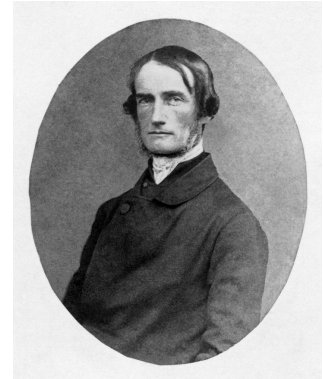

## Performing family history

Kate Jason-Smith and Jan Bolwell gave stimulating presentations at our September meeting. You missed a treat if you weren't there!

Each had written and performed a one-man play, both of which were shown as videos at the meeting. Kate's depicted some of her mother's experience in World War II, as a nurse on the front line in France and Germany, and Jan's followed her father in WWI, from Egypt to Italy.

Kate's mother joined the Queen Alexander Nursing Corp in 1944, after the death of her fiancé from a heart attack. She experienced many horrors which haunted her for life. She ended up at Belsen Camp, where she met her future husband (an engineer) with whom she later emigrated to New Zealand. Kate's book "I'll Tell You Something for Nothing" will be added to our library collection. She told us that one of the difficulties in writing of the events was coordinating the family stories with time frames from other sources of reference.

Jan's story was about her father, who also served in WWII in Egypt. He was captured in Libya and sent to a POW camp in Italy, where he spent 2 ½ years.

Jan gained many details of the events during that part of the war from the wonderful account in Chris Pugsley's book. When her research took her to Italy, she managed to find the farmhouse loft where her father slept. The Italians called him "Milord Goffredo", the title of the book Jan wrote to record her father's story.

Jan's father went back to see the family who had saved his life and stayed three months.

Hat's off to both Kate and Jan for their hard work and for showing us an inspirational way to record family history.

## Women scorned!

I have been writing up the story of Louisa Williams, my great grandmother. Louisa was one of 15 siblings. It seems that a number of her sisters were not very discerning when it came to the men they chose! Two in particular stand out.

Louisa's sister Kate gave birth to a son when aged 18. The father of the child was George Williams, and was often referred to as her husband, but there is no marriage record found.

George Williams 'disappeared' when the child was an infant. He was never seen again. It was said that for many years Kate Williams carried a brick in her handbag, just in case she ever saw George Williams again!



Another sister, Rosina, was also deserted by her husband, David Brown Dunlop, leaving her with four children to raise on her own. Wanted ads were placed in newspapers and in the police gazette, to no avail.

However, after a long search they finally found his grave and erected a cheeky plaque - 'Found you at last after your long disappearance!'

## New on FamilySearch

There has to be something of interest for someone, free, on FamilySearch. They have announced the following additions to their records in just the last two weeks:

### Where are you searching?

7 million newly indexed family history records have been added to collections from **Mexico, Ireland, and Spain**.

The indexed additions include about 10,000 from civil registrations and Catholic records in Argentina and browse-able "new records from **Benin, Brazil, Cape Verde, Chile, Costa Rica, the Dominican Republic, England, Panama, Peru, S Africa, the Ukraine, the United States, Venezuela!**"

From **Ireland**, 1.5m indexed records of "Ireland, Dublin, Workhouses Admission and Discharge Registers, 1840-1919"

**English** records included were 113k indexed records in the "England, Devon, Ford Park Cemetery and Torquay Cemetery Burials, 1848-1974" collection

## Relationship diagrams on MyHeritage

Am I the last person in the Branch to have discovered Relationship diagrams on MyHeritage?

It came to my attention that a person in the USA, who's name or family I had never heard of, had my husband's mother in her family tree.

So I wrote and asked her how she was related to us. By reply I got the clearest diagram, with all the information I needed, and none that I didn't, leading to the conclusion that she is a 4th cousin once removed! The common ancestors were her 4Xgreat grandfather and Norman's 3x great grandfather!

I had to find out how she produced such brilliance.

On your MyHeritage family tree website, click on the drop-down *Family Tree* menu —> *More* —> *Relationship Diagram*. And Hey Presto! A ready drawn, annotated diagram will appear.

## Finds on Find MyPast

**Researching Norfolk?** Norfolk baptisms in 1922, Banns and marriage from 1938, Burials from 1997 are now online.

You're in luck if your ancestor was likely to have been baptized, married or buried at All Saints church in the parish of **Kingston upon Thames**, Surrey between 1813-1825

### Explored the 1921 census yet?

The FindMyPast blog <https://www.findmypast.com/blog/discoveries/10-amazing-finds-1921> reports 7 horses, 17 dogs, 144 (!) cats, 3 goldfinches, 2 ferrets, 7 chickens, 1 rooster and 1 tortoise, all listed as family members. Along with some of the many comments they've found in the records.

**New additions**, in the period 1786-1822, to the British Royal Navy & Royal Marines Service and Pension Records, 1704-1919 with over 20,000 original wills of men in the Royal Navy and Royal Marines

#### Alison Proctor Family History Centre

The APFHC is located at Paraparaumu Library. Turn right inside the library entrance to the area containing six computers, microfiche and library. The cupboard on the right hand side of the area contains the red folders mentioned below.

Members need to get the cupboard key from the library Welcome Desk, when you will be asked to sign for the key and show your membership card for the current year.

#### Computer Password at the APFHC

The APFHC computer password changes regularly: check the red Computer Help folder in the top drawer.

Please sign the red signing-in book found in the top drawer.

Keyboards are in the lowest drawer.

Replace the cover on the computer when you leave and lock the keyboard in the cupboard.

All six computers have subscriptions to Ancestry, FindMyPast and access to The Genealogist and Roots Ireland as well as free sites like FamilySearch. (Use your own log-in to FamilySearch).

**NB.** Please do **NOT** sign out of RootsIreland, FindMyPast or TheGenealogist.

A microfiche is available and there are books on a variety of topics which can be borrowed.

Boxes of copies of 'Who do you think you are' and 'Family Tree' are on the shelf. The Paraparaumu library also has copies of 'Family Tree' on their magazine shelves.

You are encouraged to save the results of your searches on a USB memory stick or send them to your own email address.

We have a printer if you wish to print a hard copy. Please put 10c per copy in the honesty box on the cupboard door.

The recent **SideView** allocation of your ethnicity has now been extended to allocation of your matches to a Parent, using only the DNA of yourself and your matches.

**The feature is still being rolled out so not everyone has it as yet** – and yes I'm missing out but can access my results from an account I can both sign into, and have shared my results with, that has been more fortunate in the release stakes.

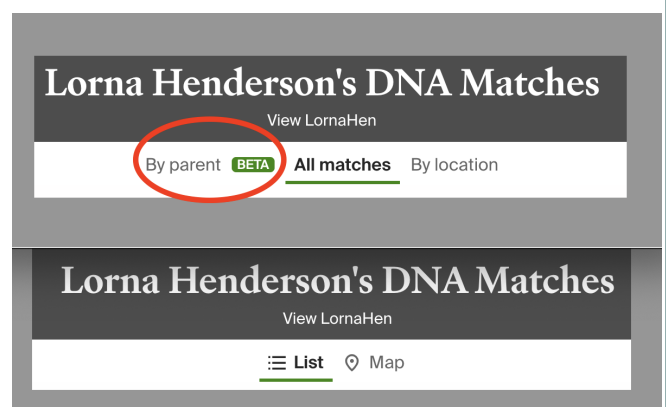
