A Journey into the Past

Have you heard of Peebles?

Well I hadn't until I stayed there a few years ago with Bill Brown, a half 4th cousin I x removed to me and his charming wife Val. Little did I realise then that this was my only connection with the town and localities of Posso, Barns, and Dawyck and the small nearby town of Traquair. All within the county of Peeblesshire, Scottish Borders.

My connection is through the NAISMITH family sometimes written 'Naesmyth' or 'Naysmith'. My mother was Mary NAISMITH MCKEICH, named after her Grandmother, Mary Naismith, who arrived at Dunedin aboard the *Peter Denny* on 26 July 1884 with her husband George BURNS and three children. The name survives with two great great grandchildren, Ruby-May Naismith Mckeich and Lynette Naismith Morgan, having the given name.

I had my first contact with the Naismith clan through DNA matches in Ancestry.com.au about eighteen months ago. I joined the clan on the Internet and suddenly the world opened up. I used the hints available on Ancestry but always checked these with official entries from Census and B D & M records before entering names in the Family Tree. I arrived eventually at James Naesmyth of Posso. He was my 10th great grandfather who died at Dawyck, Peeblesshire in 1658.

James had married Agnes Burnett ,who was born at Barns in 1588. Agnes' father William Burnett of Barnes had married Margaret Stuart of Traquair. She was my 11th great grandmother.

It was interesting to note that Traquair House is regarded as the longest continually inhabited house in Scotland. Some 900 years. The Stuart family had occupied the house continually for 400 years. And yes, I can place Mary Stuart, Queen of Scots on my Family Tree! The name NAESMYTH had been originally associated with nail making. Today the name survives in Naysmith Ltd,

Unit 5 - 6, Polbieth Industrial Estate, West Calder, Scotland. They are the makers of quality walking sticks and a wide variety of umbrellas.



I will call on them if I get the chance to visit the area next year and explore the county of Peeblesshire. Bill Mc Keich

Each session will also have a short highlight how to use an aspect of the DNA Portal on Google Classroom with its wealth of resources, and the past presentations to watch at your leisure.

Researching Irish & Scots-Irish Ancestors

The Lower North Island Irish Interest Group recently hosted a very successful seminar, in Wellington, on researching your Irish and Scots-Irish ancestors, presented by Fintan Mullan (Executive Director) and Gillian Hunt (Research Officer) of the Ulster Historical Foundation. The seminar was part of a 12-city lecture tour through Australia and New Zealand. In addition, at some venues, including Wellington, there was an opportunity for one-to-one personal research consultations.

Although the Foundation's work primarily focuses on the province of Ulster, including the important Scots-Irish community, the seminar provided very good coverage for researching across the whole island of Ireland. The presenters identified the key sources provided by Government agencies, churches and private providers. Increasingly more information is being made available on-line – some of it through subscription services (e.g. Roots Ireland, which Kapiti Branch members can access at the Alison Proctor Family History Centre at the Paraparaumu Public Library).

The presentations were supplemented by a good set of notes, which were emailed to participants. These notes provided tips on researching as well as links to useful websites.

A key message was that some very useful records for counties in the Republic of Ireland are held in the Public Records Office of Northern Ireland, while many important records for the counties of Northern Ireland are located in Dublin, especially at the National Archives and the National Library.

While researchers often regret the loss of public records in the Easter 1916 uprising in Dublin, the presenters highlighted possible alternatives. These include the Griffiths Valuation and subsequent revisions, tithe applotment books, the 1901/1911 census, estate papers, early Irish newspapers, and street directories. As well, other sources, for example the 1796 Flaxgrowers List, may provide useful fragments of information.

A couple of attendees had attended the Foundation's courses in Belfast, and I had participated in their on-line course, but many people cannot afford the time or expense of these longer presentations. Instead, in part thanks to financial support provided by the hosts and the Irish Interest Group of the NZSG (Auckland), the two-day seminar (over a Friday evening and all-day Saturday) was great value for a modest cost.

I am sure the 70 people, who attended the workshop, were, like me, well satisfied with the information provided.

Researching New Zealand Records

And a promo for our "How To Sessions"

If you are getting frustrated searching New Zealand historical records you are not the only one. Read on and do explore the following three free research websites. They will help with your New Zealand research and get rid of many of those frustrations.

Two of the sites have been developed by Luke Howison, a freelance web developer with an interest in genealogy and the third by Diane Wilson, an avid genealogist, who over forty years has complied her New Zealand research resources and findings onto her website.

I will explain each website separately and encourage you to discover what they have to offer.

Howison, Archway website

https://archway.howison.co.nz/

In 2022 Archives New Zealand put in place their new search software and called it "Collections Search". While this new search software introduced by Archives brings with it all sorts of modern updated search processes there have been a few problems with its introduction which have caused us genealogists frustrations. It seems with any new software there are bugs (ask Mr Bates and the UK Post Office) that need to be ironed out. No doubt over time Archives will get these issues sorted. Added to this, it is human nature to resist change and this too will be no doubt be adding to our frustrations in using the new Collections Search.

