Do you have a French connection? Perhaps you'll find something in a new collection France, Savoie, Parish and Civil Registration, 1500-1927

South Africa has several additions to existing collections South Africa, Church of the Province of South Africa, Parish Registers, 1801-2004 South Africa, Johannesburg, Cemetery Records, 1840-2019 South Africa, KwaZulu Natal, Vital Records, 1868-1976 South Africa, Western Cape, Deceased Estate Files, 1951-1958

What you need to know when I die

The information for this timely article comes from Sonia Coom, who, you will remember, moved recently to Hawkes Bay.

Sonia says "This was initiated by a talk from Kathryn Perks about her 'end of life' planner entitled 'When I Die', together with an article by David Boyle, head of sales and marketing at Mint Asset Management."

While dealing with all the emotional issues of losing someone close to you there are many other elements to take into account. So how can **you** assist those who will be left to sort out your affairs?

Consider the following;

Non resuscitate order – would you want to be kept alive if you had no chance of enjoying any quality of life? For this you need to have a "Living Will", which is separate from a normal Will.

Have an up-to-date Will - No ifs or buts! If you have any assets or special wishes you want conveyed then everything should be documented. Without a Will, things can go off track very quickly - not only to the value of the estate, but with the relationship of family members. A Will lists your wishes and the allocations of your assets.

Have an enduring power of attorney - Simply put, this is a legal document giving someone the power to act for you, if you lose the ability to make decisions for yourself.

Make contact with the lawyer. It's really important that this is done as quickly as possible. It triggers a series of events, in particular getting the death certificate and starting the probate process. Remember when the probate process starts all your savings and investments, including bank accounts, will be frozen. This means all service providers have to be contacted as soon as possible. That's not as easy as it sounds!

Have a file that contains all your current accounts and details, like the names of your lawyer and doctor, National Health number, phone, power, rates, insurance (personal / assets), copies of wills, family trust, enduring power of attorney, interest group memberships/ hobbies or any other documents that are important, with contact details for each one. Trust me, this is a huge benefit and makes life so much

easier for those trying to sort out your estate.

Assets.

Make a list of items you would like to gift to family members. An item not worth much money, might be emotionally valuable to a family member. Having these conversations and getting the paperwork in place is so important to help with work the family needs to do when your time comes.

List any charities or services that you might like to support.

Close family friends.- Have an address /phone list of people that you wish the family to contact, making sure any persons on the list have not already passed on themselves.

A Will can cover your main wishes regarding assets, but who is your **chosen funeral director** and are there arrangements you wish to specify.

Do you want a funeral? Not everyone does. Cremation or burial? Private or public service? What music or songs do you want to be played. What photos do you want displayed?

A funeral director can help with the planning of the service, casket choice, funeral programme, notices in the local papers and the after service function.

Seek some financial advice. Depending on the size of the estate, trusts and assets, it may be worthwhile to get an authorised financial adviser to assist with the investment of funds to help the financial wellbeing of not only your immediate family, but also future generations .


