St Valentine in Dublin



The Church of **Our Lady of Mount Carmel** aka **Whitefriar Street Church** (est. 1826) is perhaps best-known as a special place of pilgrimage for people in love, especially on St. Valentine's Day. On February 14th, hundreds of couples will pass through its doors to have their rings blessed by the patron saint of lovers who rests here in Dublin.

Since 1836, the church has housed **the remains of St. Valentine**, which were gifted to the Rev. Fr John Spratt (1776-1871) by Pope Gregory XVI (1831-1846), upon whom this Dubliner had made a great impression.

The inner box of the shrine which contains "the sacred body of Saint Valentinus the Martyr, together with a small vessel tinged with his blood" has never been opened nor seals broken to disturb his final resting place.

PRONI uploads digitized NI tithe books and school grant aid records Posted: 29 Nov 2019 The Public Record Office of Northern Ireland (www.nidirect.gov.uk/proni) has initiated a major evolution with its online catalogue, with the release of two important digitised record collections for the six northern counties now constituted as Northern Ireland (Antrim, Down, Armagh, Fermanagh, Tyrone, Londonderry). The collections are the Northern Ireland Tithe Applotment Books 1823-1837 (FIN/5/A), and the National Education Commissioners Grant Aid Applications (ED/I).

Jenny Martin adds:

The LDS have digitised their microfilmed copies of the NI "Tithe Applotment Books" and they are now available on FamilySearch. The only downside is the **images** are not available from home, but can be viewed at an **Affiliated Library or FHC** eg The National Library in Wellington

You can use this link https://www.familysearch.org/search/collection/2729531 at home but will only get transcriptions of names and places.

Copyright infringement!

Having flagrantly copied an article from a newspaper in the last newsletter, I was interested (and mortified) to read an article from The Legal Genealogist by Judy Russell. Now Judy Russell permits her articles to be used by others on condition she and the source are acknowledged.

Cite/link to this post: Judy G. Russell, "<u>Using the work of others</u>," *The Legal Genealogist* (https://www.legalgenealogist.com/blog: posted 4 Feb 2020).

This blog is really worth reading. It sets out clearly and simply the rights and wrongs of inadvertently, or purposely, using someone else's work. I quote from the conclusion of the blog. Do read the rest of it.

"All of us, as responsible genealogists, individually and as a group, can act to keep on the straight and narrow path here.

First and foremost, in our own work, we need to cite our sources even in our own private research notes or genealogy database entries. That will keep us from even inadvertently passing off someone else's work as our own. Someone else's work should *never* be incorporated into our own without credit being given.

Secondly, when we want to use that work for publication — and that includes even sharing it with our families and friends, we will often need to *ask permission*, since in many cases our use goes beyond what the law allows as fair use.

And thirdly, we need to stop looking the other way. It's time for our community as a whole to stop thinking of this as "just sharing" and to start yelling, "Stop, thief!" We need to stop tolerating it and excusing it when someone copies someone else's work.

Because it's **not** sharing when we use someone else's work without both getting permission and giving credit. - It's *theft*."

The Genealogist's new Map Explorer

I wonder how many members have used the map explorer in The Genealogist at the APFHC? An article in the July 2019 issue of Family Tree (one of our Round Robin magazines - see below) explains the wide ranging uses of the expanded version of their Map Explorer. It can be used to show how streets or land use have changed over time, or to investigate the history of a house.

When you start typing an address into the search box, you are given a range of options. Onto the historic address where your ancestors lived you can use a transparency slider to impose Ordinance Survey maps from 1893 –1961, showing you how the location has changed. An example is given of the relocation of King Edward's Grammar School in Birmingham to make way for a large road junction. The original footprint of the school can be seen clearly on a hybrid satellite map under the mass of new roads. In the new map explorer you can search on people and street directories, headstones and war memorials. Future developments will enable you to search for owners and occupiers from The Genealogists National Tythe Collection Books as well as other map collections.

This is a powerful mapping tool, a real boon for genealogists who wish to enhance their ancestors' story with background detail. Do check it out!
