

https://bantry7.wixsite.com/cushladealy_is about my latest book: "From Eire to New Zealand, The Callaghan, McCarthy, Dealy, McKewen and Brennan Families".

Many family members ended up living in the Wellington region. A McKewen brother, originally from Newry in Co.Armagh, married the Brennan girl from Coon in Co.Kilkenny and they made their home in Dunedin, NZ. Some of the Bantry, West Cork Dealy/Daly family arrived in NZ as 'Dealy'. One sibling obtained a lease on Wellington's Railway Hotel. His brother married a McKewen from Dunedin and they brought up their family in 'the Railway'.

At the turn of the twentieth century Paddy Callaghan, a coal-miner from Lisduff, Co.Roscommon, married a daughter of one of the McCarthy Brothers from Ballygiblin, Co.Cork. The couple settled in Wellington where their eldest daughter married the eldest of the Dealy sons in 1930.

New Kerry Records Now Online

We are delighted to announce the addition of almost 21,000 baptism and marriage Roman Catholic records from County Kerry to our Roots Ireland database at kerry.rootsireland.ie. The records are as follows:

Causeway baptisms, 1783-1900 (19,617 records) Abbeydorney marriages, 1836-1900 (1,276 records)

British records to search

British Phone Books, 1880-1984. The phone directory was one of the best go-to sources when looking for someone. This collection, from the historic phone book collection held by BT Archives, contains British phone books published between 1880, the year after the public telephone service was introduced to the UK, and 1984.

The database currently contains 1780 phone books and provides almost full coverage of England as well as many records from Scotland and Wales.

The Genealogist has added a total of over 1 million individuals to their Lloyd George Domesday Survey record set with the addition of 85,959 individuals from the 1910s property tax records for the Borough of Haringey. Covering Hornsey Central, Hornsey East, Hornsey West, as well as Tottenham and Wood Green, this release is made up of maps and field books that name property owners and occupiers in an exclusive online resource, giving family history researchers the ability to find where an ancestor lived in the 1910-1915 period.

The Genealogist has also added a further 322,894 individuals to their increasing collection of Parish Records with the release of a set from the county of **Suffolk**.

These East Anglian church registers have been fully transcribed and linked to images of the actual pages from the books that were once kept by the Anglican Parish Churches. As the established church of the state, these Church of England documents recorded baptisms, marriages and burials of our Suffolk ancestors.

Parishes in this release include: Ashby, Belton, Blundeston with Flixton, Bradwell, Burgh Castle, Carlton Colville, Corton, Fritton, Gisleham, Gorleston with Southtown, Gunton, Herringfleet, Hopton, Kessingland, Kirkley St Peter & St John, Kirkley St Matthew, Knettishall, Lound, Lowestoft Christchurch, Lowestoft St Andrew, Lowestoft St John, Lowestoft St Margaret, Mutford, Oulton Broad, Oulton St Michael (Oldton), Pakefield, Rushmere, and Somerleyton.

Alison Proctor Family History Centre

Computer Password at the APFHC

The APFHC computer password changes regularly: check the red Computer Help folder in the top drawer.

Replace the cover on the computer when you leave and lock the keyboard in the cupboard.

All six computers have subscriptions to Ancestry, FindMyPast and access to The Genealogist and Roots Ireland as well as free sites like FamilySearch. (Use your own log-in to FamilySearch).
