Tour of Archives NZ

A group of 10 enjoyed another informative tour of Archives NZ on Oct 9th. It was the first tour for over half the group and they now have Readers Cards so can order items online from home, to be waiting for them on their next visit to Archives NZ. https://www.archway.archives.govt.nz

The Land Deeds Room holds historic land deeds for the lower half of the North Island. The land deed books can be very interesting and useful in family history research, but the books are very large and complicated. An archivist is available and willing to help if you want to view these records.

We were reminded of other useful (or just plain interesting) items held at Archives NZ, including the Chinese Poll Tax books, which include photos. These have been digitised and can now be found online.

- Ship logs can provide background information to the shipping lists, including conditions on board and notes on disease or death of passengers.
- Coroners reports have had access restrictions changed in the past few years. Reports up to 1960's have a 50 year restriction and from the 1970's 70 years. The more modern coroners reports have much more detail and some content is deemed too distressing to be viewed (such as photographs), so access may still be denied.
- There is a huge collection of maps, drawings and plans of structures. We were shown a drawing of the 'new' Paekakariki Railway Station (1923). This was very detailed and included a Foot Warming Room! If you have railway ancestors, they may be on the Railway Personnel Register. Some of the registers are as recent as the 1970's.

Another tour will be organised next year. I have been on many tours and always learn something new!

From the Daytime Group

Our September meeting was on the Suffragette Petition so here is a brief note (excuse the pun!) on "Celebrating 125 years Suffragette" from our discussion.

Kate Sheppard's appearance on the New Zealand \$10 note. suggests New Zealanders' pride in being the first country to grant women the vote, in 1893. Kate was a founding member of the Women's Christian Temperance Union in New Zealand. Through distributing pamphlets, organising meetings, writing letters to newspapers and extensive public speaking, she effectively led the fight for women's suffrage.



In the left background of the \$10 note is a white camellia. These flowers were given to members of Parliament who supported the suffrage bill, and have subsequently become a symbol of the fight for women's suffrage. In the Christchurch Botanical Gardens there is a memorial walk to Sheppard which is lined with white camellias.

Lane End

A few months ago, in preparation for my trip to England in August this year, I was looking through photos taken in Devon in July 2017. I found this photo of a signpost beside an old cottage. "Where had I seen the words Lane End before?"

I was sure it was in a record connected to one of my family members.

But what was the connection to Lane End?

This kept coming to my mind while on the bus from Heathrow to Taunton in Somerset where I stayed in the friendly B&B called Brookfield for a week, Jill and Ian again making me feel very welcome.

I spent time in the Somerset Heritage Centre researching Land Deeds of the 1670-1696 era looking for a clue to link a John Braddick, who was out with the Duke of Monmouth in 1685 (luckily not captured), to my 5x great



grandfather Joseph Braddick, born in 1723 in Luppitt, Devon. I also spent a day with my fifth cousin Harold Braddick and his wife Hazel and some more of their family – this time a son Robin, their two daughters Carole and Ann, a son-in-law Malcolm, a granddaughter and a grandson and three of their great grandchildren. How the family is growing!

Jill drove me over the hills to Awliscombe in Devon, where she and her husband, Ian, had lived when they first married, up on the hill above Liz and Paddy Gillingham's B&B, a converted cob barn called Threshays. I have stayed there over the last twenty years. Liz and Jill were friends when at college and have met up again due to me needing somewhere to stay in Taunton.

On the trip over the hills I mentioned that the John Braddick I was interested in was married to a Joan Rounsevall. Jill said in amazement "lan is descended from a Rounsevall who lived in Awliscombe"! Was Ian a relation of the Joan who married John Braddick of Luppitt? Her cousin lived in Awliscombe. It's a small world! Something to talk about next year while I'm in Taunton!

When I stay with Liz and Paddy they drive me to interesting places in Devon where the Braddick family lived years ago. I was looking through my RootsMagic program thinking about Culmstock where my great grandfather John Braddick came from, before he emigrated to New Zealand on the Tudor sailing ship in 1865 aged 19.

Where did my 3x great grandfather Samuel Braddick, his wife Ann, and their grandson William live in 1841? Where had I read Lane End before?

I brought up the Braddicks' pages and there, in my great grandfather John Braddick's grandfather's notes, I found details which came from the 1841 census for Culmstock.

Yes. It was Samuel and Ann Braddick who lived there in 1841 - my great, great, great, grandparents, Samuel born 1768, died 1849 aged 81, and Ann nee Bolt born 1776, died 1864 aged 88.

Lane End continued

Liz and I took a ride to Upcott in Culmstock and luckily found a farmer who was happy to chat to us. He gave us directions to find Lane End Cottage and also Land End House, which he told us was a little further along the lane on the other side of the road. The M5 highway has divided the land that Samuel and Ann had once farmed, and we had to cross over the highway to find the road.

It has been renovated with a new piece added on the back.

Was this the Lane End where Samuel, Ann and grandson William lived in 1841? Had Samuel and Ann brought up their eleven children here or was it at Lane End House, a little way down the road?







Lane End House is very large, and the beautiful trees surrounding it meant I couldn't get the entire side of the house in the photo. The place has been renovated and modernized but the end of the house gives a view of how it would have looked in 1841. The alteration this time is to add a chimney above the new central heating system. I wondered what the windows would have been like in 1841, and whether the roof would have been made of thatch?

Finding Lane End Cottage and Lane End House made me feel closer to my family. Names are fine but walking where they walked makes family history come alive. I recommend it to you all.

How can the tools, and techniques, available at https://dnapainter.com/tools help with your DNA results and analyses?

Check the range of predicted relationships likely for an amount of shared DNA. Paint your chromosomes by assigning the ancestor responsible for the DNA you and your matches share.

Use the WATO tool (What Are The Odds) to help you find where someone may fit in a family with several closely tested relatives - it does all the hard statistical calculations for you on the assorted options you deem possible.

Alison Proctor Family History Centre

The APFHC is located at Paraparaumu Library . Turn right inside the library entrance and at the far end you'll see the six computers, microfiche and library. The cupboard on the right hand side of the area contains the red folders mentioned below.

Computer Password at the APFHC

The APFHC computer password changes regularly: check the red Computer Help folder in one of the drawers. (The top drawer may be damaged due to recarpeting.)

Members need to get the cupboard key from the library Welcome Desk, when you will be asked to show your membership card. Please sign the red signing-in book found in the drawer. Replace the cover on the computer when you leave and lock the keyboard in the cupboard.

We have wonderful resources on all six of our computers at the APFHC, quite apart from all the other records and books. You are encouraged to use these resources as often as you need.

All six computers have subscriptions to Ancestry, FindMyPast and access to The Genealogist, as well as free sites like FamilySearch (we suggest you use your own log-in to FamilySearch). A microfiche is available. You are encouraged to save the results of your searches on a USB memory stick or send them to your own email address. We have a printer if you wish to print a hard copy. Please put 10c per copy in the honesty box on the cupboard door.

Please do not switch off the printer.