To address these issues and indeed improve the searching experience Luke Howison developed a web site specifically to help search the Archives data. To use his words "……have written a few home-brew tools to assist with research" Well done Luke!

So in non-computer language, we can use Luke's website to search New Zealand **Archives**' records, as an alternative to using the Archives "Collections Search" website itself.

In using the Howison website, you enter what you are searching for, e.g. a person's name, the "website" will search all the Archives data and display the results it finds.

Howison, NZ Ancestor Search

https://ash.howison.co.nz/

Luke Howison developed this website to make the searching of New Zealand historical data much simpler. It enables you to search all the key New Zealand data bases from this one site. For example rather than searching the individual sites for Papers past, Find a Grave, Births Deaths and marriages, Cemetery records to name a few, you simply put what you are looking for into NZ Ancestor Search and the site will search the various sites and summarise the findings for you.

In addition to just searching a name there are many ways of focussing the search and tailoring the results to your specific needs.

Another clever feature allows you to search for references under two names, for example, entering a married woman's full name in the search box and her maiden surname in the second will give you references for both.

The Wilson Collection

https://wilsoncollection.co.nz/

This free collection compiled and coordinated by the late Diane Wilson includes records from many varied sources. The website is an index only search. That is, from your search criteria it will identify many sources of the information you are seeking. From these results you can then go off and search the specific websites that have been identified.

Best you go try these websites and have a play. I found them outstanding, exciting and fun!

Now to the How To Sessions

You maybe asking yourself how did my enthusiasm and knowledge of these websites come about. Yes I joined up on Lorna's last month's zoom 'How to' session. I have to admit that I have not been a regular on these monthly Zoom sessions and I am going to be quite blunt here, but wait there is a solution.

My reluctance to link into these Zoom sessions was initially influenced by my limited knowledge on how to actually use Zoom on my computer. I guess the thought of looking and talking into my computer screen was also possibly a factor. However I pushed on and now am a frequent user and participator on Zoom calls for various clubs and associations I am involved with.

So here is what you do!

Step one, if you are not sure how to use "zoom" reach out and get help. Being able and confident to use Zoom on your computer will be fun and add a tool to your learning skills.

My second reluctance was, and I doubt I am alone on this one, that my knowledge and level of understanding on the topics being discussed on the Zoom calls would be inadequate and the discussions and learning would be above me. Maybe some hesitation also that I may ask a dumb question.

Step two. You will not be alone in having these thoughts.

Our Lorna has an outstanding knowledge of genealogy having devoted most of her life to family research. Add to this her background in computing and we have a recipe for disengagement.

Believe you me, Lorna wants to help, so ask the questions, bring the discussion down to a level that you do understand. Push hard on this. I know Lorna yearns for greater participation and will love the interaction at a level where you understand and learn from the Zoom 'How To' sessions.

I look forward to hearing how you get on with these three websites and seeing your participation in our regular zoom call sessions.

How many of you have explored WikiTree? The free, collaborative tree that, unlike FamilySearch, allows you to record and share information about living people. I strongly recommend that you do NOT ever enter living people unless you have their permission and have explored, and fully understood, the implications of each of the privacy options to choose the most appropriate.

Two of the 7 coloured privacy symbols are pictured on the right

DNA News

The recent FamilyTreeWebinar 24 hour marathon included some talks of DNA interest.

Those working with DNA will often hear about Clustering as a technique to help you make sense of which matches connect with each other. One of the original proposers of a clustering technique, known as the Leeds Method, was Dana Leeds. Read about that here: <u>https://www.danaleeds.com/the-leeds-method/</u>

In the 24 hour marathon Michelle Leonard gave a talk demonstrating Clustering with MyHeritage Labels, https://familytreewebinars.com/webinar/clustering-with-myheritage-labels/

It is always interesting to watch someone else's approach to grouping up your DNA matches into clusters that make sense to you, and have something in common to aid your analysis.

One recent DNA oriented talk I've yet to watch is Diahan Southard's "What's Your DNA Problem? Too Few Matches? Too Many?" available until 19th April for free at <u>https://familytreewebinars.com/</u> webinar/whats-your-dna-problem-too-few-matches-too-many/

That's enough on Webinars, what else is happening in DNA-land?

23andme has quietly, ie without notice, shifted many of our smaller matches out of DNA Relatives into Your DNA Connections. 23Andme limits your match list, where the limit used to be able to be extended by actually contacting a match to keep them in your DNA Relative comparisons. So now those shifted no longer show up under your shared matches to aid your analyses of where a match might "fit". They have however brought back the Relatives in common, but not yet the chromosome browser & triangulations.

Looking forward to Ancestry's promised future addition ("first half of the year") of showing you how much DNA a match shares with your mutually shared matches. Unfortunately, it appears to be promised as part of the Pro-Tools addition to a sub, AND will be rolled out in the States first.
