Thanks to those who shared their DNA stories at the last Branch meeting. See pages 3 and 6 for more.

Since that meeting I have received the results of a DNA test from my very sceptical husband, who is Irish.

Rumour has it that grandfather Jolley had 16 children and died intestate. He must have been a wealthy man owning several farms managed by various sons because on his death, said sons apparently sold off what assets they could lay their hands on and skipped the country. Consequently, I was expecting several American Jolley cousins to appear amongst the DNA matches, but there wasn't a Jolley, Jolly, Joli or Jolie to be found!

I emailed the first person on the matches list and had a very interesting email by return from a lady in Australia. We tried several avenues but were unable to find where the match could have originated.

However, when she found my mother-in-law's maiden name was Hawkins she said her second cousin was married to a Hawkins from the same county in Ireland. We exchanged relevant photos and the family likeness is unmistakeable.

She was able to tell me that many English families, including hers, migrated to Ireland as tenants of the Earls Fitzwilliam, in the 1700s. I found Hawkins' amongst them in the Tythe

Appointment Books for 1827. Sadly, that does not explain the Ozzie lady's DNA connection with my husband!

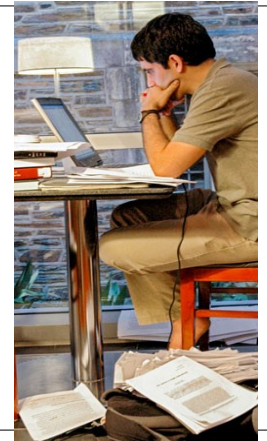

Stories from the June monthly meeting

At our June meeting members were encouraged to share their DNA finds. This resulted in a variety of presentations showing that genetic genealogy has many different aspects that appeal.

Clive Palmer's fascination was with the patterns of people migration back in archaeological time, which can be determined by branches of the yDNA tree.

yDNA - the direct father's line testing needs a direct male line descendant of the family of interest, and tends to be much further back in timeframes. This test is only offered by FamilyTreeDNA.

Ian Brooking's summary of the Brooking Surname Project was the project's use of yDNA testing of Brooking families to group - or not as the case may be - different lines. Many of these lines have already been extensively researched by members of the Brooking Society.

The remaining three members concentrated on more recent timeframes with autosomal DNA results - this being the test able to be taken by anyone, male or female, that provides matches to your "cousins" up to 4-6 generations back with some certainty, but often further.

This is FamilyTreeDNA's FamilyFinder test, or the only test offered by Ancestry and MyHeritage (or 23andme, if you're interested in health aspects as well as genealogy).

Lorna Henderson highlighted three of her recent finds - one by the serendipity of an unexpected match in California. Subsequent research into this match resulted in a newly-found 3* great uncle in what was believed to be an already long- and well- documented family from Devon!

Another serendipitous match uncovered what had happened to a 2* great uncle who had disappeared after the 1841 census. His death certificate in Ontario has still not been found, but a descendant, with inherited family notes from his daughter, was invaluable in linking where the new match, in California, via Michigan, belonged.

And the conscious (long term) search for DNA candidates to prove that her 2* great grandfather's elder brother had indeed survived beyond his baptismal record and produced a family - with a heap of descendants in Australia.

Make your own luck: - contact your closer matches - you never know what you'll learn as a result. Post a basic outline pedigree at Familysearch.com or Wikitree.com.

For Autosomal DNA only:

- convince a close non-sibling relative from each side of your family to test - preferably from the oldest generations still around. They will be invaluable for helping you sort out which side of the family your own matches come from.

- upload your results to GEDMatch.com (for free) where you can access a pool of results from companies other than the one who tested you, along with other tools. If you have used Ancestry or MyHeritage to test it allows you to access the next level of detail down, which FamilyTreeDNA and 23andme already provide, to see exactly which bits of which chromosome you match. This enables you to check that any family tree hint about the match actually reflects what the DNA match tells you.

Kathy's DNA Revelations

The use of DNA for genealogy purposes has increased markedly in the past few years. My husband Ross and I decided to buy a DNA test for each other for Christmas 2 years ago! For those that have participated in DNA testing, there is nothing more encouraging than an email from a 'match'. This is exactly what has happened for both of us several times!

I have been able to confirm my suspicions as to who was my illegitimate grandmother's father by a 3rd cousin match. Also all my research into my Norwegian grandfather, (who's dramatic story has been told twice at Kapiti Genealogy), has been confirmed by several 2nd cousin matches via DNA.

However the most touching story is about a woman that Ancestry.com said was my 2nd cousin. I was sure I knew all my 2nd cousins and could not work out how this could be. The lady to whom I matched did not have a tree on Ancestry, and I was far too busy to chase up on this, so ignored it for some months.

However, after several emails from Ancestry telling me about this close match I decided to overcome my frustration and contacted this woman. I stated that we had a 2nd cousin DNA match (annotated by Ancestry.com as 'High Confidence'), but as she did not have a tree on Ancestry it made it difficult to determine our connection. I listed my direct family line and asked if any of the names meant anything to her. She replied quickly saying that she did not have a tree on Ancestry because she was adopted! She did not recognise any of the names I had sent her, but did tell me she knew her birth mother's name and she gave me that.

That's when it all made sense, because her birth mother was on my tree, but I had not listed her surname as my gr grandmother had married twice. Her birth mother was the grandchild of my gr grandmother and her second husband!

As a result I have been able to help this lady complete her family tree and connect with her genetic family. This kind of result makes things so worthwhile!

Donna's broken brick wall!

After having a brick wall for 30 years, I finally did my own DNA test with FamilyTreeDNA and found a cousin I had been looking for after seeing an article in an Irish newspaper.

I was pretty sure he belonged to my extended family because in his article he mentioned my 3x gt grandparents. Just prior to this I had managed to find some death records of my 2x gt grandparents. Their parents names were mentioned so the 3x gt grandparents were confirmed.

On my aunty's DNA results this cousin showed up with only a very small match. On my results he came up with a large match. He had not replied to my aunty's contact about the results, but did answer mine.

A phone call after he replied to the 2nd email about my results helped both of us to discover that three siblings came out to NZ in 1864. a brother and two sisters.

He is descended from the brother; I am descended from one of the sisters - my 2x gt grandmother.

There are many descendants from the three siblings today
