The Paint box

Ian Barbour has been busy again working through assorted objects he has inherited, researching them and passing them on to younger family members. Here's his next instalment. The Art Box, The Cambridge Colours, was manufactured by Madderton and co Ltd, Loughton Essex, England. Madderton



and Co was founded in 1890 and closed during the second world war when the owner retired. My Uncle Bill Cockburn, actually great uncle, would likely have purchased the Art Box new in the years leading up to World War Two, when he was a musician and artist in Riverton, from which time it has been in our wider family, being passed down the generations. He and Auntie Kura lived in Riverton and never had any children. Uncle Bill had moved to Riverton from Roxburgh in 1925 to take up a music teacher role as well as pursuing his art painting interests. Subsequently, around the mid fifties, he owned a very successful local Riverton Drapers shop. In his spare time Uncle Bill would work away at his oil painting. His forte were landscapes painted in a more abstract style.

During a visit to Riverton in 1960, when I was nine years old, Uncle Bill gifted me the Art Box noting that I had shown a keen interest in his art. I recall him showing me how to sketch out the scenes using a stick of charcoal before commencing the application of the oil paints. I do recall being quite obsessed with making more charcoal when I got home by burning sticks in small fires in my Dads vegetable garden. While my interest was intense initially, over time other interests come along but the Art Box stayed with me as an heirloom rather than a stimulus for me in the Arts.

The oil paints now in the box came from my father-in-law, Ken Nelson. Living in Fairfield in his 40's Ken developed a passion for oil painting. His forte were landscapes of a more exacting nature. Ken became a very well known and respected artist, the pinnacle of his success was when he took out third place in the very prestigious New Zealand National Kelliher art awards in 1971. Ken's art studio was loaded with art materials and some of his oil paints have been handed down the generations. Sammy, our youngest grandson, often stays with us during school holidays and was always into creating things, albeit under the watchful eye of Mr Grumpy (Me) I see a real talent in Sammy emerging in his creative imaginative artistic skills. While the paint box is not valuable in itself as a collectors item it is a family heirloom. May Sammy's talents be revealed.

FamilySearch

<u>Their plans for 2023</u> - which includes RootsTech, THE event of the genealogy conference year. (my emphasis, without apology - Lorna). Do make sure you follow the link in the plans blogpost to register. There's something for everyone, and all free.

FindMyPast recent additions include: six decades of Gibraltar census records, plus Gibraltar deaths and burials, 600,000 newspaper pages added, including one you have no doubt been waiting for: *Lady of the House*, an Irish newspaper that dedicated itself to the life of women in the early 20th century: *"The want has long been felt of a high-class Irish Journal solely devoted to Fashion, the Beautifying of the Home and Person, Scientific Cookery, the Toilet, the Wants and Amusements of Children, the Garden and Conservatory, and the hundred-and-one matters which interest educated women."*

TheGenealogist have added over 400,000 new Irish Records, including Parish Registers. Read more about this latest release: **Can't Pay or Won't Pay – The Tithe Defaulters**.

DNA



The National Archives (UK) <u>Medieval seal bags unravelled</u> examines some of the beautiful artefacts associated with some of their historic documents. A silk bag holding the seal of Thomas Becket, archbishop of Canterbury.

So to go with the mention of Manorial records below in the Round Robin item, the National Archives also has a blog post on how innovative people are creating digital projects making Medieval data more accessible. <u>Mind your manors: Hacking like it's 1399</u>. Eastman newsletter has an anonymous post highlighting <u>Julia Roberts' appearance</u> on Finding Your Roots - unexpected DNA results can happen to anyone.

MyHeritage have <u>reviewed their year</u>, highlighting their record releases, tool improvements and their <u>AI Time Machine</u> (at least it isn't as creepy as their animations of your old photos)

The National Library of Scotland's blog highlights some of their treasures.

I had been watching a Scottish Indexes conference session on One-Name Studies which mentioned this one. Round Robin

The April 2022 Who Do You Think You Are, which should be available in our folders in the APFHC, contains a useful **overview of Manorial Records for England**. These often overlooked records contain a wealth of family information and can cover from the oldest surviving manorial record in 1240 up to 1922 the demise of the manor. The National Archives has computerised their index to the Manorial Documents Register and added assorted links to related sites. (Also on our website under Resources) The two magazines for Round Robin circulation are 'Family Tree' and 'Who Do You Think You Are?' Annual fees of \$15 for each magazine are renewed in July. The APFHC is located in the Paraparaumu

Library. Turn right inside the library entrance to the area containing six computers, microfiche and library. The cupboard on the right hand side of the area contains the red folders mentioned below. Members need to get the cupboard key from the library Welcome Desk, when you will be asked to show your membership card for the current year and sign for the key.

Computer Password at the APFHC. The APFHC computer password changes regularly: check the red Computer Help folder in the top drawer. Keyboards are in the lowest drawer. Replace the cover on the computer when you leave and lock the keyboard in the drawer.

All six computers have subscriptions to Ancestry, FindMyPast, The Genealogist and Roots Ireland as well as free sites like FamilySearch. (Use your own log-in to FamilySearch). NB. Please do NOT sign out of RootsIreland, FindMyPast or TheGenealogist.

You are encouraged to save the results of your searches on a USB memory stick or send them to your own email address. We have a printer if you wish to print a hard copy. Please put 10c per copy in the honesty box on the cupboard door. Please do not switch off the printer.
