Update on NZSG status

As advised 4th Feb, the Annual subscription for the forthcoming year from 1 Apr 2022 to 31 Mar 2023 will be \$30.

This should overcome both the uncertainty of whether or not there will be a levy but also the reality of ongoing cost increases in supplying our members with the services we offer.

NZSG have strongly implied that the imposition of a levy of \$10 per Local Member (those of you who do not belong to NZSG) will proceed.

Lady Augusta Gregory (Persse)



Born Isabella Augusta Persse on 15/3/1852, she was the youngest daughter of the Anglo-Irish gentry family Persse. Her mother was Frances Barry who was related to Viscount Guillamore and the family home, Roxborough, was a 6000-acre estate. In March 1880, she married William Henry Gregory who was a widower and 35 years her senior. Lady Gregory's early writing includes a series of love poems she wrote during a time in which she had an affair with the English poet Wilfred Scawen

Between 1899 and 1901 she, along with Yeats and Edward Martyn, founded the Irish Literary Theatre which would later become the Abbey Theatre Company. "The rising of the moon" by Lady Gregory is a politically-minded play set in early 20th Century Ireland. By the time, she died in 1932 she had written more than 19 plays. (My husband's great grandmother was Sarah Persse, from the same Galway roots.)

Community transmission of the COVID-19 Omicron variant has required us to think carefully about our research enquiry services delivered through the Alexander Turnbull Library. We anticipate staffing gaps over the next few weeks as the virus circulates throughout New Zealand and so have decided to close our reading rooms **on Mondays** beginning 14th February 2022.

Please note that the National Library building in Molesworth Street, Wellington will still be open on Mondays and advertised events will continue as permitted. Information on events, including cancellations can be found on the National Library's website. https://natlib.govt.nz

We will do everything we can to retain reading room opening hours on the remaining days of the week Tuesday (10.00am - 5.00pm) to Saturday (9.00am - 1.00pm). This will help us manage the impact of COVID-19 cases on our staff and services and provide more certainty for visitors.

You are encouraged to use the Ask-a-Librarian distance enquiry service wherever possible. We have learned from experience of Level 4 COVID lockdowns that we can continue to offer an online service with staff working from home. Copies of documents may be able to be provided within copyright legislation or other relevant restrictions.

DNA News

DNA relationship predictions: Remember that the relationships shown with each match at each testing site are the result of the company picking just one of usually several possibilities, not a hard and fast "this person is your xth cousin".

All shared DNA beyond the very closest relationships have a range of options that need exploring, and / or explaining, by also doing the accompanying genealogy involved.

The go-to site for checking this is DNAPainter's implementation of The Shared cM Project at https://dnapainter.com/tools/sharedcmv4-beta/

For GEDmatch users, there's a new relationship predictor being rolled out. Initially for Tier I on the updated GEDmatch app "one to many full version" - click on the total cMs.

This being rather more understandable, and reliable, than the "Estimated number of generations to MRCA = x" shown on the One-to-One report Lorna
