New Resource for APFHC

Those researching Irish heritage will be delighted to see the new resource on our computers at the Alison Procter Family History Centre (APFHC).

We have taken out a subscription to Rootslreland (https://www.rootsireland.ie/) for a trial period.

"RootsIreland offers a unique database of more than 22 million Irish records

It contains data from 34 county genealogy centres on the island of Ireland. The main sources on the site are Irish Catholic and other church records of baptisms, marriages and deaths, which are the most important source for tracing Irish ancestry.

"The Irish Family History Foundation has been the coordinating body for a network of county genealogy centres and family history societies for over thirty years. The sources available vary for each county so please check our Irish Online Sources for details of what is available on the website."

The link to access this collection appears at the top left on the Internet Resources page on our system.



As per TheGenealogist we have just one subscription, so only one person can use it at a time, but it is available on all our computers.

Please do NOT sign out of Rootslreland (or FindMyPast or TheGenealogist). It means someone has to go in and fix the access again.

How to? - pop up monthly

How to register for, and navigate, Family Search

http://FamilySearch.org is one of the "go-to" sites for genealogy.

If you've never registered (or you have forgotten your login or password) we'll get you up and running (again), and acquaint you with the basic navigation to access the wealth of information on the site. To register or find your username/password you will need to be able to access to your mail at the time.

Blogs etc.

I know I'm not the most switched-on cookie in the tin and I'm not sure what a 'blog' is, but I have just discovered some very interesting things, all to be found on our facilities in APFHC.

Check out the following link for explicit instructions on how to search newspapers from all over the world in FindMyPast. https://youtu.be/INUS2KGGT18 It includes great tips on how to use filters to narrow down your search and find what you're looking for. It gives the link to British newspapers - https://search.findmypast.ie/search/british-newspapers, which is free to register and gives you three free searches.

It's really worth investigating the information that you can get from newspapers.

The link https://www.findmypast.com.au/blog brings up some interesting articles including tips on how to trace immigrant ancestors, Irish ancestors that lived during the time of the Irish famine and the story of the Mayflower pilgrims and their journey to America in 1620. Add to that, new records added to FindMyPast collections in the last month and several educational articles on how to record your family history etc.

The link to The Genealogist's website reveals a range of articles.

https://www.thegenealogist.co.uk/featuredarticles/ These vary from 'Tracing illegitimate ancestors online' (See illustration on right)

to participants in 'Who do you think you are', to the history of Stourhead - now a National Trust property in Wiltshire via The Genealogist's Headstone collection, to the use of Tithe maps, and so much more.



https://www.familysearch.org/blog/en/ is another link to check out. This also contains a list of the recent records that have been added to Family Search's collection, plus an article on how they have updated their 'Genealogies' page.

Family Search and its predecessor have collected genealogies submitted by research partners or other societies for 125 years. These are now available online and can be search under multiple headings. The Genealogies section can be accessed under the Search button



This picture heads their article on the Mayflower pilgrims from 1620 detailing who they were, why they were fleeing the dictates of the Church of England and what happened to them.

The second page gives more stories about the people who founded the Plymouth settlement in America.

The blog also gives a useful monthly update on all the records that have been added.

The place where your family came from is an integral part of family history. The Family Search places tool: https://www.familysearch.org/research/places/ provides a summary of the records, demographics, and history of the place that you name.

You can search by town, parish, county, state, or other place term.

Members need to get the cupboard key from the library Welcome Desk, when you will be asked to show your membership card for the current year.

Computer Password at the APFHC

The APFHC computer password changes regularly: check the red Computer Help folder in the top drawer. Keyboards are in the lowest drawer. Please sign the red signing-in book found in the top drawer.

Replace the cover on the computer when you leave and lock the keyboard in the cupboard.

All six computers have subscriptions to Ancestry, FindMyPast and access to The Genealogist and Roots Ireland as well as free sites like FamilySearch. (Use your own log-in to FamilySearch). Please do **NOT** sign out of RootsIreland, FindMyPast or TheGenealogist. A microfiche is available.

You are encouraged to save the results of your searches on a USB memory stick or send them to your own email address. We have a printer if you wish to print a hard copy. Please put 10c per copy in the honesty box on the cupboard door. Please **do not switch off** the printer.
