NZSG have been contacted by Papers Past to get help with the improvements they are working on (which will include text correction).



Tracing Property in England

-- from Domesday to Present by Maggie Gaffney

For those who were able to be at our monthly evening meeting on the 27th June what a fascinating talk was given by Maggie Gaffney. Yes, you guessed it - the daughter of our long term member, Michael Gaffaney. For those who were not there you missed out on an amazing speaker, but all is not lost...read on.

Way, way back, Edward the Confessor, the childless King of England, ruled from 1042 until his death in 1066. Upon his death his wife's brother



So now King William the First, aka William the Conqueror, set about sorting out a few things, which included ensuring he became very, very wealthy and that all his subjects paid their fair share of taxes. (Hmmm, most would say "unfair share of taxes"). So with this in mind, and also thinking what us genealogists may want in 2023, he decided to have a survey done in 1086 of much of England and parts of Wales to establish the values on which taxes would be based.

This huge survey of land and landholding is by far the most complete record of pre-industrial society to survive in the world; perhaps one of William's better legacies.

Having got this completed in 1086 King William thought all was sorted but unfortunately Willie did not get to enjoy the fruits of his works as he died only a year later in 1087.

However this extremely valuable resource lived on. The resulting book at the time was known by the Latin title Liber de Wintonia.

In the I2th century the book's Latin name of *Liber de Wintonia* was to be replaced with the name, the *Domesday book*. The very same book but just a change in name, the Domesday title being arrived at because the survey brought much doom and gloom. The valuations arrived at were non-contestable and Willie's subjects were a bit bitter about this as a good portion of their wealth was eroded by taxes on these non-contestable valuations, hence "Domesday"

Now I know some of you will be thinking what about the Domesday Book and what has it to do with Maggie's talk? I will concede for those that have hung on reading this story that they are quite good questions.

Maggie Gaffney is a professional genealogist, now based in Wellington, having previously travelled to many parts of the world, including several years living in Ireland and England. She describes herself as not just very interested, but obsessed with genealogy. The result being a very talented, knowledgeable and outstanding genealogist.

Maggie's well prepared presentation covered the historic records available to research in England from 1086, the Domesday, to current day. Using a specific property in Kent, known to her, Maggie worked through and gave examples of how this property, its owners and inhabitants, can be traced from its listing in the Domesday book to the current day. Through the years the various resources she used included Title Deeds, Manorial records, Land-tax records, Newspapers, Ordnance Survey maps, Tithe records, Census returns, Valuation registers and the 1939 register, and last but not least Mr Google.

Tracing Property in England cont.

It was very interesting that while each set of records were for varying purposes and different time periods, Maggie showed how the information could be worked together. For example some records may just relate to the land and others to the occupants and by working out how each complemented the other a improved result could be achieved. Something like one plus one equals three.

Another example she used was to work out the actual path the surveyor took (for a particular data set) down a street and thus be able to compile data to a specific address and then link to other data sets for that address.

A truly fascinating presentation. The very comprehensive handouts provided by Maggie can be found on <u>mghistorical.com/june23</u>, which I encourage you to check out. It is very well laid out and provides a valuable list of resources for your genealogy research of England.

DNA News

LivingDNA has finally caught up with the other companies who offer chromosome segment data for their matches (all except Ancestry do). It has been promised as "coming soon" for many years.

To receive this data you have to have either tested there, or uploaded and paid for the "upgrade" to access more than the free information from an upload. Some uploads during promotions do also have free access.

I note that in the shared segments shown they do include much smaller segments than 7cMs, which may account for their shared DNA totals when able to be compared as being somewhat larger than on the other sites who don't include the often false match small segments.

Although bottom of my list of companies / sites to test or upload to, you never do know where you'll find a key match – and you can then contact them and hopefully persuade them to upload to the more useful sites.

From the Mem-List mailing group for NZSG members: the **Kiwi Collection** is undergoing an update on Monday 17th / Tuesday 18th July to add more than 2 million records, including the indexes to the NZ Cemeteries Collection, the 1892 and 1893 Suffrage petitions +++ along with updates and additions to many of the record sets that are already included.

They will also be implementing tiered access to Kiwi Collection. This will provide three tiers of access:

- Public members of the public will be able to access

 1.6 million entries within the Kiwi Collection
- Member this tier is for NZSG Members who are not subscribed to Kiwi Collection. They will have access to 3.6 million entries including NZSG Cemeteries Collection.
- Those that are subscribed to Kiwi will have full access to the 14 million entries and all the record source information.

GRO Records—Instant access

Good news!

GRO (England / Wales) have changed their Birth and Death images* to instant online access and, - even better, reduced the cost.

Now £2.50, compared to £7 for a PDF (the equivalent of our NZ Printout) and £11 for a certificate. Check out the Order a Digital Image at

* Digital Images are only available for Births 1837-1922 and Deaths 1837-1887. Remember that if you can't find the person you want in the GRO search options, check out FreeBMD to see how it might be registered instead and try again.
