

February meeting notes

The focus of our February meetings was FamilySearch. As our original speakers with first hand experience of the Utah library were not available, this became a more interactive session with lan Brooking and Lorna Henderson presiding for both the evening and day meetings. lan gave an overview of the wealth of information available on the site, particularly highlighting ways to overcome the fact that, as a collaborative tree, any information there can be changed by anyone.

This includes attaching a document on the Memories section of an individual profile. (See diagram below left). Only the original contributor can update or delete the Memory, although anyone can "tag" it to, attach, or re-attach it to another person, or more people.

Also, to keep track of those people in the tree who are most important to you, (e.g. Ann Gipson below right) and to keep an eye on what anyone else may change about them, select to "Follow" them. Weekly notifications are sent on updates to these profiles.




The Memory can be anything, eg a scanned family booklet, a FamilyGroupSheet report from your own genealogy program, a photo, but please do cite your source(s) - genealogy without sources is mythology.

Lorna showcased the RootsTech conference, which was then about to begin, highlighting Relatives at RootsTech and how to navigate and find the schedule, and any of the presentations that you wish to "attend".

The recordings of presentations are available for up to 3 years.

Finding Alexander

I have been researching my Great Great Aunt and her children - two of which are buried with her in a large plot at Karori Cemetery.

Her son Alexander Maclean tragically died by suicide in 1926 and he is buried here, along with his mother, sister and three maiden aunts. The grave was in dire need of some TLC, and Alexander's marble cross was missing.

I was told by the cemetery office it had probably been stolen. The grave was swept by a metal detector, which detected something metal underground. Would it be Alexander's marble cross with its lead lettering, or one of the three urns buried there?

I arranged a working bee and with a lot of weeding and scratching and gentle digging we cleared the plot and struck something solid!!!! Would it be the marble cross or something else!!!! With very careful scratching and brushing we discovered it was Alexander's cross, buried under the dirt and weeds for

many years.







What a find!!! What excitement!!! It has now been cleaned and soon a stonemason will reattach it to his headstone.

William Penn, founded Pennsylvania and Philadelphia on Quaker values of freedom and toleration and peaceful approaches to conflict.

In Philadelphia, it was once decreed that he should be honoured on high: higher than any building in sight, with nothing allowed, whatever it was, built higher than his hat.

City Hall, Philadelphia on Penn Square has a statue of Penn on its highest point but there are now skyscrapers higher. In contrast William Penn's family graves in the grounds of Jordans Field Meeting House, Beaconsfield, Buckinghamshire England has a very simple headstone.


The 1688 Meeting House still has meetings on Sunday at 10.30am, and the cemetery has 385 burials including several noted early Quakers.

The burial grounds and garden surrounding the building are open to visitors all year round. The Meeting House is open to visitors from April to the end of October. Visiting times: Tuesday to Saturday, between 2 pm and 5 pm. For group visits, please call 01494 876594.

Another great addition to TheGenealogist, on our computers at the Alison Procter Family History Centre (APFHC) in the Paraparaumu Library.

Their 1861 UK census collection has been included in the jewel of TheGeneaogist's offerings, Map Explorer. UK census records down to 1871 were included previously.

Use the top Search menu > Map Explorer. Select your historic map layer and the modern layer you wish to compare. You can overlay the two by varying the Opacity on the historic layer to check, eg an older Ordnance Survey (OS) map and the current day OpenStreetMap.

DNA News and Rootstech

As expected, RootsTech resulted in quite a few interesting updates in the DNA world and many interesting videos are available to watch, on all sorts of topics.

Did you know that Genetic Genealogy has been around for 25 years? I'm trying to remember when I did my first two tests – both at now no longer around organisations /companies: Sorensen and Oxford

Ancestors. Both were low level mitochondrial DNA (mtDNA) tests.

It would have been around 2001 when Bryan Sykes

"Seven Daughters of Eve" was published, with a discount test offer in it! I still use the pretty picture representing the "daughter of Eve" I descend from and her connection to the others. I was assigned to "Tara" who is still called haplogroup T, although I'm T2b4a these days, and there are way more than 7 branches of mtDNA.

Diahan Southard requested short essays from many of the people involved in those 25 years. Those who have attended any of her courses have probably received a link to this free ebook which makes interesting reading, and reminds us all how far DNA testing for genealogy has come and what the beginnings were.

In addition, Diahan hosted a panel at RootsTech with some of those many contributors which you can find here: https://www.familysearch.org/en/rootstech/session/genetic-genealogy-turns-25-dna-experts-tell-their-stories?lang=eng

Ancestry news: they now have 25 million testers in their DNA database. A preview of their forthcoming new DNA Match Tools can be found on YouTube at https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=Q7QA|jYtXLU

Worth a watch to see what Ancestry has planned – BUT some will require an addition to your sub, as they appear to be planned as an inclusion to the Pro-Tools that sprang up recently; another BUT, this part of Pro-tools is only being gradually released in the US initially later in 2024, then later world wide. The one of most interest to me is Ancestry catching up with MyHeritage and promising to show for each match, how much DNA the shared match shares with the match. It is unclear as yet whether or not you will be able to sort the shared match list by the closest to the match as MyHeritage offers.

I hope those of you not yet on MyHeritage took the opportunity offered during RootsTech to upload your DNA to there from wherever you had tested. Uploading during that period allowed you to get the DNA tools for free, forever. Normally \$29US to unlock. A recent blog post mentioned they now have 7.5m testers in their database.

FamilyTreeDNA

contains an overview of mtDNA basics, case study on how to use mtDNA along with a sneak preview of the forthcoming revamp of the mtDNA information along the lines of the yDNA Discover tools. Have YOU tested your mitochondrial DNA, if so you are part of the Million Mito Project and part of this eagerly awaited revamp.
