Clive Palmer

Clive Palmer, a Life Member of Kapiti Genealogy since 2014, died on 28 April, 2024, aged 88. For nine years, between 2003 and 2013, he was either Convenor or Vice-Convenor of the branch. He was both a leader and a strong supporter of the branch for two decades.

He was also a member of the Constitution Review Committee for the New Zealand Society of Genealogists, later serving a two-year term as Councillor for the national body.

Clive joined the branch in 2002, and took on the role of Convenor the following year. Kapiti soon became one of the largest branches in New Zealand, perhaps partly due to the popularity of a new television programme called *Who do you think you are?* first broadcast by the BBC in 2004, and released in New Zealand soon afterwards.

Clive, along with Kapiti Branch research officer Sue Greene, came up with a plan to use the TV programme's popularity to encourage more people to get into genealogy. They created a live presentation about family history research featuring local personalities, starting with former *Fair Go* presenter Kevin Milne and author/journalist Anna Kenna. It had a much lower budget than the TV programme, spending money on orders for overseas documents rather than any actual travel. The presentation was called *Why You Are You (YURU)*.

YURU was an annual event from 2008 until 2015. Clive managed it and drafted the scripts, while Sue did the research and prepared visual aids and posters. The individuals whose families featured in the presentations were Sue Scott, Sir Jon Trimmer, Dame Kate Harcourt, and Rodger Fox. Some of these presentations later went 'on tour' to other centres. The last two presentations were part of WWI centennial commemorations, and featured the families of local soldiers who died in the conflict.

After YURU ended, Clive (and Sue) continued to promote Kapiti Genealogy, working on presentations, and helping residents in Kapiti retirement villages to research their family and pass on information to their descendants.

As a final contribution, in 2022, Clive finished compiling a history of Kapiti branch in anticipation of this month's 40th birthday celebration. In compiling the branch history, he researched meticulously and cajoled all and sundry into making contributions.

Military history with Chris Pugsley

At the April Branch meeting we were privileged to welcome prominent NZ military historian Chris Pugsley, to present on 'Le Quesnoy'. His resume is lengthy but in brief, after he retired in 1988 as a NZ Army officer, he received a PhD from Waikato University in 1992. He taught at the University of New England, in Armidale NSW, for three years until 1999 and from 2000 - 2014 was Senior Lecturer in War Studies at the Royal Military Academy, Sandhurst (UK). He remains Adjunct Professor in Humanities at New Zealand's University of Canterbury.

In 2015 he was awarded a New Zealand Order of Merit for services as a military historian. Chris is a Fellow of the Royal Historical Society and has written or co-authored around 20 books on NZ military history.

At the commencement of his presentation Chris advised that because of the close proximity to ANZAC Day and remembrance of Gallipoli, he would deviate from the topic of Le Quesnoy and focus on the impact of the Gallipoli landing on the people at home in New Zealand.

The objective of the Gallipoli Campaign was to achieve control of the Dardanelles. It was a failure. The loss of New Zealand and Australian lives was huge. News of the failure filtered very slowly to those at home in New Zealand; official channels were unable to cope. Chris described how wounded soldiers invalided back to New Zealand might contact the mother of their deceased friend only to discover she had not been notified of his death. The appalling lack of communication led to what Chris described as the "Mothers' Revolt".

At the end of the War, Prime Minister Massey insisted that the NZ loss of life should be recognised with specific New Zealand memorials at battle sites and not be absorbed into an overall British memorial. Massey's insistence was successful. Chris showed photos of the New Zealand memorials at Chunuk Bair (Gallipoli) and across the Western Front in France and Belgium including at Le Quesnoy.

His love of his subject was clearly evident and his presentation extremely well received.

Tour of the Supreme Court & Old Court House

A group of 20 had a wonderful morning at the Supreme Court on the 14th May. The tour started with a very informative audiovisual of the building of the modern Supreme Court and the restoring of the Old Court House.

We were given a brief outline of the history of the Supreme Court in NZ, which was only established in 2004, when it replaced the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council in London. Our tour guide Nic then took us into the main courtroom. It is a truly magnificent building, opened in 2010 by Prince William, inspired by New Zealand's natural heritage and in particular the Kauri cone. The courtroom has glass windows at the back. The idea is that anyone who wishes can view the proceedings, either in the courtroom itself or even by standing on Lambton Quay! It felt such a privilege to be in this beautiful building.

We then headed outside and into the adjoining Old Court House, which has lain empty since 1993 and has now been well restored. The contrast could not be greater. The openness of the modern courtroom to the austere and intimidating courtroom of the Old Court House caused a shiver upon entering. This building now houses offices, and is used only for ceremonial occasions, but still features the holding cells in the basement Here the shiver was for a different reason - was it the cold whitewashed concrete walls, or the ghosts of previous occupants, complete with graffiti, graphically expressing their displeasure at being in there?

'How to' Zoom Monthly session - June 3rd



We'll check out the "Available Experiments" on FamilySearch at https://www.familysearch.org/en/labs/

FamilySearch introduced their AI all text searching for assorted record sets (several US ones) not that long ago. Just recently the searchable collections available were extended to include scanned Probate records for both New Zealand, and Victoria, Australia.

My preliminary search for "grandfather clock" found some 2000 references over all record sets included, several of which were NZ and Victoria people inheriting a grandfather clock.

DNA News

A couple of items that came up in our last DNA group.

One was using the haplogroup information 23andme provided by, in that instance by 23andme, but also by LivingDNA and now also FTDNA with their FamilyFinder test. The y- and mt- DNA haplogroup strings of letters and numbers are your, very distant, branch on the tree of man-, or woman- kind respectively that you belong to on your direct paternal or maternal line.

FamilyTreeDNA is continuing to roll out this display of the haplogroup information from their older tests, and will then work on the older uploaded kits.

At this level from the distant past, it may allow you to eliminate that a match is on your direct paternal or maternal line, but not confirm it. Read more about all this in one of Roberta Estes' recent blogposts. https://dna-explained.com/2024/05/02/why-dont-our-y-dna-haplogroups-match/

Do remember that for autosomal testing, ie within genealogical timeframes, it's the matches that are more important. It is more effective to concentrate on grouping your matches into those who somehow connect with each other, find out how they connect both to each other and also to you. Read up on clustering, and the Dana Leeds Method or equivalents. Start from the top of your match list and work methodically down the pile assigning groups that mean something to you, be they by eg grandparent, great grandparent, area or ... Do leave room in your available groups for the mystery clusters. Use the notes field if you haven't got dots to work with. *Lorna*
