Les Bowen

Sadly, long-time member Les Bowen died in July. Les was born in the village of Marden on the English/ Welsh border and always considered himself a Welshman. He qualified as an architect and met his wife of 60 years, Barbara, while working in London.

They migrated to New Zealand with two young children in 1964 and immersed themselves in new Zealand life. Les became proficient in Maori carving and as an architect was associated with both the Beehive and the new Massey University building.

Les was a volunteer for several years at our public research sessions on Wednesday mornings. He was known for being willing to help wherever he could.

Matron Lucy Trumble - WWI nurse

July's interesting well-presented talk from Rosemary Marryatt about her WWI nurse Aunt Mil. prompted me to look again at my research on WWI nurse, Lucy Trumble. Here are two points of interest: - many of our personnel were still waiting to get home from Europe a long time after peace was declared; - sufficient soldiers were returning with tuberculosis to require the building of a sanatorium. To survive the war and the 1918 flu, but now have tuberculosis, must have felt so unfair.

On 12 May 1919, the Director of Medical Services, Wellington, replying to the Doctor in charge of the Military Sanatorium, Cashmere Hills Christchurch, wrote.

"I have cabled to London stressing the necessity of Sister Trumble's early return to New Zealand." Sister Trumble had been appointed Matron of the Military Sanatorium due to open at the end of June, but was still in London awaiting transport. The cable worked because on the 15th August 1919 Sister Trumble reported for duty and was promoted to rank of Matron by the NZ Army Nursing Service. Lucy Trumble was one of the few returning nurses who found a job commensurate with their experience overseas. After four years Matron Trumble went on to be Matron of the associated Fresh Air Home for six years, and then Matron of all the tuberculosis institutions of The North Canterbury Hospital Board.

The object of the Fresh Air Home was to prevent children of tubercular parents from developing the disease. The young people were kept in the fresh air all day and all night, and were exposed to the sun for about an hour every day, as it was proved that browning of the skin, played a large part in keeping a child free from tubercular infection. (Press 12 August 1926)

A google for Cashmere Sanatorium brought up this site https://cclblog.wordpress.com/2017/03/07/the-hill-of-hope-cashmere-sanatorium/ which had information plus a link to two photo albums at Canterbury library of Cashmere Sanatoriums. A bonus was a photo of Matron Trumble!

National Library Tour

Another successful tour of the National Library happened on August 9th. For some it was new, and others had been on many occasions. Everyone came away with a deeper appreciation of the value of the National Library for family history research. We were shown many of the usual tools, such as the computer system (and how to order items), electoral rolls, the CD collection and the newspaper collection. The modern microfilm readers are so much easier to use and you can save easily to USB.

We were reminded of some of the lesser known tools, such as the pictorial collection for finding photographs of ships on which our ancestors sailed to NZ or photos of the places they settled, where you can see what these places looked like in their day.

One computer is dedicated to maps of NZ (called Quick Maps). You can put in an address and see the history of ownership of an address. The Habitation Index is electoral rolls organised by street name, so you can see who was living in the same street as your ancestors. This collection only started in 1981.

Also there is a wide variety of Magazines, such as the Memories Magazine and endless books on family history.

A tour is very helpful in making a visit to the National Library less overwhelming. We'll be repeating it again next year. The National Library do run regular tours for the public, but the focus is broader than family history.

Mount Felix Tapestry

One Friday morning towards the end of January I wasn't really listening to Radio NZ National, but did prick up my ears when 'Walton-on-Thames and New Zealand Hospital at Mount Felix' were mentioned. I had never heard of Mount Felix Hospital but did know that my Great Auntie Susie had spent quite a long time in Walton-on-Thames as a member of the NZ Army Nursing Service during WWI. She also served in France as an anaesthetist in casualty clearing stations and stationery hospitals; and for a short time in Egypt, on her way to Britain in 1916. I later listened to the documentary in full and became quite emotional when I learned more, particularly about the Mount Felix Tapestry and the history behind it.

