The Gifted Bible







Muriel Jane Milne 1912 - 1979

Among our family treasures is a Bible that was handed down to me from my Grandmother, Eliza Barbour (Cockburn), "Gramps", upon her death. As with all Gramps' items she had labelled it as to who was to get it when she passed away. The Bible still has the label with my name, lan, on it with kiss. Within the Bible is an undated card with the note "To Aunty Ella, being a small token of appreciation for all your devoted help and kindness. From Muriel and Herbie" So what does this all mean to our family?

The first part of my research was to try and work out when the bible would have been purchased in New Zealand. The Bible was printed by the University Press, Oxford but has no printing date. Further research revealed that the period in which the Bible was printed can be identified by the publisher's name, in the case of this Bible, Geoffrey Cumberlege. Cumberlege was the publisher at Oxford University press from 1945 to 1956. It is recorded that "Cumberlege's most significant publishing achievement was, jointly with the Cambridge University Press, to organise and produce a New English Bible" It can therefore be concluded that this Bible would have been available in New Zealand during the 1950's.

So what family event could Muriel and Herbie have experienced and have been so grateful for the devoted help and kindness Gramps gave during this period? Muriel Milne (b 1912) was Gramps' (b 1895) niece and lived in Lawrence, Otago.

As a young boy, in the late 50's, I can remember my family often calling to see Muriel when we travelled through Lawrence on some of our trips from Roxburgh, where we lived, to Dunedin. Clearly the Aunty/Niece relationship was a close one. Herbie Milne (b 1915) was Muriel's brother. Muriel and Herbie were the only two children of William Milne (b 1891) and Margaret Cockburn (b 1893).

While Herbie married and lived in the North Island, Muriel remained unmarried and lived with her parents in Lawrence until they passed away, Margaret on 23rd July 1956, and William only eight months later on 4th March 1957. Muriel was 43 years of age. Was it the trauma and grief that Muriel faced in loosing both her parents in such a short period of time, having lived with them all her life, and the support Gramps would have given her, that resulted in the Bible being gifted? "appreciation for your devoted help and kindness".

Gramps, living in Roxburgh with her family, would have been 61 years of age having been widowed for the second time at the start of World War Two. I knew my grandmother, Gramps, as a loving, kind caring family lady and have no doubt that she would have been to the fore in supporting her close niece in her time of need. Muriel passed away 10th April 1979 a spinster and had remained living in the Lawrence Family home all of her life.

Ireland Reaching Out

For anyone involved in Irish research, the organisation 'Ireland Reaching Out' is a great source of information and contact. Vast amounts of Irish people emigrated to Scotland but then travelled on to settle elsewhere. Today an estimated 1.5 million Scottish people can claim to be of Irish descent. Many more Irish people around the world can trace their Irish ancestors *through* Scotland, although there are no longer any connections there.

Scottish genealogical sources can reveal a lot of information about Irish people who may have been passing through, or who made Scotland their home for a while in the 19th Century.

Can you trace your Irish ancestors to Scotland but do not know where in Ireland they came from? Post a message on the **Message Board** and IrelandXO volunteers will do all they can to help you out.

Computer Password at the APFHC
