In the Footsteps of our Ancestors

Here's a bit of fun – follow in the footsteps of your ancestors over the millennia, on the website: scaledinnovation.com/gg/snpTracker.html

If you have completed a Y chromosome test, enter your Terminal SNP, or Haplogroup, in the box above the map. Mine is R-Y136585. Click on the three bars to the right-hand side, and check the boxes you want, eg Show the walking man, etc. Click on the long arrow to the left of Map Options, and follow the wee man walking the trail your ancestors walked.

Explore the tabs above the map. Fascinating!

It seems my story starts in Northern Africa, not too far from Timbuktu, over 240,000 years ago... give or take. By following the markers our YDNA has left along the way, from this starting point we swung down into Central Africa and crossed the River Nile somewhere north of Lake Victoria, then headed north-east through Ethiopia to cross the Red Sea into Arabia. Continuing north, we hit the Gulf not far from present-day Abu Dhabi, and followed the Gulf coast north-westward, crossing the Tigris and Euphrates rivers into Asia, and swung east in a massive loop that took us out as far as Mongolia and its border with Russia, before taking a major change in direction and coming back westward to the Caspian Sea. Around the southern coastline we travelled and up the western side with the Black Sea further to our west.

We're not in a hurry... we're travelling at about 1 or 2 miles a year, give or take... over thousands of years, and at this point in our journey we're about 20,000 years before the present.

But already we're beginning to recognise some of our more prominent ancestor's names – ones that keep appearing in our genetic families, our haplotrees. There's mister

R-M207, later R-M343, then well-known R-M269 who lived about 13,000 years ago.

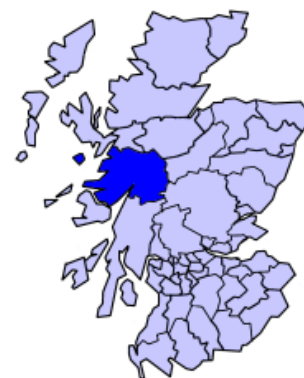
By now our migration has taken us to where Stalingrad sits today, we cross the Volga river and make our way down to the northern shores of the Black Sea, find ourselves in the Danube river valley which we follow westwards for over 1000 miles through middle Europe. As we approach the English Channel mister R-L21 appears.

Crossing the English Channel would have been quite an adventure back in the day, but cross it we did, and up through England we came, before arriving in the lands around Lochaber in the Western Highlands of Scotland. Here we welcome in the Bronze Age, 4000 years ago, and our famous ancestor R-MC14 appears on the scene. Lochaber became our ancestral home, where we lived through the Medieval period, helped in the creation of the surname system from which our Cameron name evolved, along with the formation of the clan system and our own Clan Cameron. Mister R-A6138 is the man we identify as being the genetic ancestor of the clan.

Genetic genealogy and conventional genealogy are now meeting and blending – where Terminal SNPs from our DNA tests are matching ancestors we already know from our family trees, and history.

And still we journey on.

Properties and maps in NZ

How many of you have looked at Open Street Map lately for a New Zealand address?

Recently I was checking out my grandparent's house, wanting the Latitude/Longitude values to pop into my genealogy program.

I gave up on Google maps which wasn't behaving as easily for me as it used to - no doubt user error. I decided to try Open Street Map (<http://openstreetmap.org>) and was surprised to see that when I keyed in the exact address and clicked on the House link, that the information shown included a Linz address_id (which I've not yet investigated the usefulness of but suspect will ease my obtaining historical title information).

At the same time I'd posted a picture of the house onto a private Facebook group for my home town / area.

The picture was from the 1920s when my grandparents (and my father and aunt) moved to the town. So far I've learnt who helped granddad build the extension onto the back of the old villa, who bought the house from my parents (after they'd been renting it beforehand) and exactly when my parents built their retirement home on the subdivided section, along with who did it for them.

Also how much it is currently on the market for with real estate photos of the current interior, including the old tiled fireplace I remember from my childhood.

Another property related snippet:

Those of us watching David Lomas Investigates (TV3 Tuesday evenings <https://www.threenow.co.nz/shows/david-lomas-investigates/S2211-399>) will have seen him searching Terranet (<http://terranet.co.nz>) for any hints as to properties owned by the person being researched.

Having quickly bored of cleaning drawers and cupboards during this lockdown period I have been looking again at various parts of my family history researches.

Presently I am looking at the story of Peter Stuart Grant, his mother Ann (nee Black) and her daughter, Jane Black, born in Inveravon Parish, Banffshire, Scotland on 18 January 1869. Jane Black married Robert Glass, a baker, in Edinburgh and went on to have 5 children, one of whom was given the wonderful first names of Grant Iverach. Through the website Billion Graves I discovered that this gentleman is commemorated on a plaque in Paraparaumu Cemetery.

In January 2017 on a rather damp Sunday morning I was able to visit this site while on a trip to New Zealand with my husband. Unfortunately my discovery of this information just a few weeks before we left on our trip prevented me from pursuing matters further at that time and, of course, when we got back home to Scotland other matters always seemed to take over - until now.

I do not know if you have a Register of Members Interests but if you have anyone interested in the surname Glass and who might recognise these few details I would be thrilled to hear from them and willingly share the story of their Scottish ancestry.

own log-in to FamilySearch). A microfiche is
available.

searches on a USB memory stick or send them to
your own email address. We have a printer if you
wish to print a hard copy. Please put 10c per copy
in the honesty box on the cupboard door.

Please **do not switch off** the printer.
