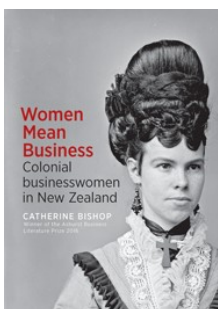

Wellington City Council Archives Tour

A group of 14 had a very successful tour of WCC Archives on Aug 20th. As I have absolutely no Wellington connections, I must admit to not being overly excited at the thought of old Rate Books and Council Minute Books. However, what a surprise it was for me to hear what is actually held in these Archives! It was far from my preconceived ideas.

The WCC Archives have been established for about 20 years and it has been hard work by dedicated archivists to convince important people in the Wellington area, and others (like me), of the importance of their collection. They currently receive on average 1,000 requests a month for look ups or viewing.

Not only do they hold Wellington City Council records, but also those from various museums in Wellington, including the maritime Museum and the Carter Observatory. Their collection holds extensive records for the Union Steamship Company.

They hold records for performing arts groups, such as the Wellington Competition Society, who held a yearly concert for many years until the 1970's. Due to earthquake strengthening of some buildings around Wellington, they are also holding historical papers such as every Program for every concert that was performed in the St. James Theatre. These are available for viewing. There are also art works from the Town Hall, including photos of Mayors and councillors throughout the years.

Of the more traditional records held, there are thousands of Rate Books, Property Records, Resource Consents and Permits, dating as far back as 1842. We saw some very amusing letters to the Council from 100 years ago where residents were complaining about children making too much noise in the playgrounds and the grass being so long that some poor woman was frightened when a man hid in the grass and jumped out at her!

We were shown the Thomas Ward Map, which is a very detailed map of Wellington City and suburbs from around the 1890's. This map is a good base for researching properties. It is now online. In addition, a detailed sexton's map of the Bolton Cemetery was recently found, which shows many previously unknown grave positions. This too is online.

Digitalisation is happening at a rapid rate and records are regularly being digitised. Only 20% of records are currently online, so a visit is still the best way of accessing records. You can contact WCC Archives any time and they will look things up for you or find the appropriate 'box' and you can search through it yourself. There is a huge collection of books of old Wellington photos which you are permitted to view (most are not yet available online), so definitely worth a look at these. There are some records from Kapiti, but most only go as far north as Tawa. Kapiti records were donated to the Otaki Historical Society, who care for these records.

Tour of the Salvation Army Archives, Trentham

Kathy's second tour was another 'first time' visit for all of us.

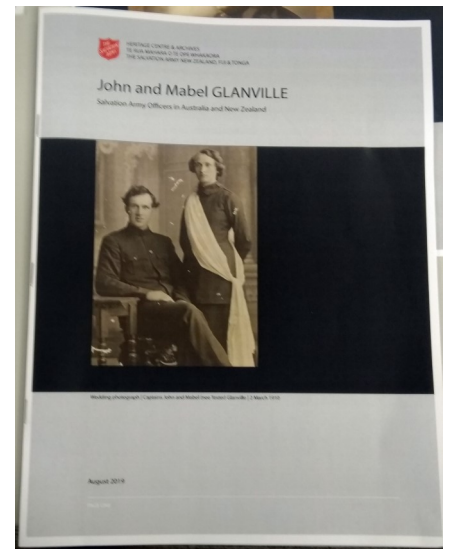
The Salvation Army Heritage Centre and Archives is situated in the Booth College of Mission (Training College) in Trentham, and houses the archives from New Zealand, Tonga, Fiji and Samoa.

Sharon Burton, the Territorial Archivist, introduced us to the archives' diverse range of holdings which includes everything from the band master's cornet from the first Corp in New Zealand (Dunedin, 1883), photographs and uniforms, through to personnel records. It is the latter which is of most interest to us as genealogists, and the collection is quite detailed.

Career cards summarise a person's progression through the Army, giving dates, places of appointment and usually include a photograph; a Form of Appointment is held, which is a bit like a WWI Attestation form with similar details; accompanying this Form, there is often a personal testament, describing why they want to be an officer. Together with Training Records, the annual Disposition of Forces, and individual Corps histories which include births, marriages and deaths, and the complete series of the War Cry newspaper, these records enable a complete and reasonably personal picture to be built up for an individual officer.

In fact, the Archives staff provide such a service on request (donations are welcomed), producing a booklet summarising the details they discover. If you want to use this service, send your request to archives@salvationarmy.org.nz.





New Searchable Headstones

The Genealogist has just released nearly 60,000 new individuals on Headstones from another 61 churchyards and cemeteries. This means that now a total of over 174,500 individuals are fully searchable in their Headstone collection which has examples from across England, Scotland and Wales as well as Jersey in the Channel Islands, Cyprus and India.

Wills and probates 1858-present

The cost of a copy of a Will and Probate in England and Wales from 1858 to the present has plummeted from £10.00 to £1.50. <https://probatesearch.service.gov.uk/#wills>

In the Help section it confirms the above post (which I spotted on a facebook group)

How to pay for your copy grant or will

The fee for each copy request is £1.50 to download (the £1.50 charge is required by law for the release of public documents). You will receive a copy of the grant of representation and the will if there is one. You can pay online using a debit or credit card. If you are unable to pay with a credit or debit card, then you can download form PAIS from <https://www.gov.uk/wills-probate-inheritance/searching-for-probate-records>. The form will have an address to send it to, together with your cheque. This service will take 4 weeks.

You need a surname and year of death, but can go previous /next to search around the specified year once you have your results.

Our August meeting had the usual mix of Q&A. We only had time for the DNAGedCom clustering tool, so may continue this overall topic in a future session.

Q. Which is better more segments or total shared?

A. Generally total shared, but if largest segment is small anyway the match could be quite distant

Q. What size matches do you bother with?

A. Definitely it depends, on most of the factors listed, even quite large segments, say 40+, may never be figured out; 20 cm segments could take a long time to solve but that 12cm one you were going to ignore might be a vital clue, so "it depends"

A microfiche is available. You are encouraged to save the results of your searches on a USB memory stick or send them to your own email address. We have a printer if you wish to print a hard copy. Please put 10c per copy in the honesty box on the cupboard door.