The NZ High Commissioner to Britain during WWI, Sir Thomas MacKenzie, and members of the NZ War Contingent Association such as Lord Plunkett, a former governor general in NZ, and Lady Islington, wife of another former NZ governor general, were instrumental in establishing the idea of a NZ hospital specifically for NZ soldiers following Gallipoli, and in obtaining the use of the Mount Felix property at Walton in 1915. It was to be the first of three wholly NZ hospitals. During the four years it operated at least 27,000 NZ soldiers were treated at Mount Felix - with only 150 deaths. Sir Thomas was later to say "That small number spoke volumes for the skill of the surgeons and physicians and the care of the nurses."

About 2007, as a community initiative, Andrew Crummy, a Scottish artist, illustrated the Preston Pans Tapestry. The idea of a community tapestry appealed to Emily Boulting, Artistic Director of Riverhouse Barn Arts Centre in Walton-on-Thames and, with the centenary of Gallipoli and WW1 in mind, she advanced the idea to commemorate the NZ Hospital at Mount Felix and the New Zealand association with Walton-on-Thames. Walton has several streets with NZ names, a pub which used to be named 'The Kiwi' and there is a strong link between the Mount Felix Hospital and St Mary's Anglican Church. For example an ANZAC service is held there every April 25th and several NZ soldiers are buried in the Church graveyard. The majority of present-day residents of Walton have no idea the hospital existed or why some streets there have NZ names; or why there is a Kowhai tree planted in the car park outside the Homebase store – an English equivalent to Bunnings Warehouse.

Much research was done. It was decided to seek sponsorship and commission Andrew Crummy to illustrate 44 panels which would be stitched by what turned out to be 603 volunteers. Volunteers were mainly locals, groups or individuals [Panel 20 Walton Welcomes the Wounded], although the New Zealand Women's Association (London) completed a panel [Panel 27 Poppy's Story - On the Wards of Mount Felix]. Some British servicemen resident at Headley Court Defence Medical Rehabilitation Centre in Surrey did one [Panel 37 Soldiers Stitch a Memorial Banner]. As part of their rehabilitation, WW I Mount Felix soldiers had stitched a memorial banner to honour the 19 soldiers and one nurse who are buried in St Mary's Churchyard. The banner is thought to now be in Te Papa.

One panel was completed here in NZ. [Panel 26 Poppy's Story – Surviving the Sinking of the Marquette] In Christchurch there is a Memorial Chapel for the Christchurch and other nurses who lost their lives in the sinking of the Marquette in 1915. It is being reinstated following old age and damage during the Christchurch earthquakes. The Lemon Squeezer is my favourite panel as it connects me to my SouthTaranaki roots [Panel 9]

An exhibition of the 44 panels which make up the Mount Felix Tapestry is to visit NZ in time for the 103rd anniversary of the sinking of Marquette in October and will then be exhibited at various locations in NZ until 30th September 2019, when it will return to Walton-on-Thames and be on permanent display in St Mary's Anglican Church. It will be at the Expressions Gallery, Upper Hutt between 23rd December 2018 and 4th March 2019.

I have since heard an interview by Lynn Freeman on 'Standing Room Only' with Andrew Crummy, the tapestry illustrator. That can also be heard on Radio New Zealand podcast. Go to www.radionz.co.nz and type "Andrew Crummy" into the search engine.

The Tapestry has its own website, www.mountfelixtapestry.co.uk, with each of the panels shown and described.

Family Search - Important information

Since early July, the FamilySearch affiliate library images have not been accessible on any of the search stations (computers) in the National Library's Reading Room as FamilySearch no longer supports the outdated browser (Internet Explorer) used by the National Library.

HOWEVER, you can still access the FamilySearch affiliate library's images by bringing in a laptop or tablet (one that has a reasonably up-to-date browser such as Edge, Firefox, Safari, Chrome) and connecting through the National Library's free Wi-Fi network. You'll be able to download images to your laptop. You won't usually be able to download to an ipad, but you might to another brand of tablet (android).

Our FamilySearch Service volunteers are available to assist you access the images on your own device – and we can email images to you if your device can't download and you can supply us with the film number and image number.

A microfiche is available. You are encouraged to save the results of your searches on a USB memory stick or send them to your own email address. We have a printer if you wish to print a hard copy. Please put 10c per copy in the honesty box on the cupboard door.
