missed a treat. Michelle is a very informative, entertaining speaker. She covered the basics, plus some more advanced topics throughout the day.

Two thoughts to ponder on that really caught my attention as a timely reminder:

Michelle asked how often we researched: every day/week/month/6 months/year - and pointed out to us that we are hardly the typical DNA tester (especially on Ancestry). So don't get frustrated if you don't get an instant response - the majority only log in or research once a year! (It seems many of those who test on Ancestry, lured by the ads about swapping your lederhosen for a kilt etc, are completely disappointed with the immediately obvious results, such as ethnicity regions that don't reflect what they think they know, and don't know about the wealth of additional information that can be gleaned. So they give up and never come back. Lorna)

Also, think about your target audience when formatting your contact message.

The vast majority are young and using mobile devices - phones/ small screen tablets. They will not answer long messages with many questions in them.

Keep it short and simple, one question per contact!

Locally, we have our two monthly group where you can come along to learn more.

My Family History Journey

I lay still, silent; my hands were motionless as I looked into the face of the wee five-year-old boy staring at me. He wanted to play and had no interest in my life. See I was, he thought, in my twilight years. Having outlived all my family members who was left to be concerned with my history?

When I was young I had a most interesting life in Scotland. Being looked after and cared for, despite the ups and downs of family life on a small landholding in Lochwinnoch to the south west of Glasgow. We moved to Glasgow when work on the land became beyond us and the big city offered greater opportunities for work.

But the world was to change dramatically with unrest in Europe leading to the First World War, after which I journeyed to the other side of the world and settled in New Zealand. While opportunities in our new land abounded, times were tough. There were many changes in my life and not only did those around me have little interest in my history but the future was bringing all sorts of new things that seemed to consume everyone. The past was the past and it seemed that was how it would stay

The great depression and another war brought many challenges for my family and created a culture of only wanting to look forward. Who could blame them?

As I aged, I yearned for someone to share my history and our family's story. Then one day the same boy, now in his teens, again looked into my face. This time it was different, there was a glint in his eye. I just knew that within this boy an interest in our family history was growing. Just maybe I would have the time to be that link with the past. But again this was not to be and my almost sedentary life continued. We moved towns in New Zealand and even younger family members arrived on the scene. I despaired, thinking that our family history would be lost forever.

I was frozen in time. When my guardian passed away, I was bequeathed to the youngest bloodline in our family. As I lay there motionless, again this man looked into my face. I recognized him as the young boy I had met all those years ago. I sensed that his interest in our family history had intensified. I seemed to be the catalyst for him wanting to start his journey of research into our family history.

His first revelation was to find out that I was indeed a lot older than he had thought. He was stunned that I was I57 years old, but realized that this was why I was so still - my hands motionless, my face aged yet grand, my body worn but majestic, my inner being in great heart. I was ready to recommence my life's journey.

A visit to the watchmaker saw me back to my old self. A nice cover protected my face of character and my hands were once again set in motion. I was to be the link for bringing to life our family history.

You see this boy, now a man, had seen in me, albeit later than I would have liked, a rich history, a sense of worth and the need to understand where he had come from. He wanted to immerse himself in researching our family history.

My great grandfather's pocket watch is wound every day now and sits at my side as I research and reflect on my family history. I wish I had started this journey earlier, but I know those who have passed before me will be pleased, and maybe having a wee chuckle, as they look down and see my family history discoveries.

National Library Tour

Guided Tour of National Library New Zealand Thursday 28th September, Starting at 10.30am Meeting in the Foyer Corner of Molesworth Street and Aitken Street, Wellington.

If you would like to take a guided tour of National Library New Zealand, then this is your opportunity. This tour is suitable for both experienced and not so experienced genealogists. You may be surprised just what is held there.

The tour is approximately I hour in duration. It will give a general overview of National Library NZ, with a focus on Genealogy and Family History. A moderate amount of walking and standing will be involved.

We recommend that the group takes the 9.00am train from Waikanae (9.05 Paraparaumu). It is a short walk to Molesworth St from Wellington Station (slightly uphill). You can use your Gold Card from 9.00am (return voyage by 3pm). Of course you can use private transport. A day-rover fare is \$14.00 if you do not have a gold card.

After the tour you can stay and do some research. You may take your bags with you on the tour and into the General Reading Room. However if visiting the Alexander Turnbull Library collections in the Katherine Mansfield Reading Room, no bags, coats, food, drink, or pens are allowed (pencils provided). Your belongings can be left free of charge in the lockers provided. You may take photos (without flash).

The café is located on the Ist floor, so you can stay and have lunch if you wish. In preparation for the tour, it may be useful to visit http://www.natlib.govt.nz

YURU takes on a new direction

YURU has a new format in one of the essential "industries" of the Kapiti Coast - its retirement villages.

Why You Are You (YURU), is a trademarked family history promotion and branding activity of NZSG for which, until 2014, Kapiti Branch had the agency. Starting in 2008, YURU productions saw national celebrities present the story of their family history to live audiences in Kapiti and Wellington, marketing the activities of the Branch and its national body.

Co-producers Sue Greene and Clive Palmer have given this activity a new lease of life centred in local retirement villages, establishing family history in Winara, Coastal Villas and Charles Fleming Villages.

Clive and Sue give regular presentations to residents and support personnel, setting up small groups where one-on-one assistance can be given. Some residents have joined the Branch, others are using the Wednesday or Saturday help sessions at APFHC. But some residents no longer drive and another group do not wish to, or cannot, join external activities, so in-house help is very welcome.

Sue for example is helping a 100 year old lady put her family story together and Clive is assisting a resident who finds it difficult to leave the unit because of an ill spouse. In most cases there is a strong desire to sort out the family history to pass on to the next generation and some members have us in contact with sons and daughters.

The next step is to expand the activity to other retirement villages in the area and possibly beyond.
