Any genealogist on a research trail will not be bored. However, if all else fails go to futurelearn.com and join their 'Genealogy: Researching Your Family tree' course. It is free and lasts six weeks, with an estimated time requirement of four hours a week.

It includes all the topics you'd like to cover; how to research, sources, documents and how to use them, the use of DNA, references and how to write up your family history. It guides you through many very useful websites and shows how to use them.

Other courses - 'Learning from the past: a guide for the curious researcher' or 'The Scottish Highland Clans: Origins, decline and transformation' may interest you.

Do check out their site. The courses are all run by recognised universities or colleges and are well worth while.


Great News!

Although the Paraparaumu Library is closed, and we have no access to our resources in the APFHC, the KCDC Library has managed to enable access to the Ancestry Library Edition from home for Kapiti residents.

Here's how to do get there:

I. Go to the Kapiti Coast Libraries Catalogue https://kapiti.spydus.co.nz/cgi-bin/spydus.exe/MSGTRN/WPAC/HOME

2. Click on Login



3a. If you are already registered, enter your Library Card Number and Password;

3b. If you have a Library Card but have never set up a Password, click on the "Forgot your password?" link. This does however require that your borrower account already has your current email address registered with the Library.

Once you've logged in to the Catalogue:

I. Click on the "Home" link (top left of the screen)

then

2. You will find the link to Ancestry.com on the right hand side of the screen

If you have any problems, just email Paraparaumu.library@kapiticoast.govt.nz They will be able to help you by e.g. registering or updating your email address on your borrower account so that you can set a Password.

Meetings during lockdown

We have subscribed to the Zoom web conferencing application to give us the ability to hold virtual meetings while we are in lockdown.

Our first virtual meeting was held on Saturday 11th for the DNA group (http://www.kapitigen.org/
programme/interest-groups/dna/), and by all accounts was very well received. Next up was the Online Trees session focussing on MyHeritage trees (and the companion FamilyTreeBuilder software) on the following Saturday. (http://www.kapitigen.org/programme/interest-groups/online-trees-their-companion-software-programs/), and RootsMagic will follow in May.

For the DNA and Roots Magic Interest Groups, contact is made with those already on the mailing list to set up the meeting. If you want to join either of these interest groups, contact us on http://www.kapitigen.org/contact_us/ and we will add you to the list.

A regular **virtual help session** slot has also been assigned on **Wednesdays between I and 3pm**, and will be available for members in lieu of the Wednesday morning APFHC sessions. Registration is required for a slot to be assigned to you, and the first of these was trialled by Lorna on the I5th April. The ability to share our respective screens during these sessions makes it relatively easy to guide you to answers for your burning questions. We welcome any volunteers to help in this slot, as your committee are by no means the only experts in the Branch!

As above, contact us on http://www.kapitigen.org/contact_us/ to arrange a slot in the help sessions. Briefly describe what you want help with, and if you can't wait till Wednesday we may even be able to arrange a more suitable time slot for you.

The process:

For all of the above meetings, you are required to pre-register.

Once you have expressed interest in attending any of these sessions you will receive:

1. An email with a link to **register** for the meeting.

You will need to fill in your name and email address.

Once you have clicked the Register button, you may be prompted to download Zoom.

You do not have to Sign in /register an account with Zoom itself.

2. Once you have **registered for the meeting**, you will receive another email which contains details of the meeting, along with a link to **join the meeting** and a password.

On the day, you will use this latter join link and password to enter the meeting (and another invite to download Zoom if you didn't do that earlier).

With the link you can join a meeting at any time it is in progress, and leave it likewise.

If there are any glitches, please bear with us, as we are all on a learning curve here!

If you have no experience of online meetings, these instructions from SeniorNet explain some of the equipment options and meeting process: https://kapiti.seniornet.co.nz/using-zoom/

You can use any device to participate (see SeniorNet explanations),

but participation does work best if you have the ability to use voice and video. It can however work with text only via the Chat capability.

Grumpy old gt gt gt granddad

We know more about my 4 x gt grandfather than my 3x, as he was Alexander MacGillonie-Cameron, 5^{th} and last of Invermallie, tacksman to Lochiel (Chief of Clan Cameron).

Alexander and his wife of 75 years had 5 children, of whom my 3x gt grandfather Angus was 3rd in line. But Alexander made the age-old error of favouring one heir over the others when sharing what would have been very hard-earned wealth. His eldest son got the lion's share (some 20-or-so years before the clearances took his father out in 1803) and headed off to the West Indies and Surinam where he established several cotton and sugar plantations and owned upward of 550 slaves.

This deemed inequity got right up Angus' nose. So aggrieved was he that court records of the time tell of him taking his own father to court in an attempt rectify the situation.

When this proved unsuccessful, Angus spent the next few years lining up cousins and kinsmen in a series of court cases for alleged wrongs that in most cases were dismissed for insufficient evidence.

We don't know at this stage what happened to Angus for the next 20 years, until he turned up in Paramaribo, Surinam, around 1830.

How do we know this? Sure enough – court records have him suing a nephew for recompense over a family financial dispute! Who lost the case? Gt gt gt grandad Angus!

He died in Surinam in 1854, aged 90, leaving his descendants wondering what he would have been like to live with.

Virtual DNA

Although we couldn't meet in person, our 11th April meeting went ahead electronically with positive feedback being received.

There was good interaction with questions being asked and answered and the technology worked well. The demo section was on MedBetterDNA, the chrome browser extension for additional features for those working with AncestryDNA.

This tool allows you to:

- see the full notes entered against a match when viewing the overall DNA match list;
- overcome the limit of 24 coloured dots to categorize your matches and also
- to allow for negative searches.

For this to work you must have access to the Notes field of the kit being displayed or filtered, as it works by reading the Notes you have input against the individual matches.

The options can be changed via the right click menu when viewing your matches.

You have to have entered #tags in the notes that you wish to filter for their presence or absence, eg significant surnames, MRCA info, contacted.

Remember to UNset the filter after you've used it as your match list will be rather reduced otherwise.

Notes from the session have been sent to those on our DNA Group mailing list (but will probably be a bit cryptic to those not present!)

Your homework for next time is for YOU to tell US what you look for first when you check your new matches / DNA results at whatever company.
