Deaths - but no body!

I was searching for a death certificate for Joseph Seymour as his death by drowning at Omaha (North of Auckland) on 15 April 1867 was reported in the Daily Southern Cross. There is no record in BDM NZ

Joseph's brother William Seymour was also drowned on 22 April 1867 at Mangawhai. His death is recorded in BDM NZ 1867/5.

Discussing this with a friend who is a retired Police Detective he tells me that unless a body was found and an inquest held, the death was not recorded. He sent me the following information. He is not sure when the law changed but thinks it was well into the 1900's

Family History - Death and burial resources | Christchurch City Libraries

Notes

- In colonial New Zealand, death certificates were issued only when there was a body. Accident and murder victims whose bodies were not found had no death certificates.
- Information on a death certificate is usually provided by relatives of the deceased.
- Sometimes information on one certificate will conflict with that on another.
 - A partner may reduce his or her age on a <u>marriage certificate</u> so that it is approximate to that of the spouse. The true age is usually given on a death certificate.
- A person whose spouse had been gone for seven years, could, as a widow or widower, re-marry.
 The seven-year rule still applies.
- Deaths at sea were registered in the home country. Immigrants who died on the way to New Zealand were recorded in the British Isles or continental Europe.
- In a death entry the slash means the entry is incomplete and not final. A death has been presumed, for example in a drowning, and no body has been recovered. The death may appear in a later year without the slash.
- In peacetime a death certificate is not issued for a New Zealand citizen who dies overseas. Since
 1995 however, relatives have been able to pay a fee and have the death recorded in New Zealand
 by Births, Deaths and Marriages.
 - After I January 1988, a death can be searched for on <u>Births, Deaths and Marriages</u> using either a woman's maiden or married name. However the deceased's date of birth must have been at least 80 years ago.

Certainly a search for Henderson in electoral year 1866 brought up a good many results even though the source info when you scroll down says 1865-66 1866-67 are in the browsable, not indexed category.

Ireland XO's Guide to the Monasteries covers the most visited monasteries in Ireland. St Enda's Monastery (shown) was founded by St Enda in the 6th Century on the largest of the Aran Islands just off the Galway Coast. All that remains are two churches, a holy well and the base of a round tower.

It belongs to the earliest phase of Monastic activity in Ireland.

A free 24 hour History fest - online virtual 24 hour marathon (like our old telethons) to raise funds for the Red Cross, will be held on **27th March** from Iam NZDT.
