On the top row, find the relationship of one person to the common ancestor and follow the column straight down. Find the other person's relationship to the common ancestor on the left hand column and follow that row straight across. The relationship is where the row and column meet.

Round Robins

The two summaries below are both from the April 2017 issue of 'Who Do You Think You Are?'

If you wish to subscribe to either of our Round Robin magazines, contact Bev Chappell at (<u>RoundRobin''at'' KapitiGen.org</u>) Further details on our website under <u>Resources > Round Robins</u>. Subs \$15 per year starting Jul/Aug) to either Family Tree magazine or Who Do You Think You Are? This is a really good way of keeping up with the latest news and having access to interesting articles without having to subscribe to the magazines. They have a wealth of ideas and information When the 'round robin' subscribers have finished with them, the magazines are put into folders in our library at the APFHC. So do check them out. Most articles do not date.

Find a new Direction is an article by Pam Ross exploring the often neglected resource of maps as a research tool. The National Library of Scotland and the British Library have a huge number of free on-line collections. Tithe maps, which we can access through The Genealogist, were published between 1838 and 1851 and cover 75% of England and Wales. They can be read in conjunction with the 1841 and 1851 censuses.

Enclosure maps were produced between 1700 and 1900 giving details of the land allotted to each individual with the acreage and names of both tenants and owners. Earlier maps of estates and towns can often give the names of occupiers. Other limited-scope maps include one in the British Library of mining areas, a Bomb Census map of affected areas, railway and canal map sand trench maps from the First World War. Pam offers a caution that maps can be inaccurate, as can every other source of information, so treat them as guides and opportunities to explore.

And don't forget the historic maps contained in Familysearch at maps.familysearch.org.

It is often hard to find non-conformist records and Jonathan Scott's article on **Non-conformity** gives pointers to several useful sites.

National Library is an Affiliate Library

You will have read that Family Search microfilms can now only be viewed at a Family History Centres or an Affiliate Library.

The National Library, in collaboration with NZSG and Family Search provides an Affiliate Library service. You can view images at the National Library between the hours of 10am to 5pm Monday to Saturday.

There are multiple computers in the 1st floor reading room or you can bring your own computer, but it has to be connected to the National Library WiFi for access. The advantage is that you can download the images straight into your computer. Printing has not proved very successful. The National Library allows IGB per day and 5GBs per month per computer.

Camera capturing is allowed so that's another option.

Three computers near the FamilySearch service desk have been allocated to this service with booking times of 10am-12pm, 12pm-1pm. 1pm-2pm and 2pm- 4pm. This will enable everyone who wants access to get it. To book a time slot, phone the service desk number on 04 474 3048.

We have wonderful resources on all six of our computers at the APFHC, quite apart from all the other records and books. You are encouraged to use these resources as often as you need. They are the envy of other Genealogy Societies.

All six computers have subscriptions to Ancestry, FindMyPast and access to The Genealogist, as well as free sites like FamilySearch. A microfiche is available. You are encouraged to save the results of your searches on a USB memory stick or send them to your own email address. We have a printer if you wish to print a hard copy. Please put 10c per copy in the honesty box on the cupboard door. Please **do not switch off** the printer.

The index is arranged in 22 categories dating back to 1800, including biographies, cemeteries, census records, court records and many others that you've probably never thought of.
