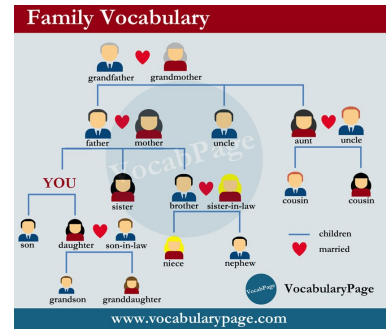

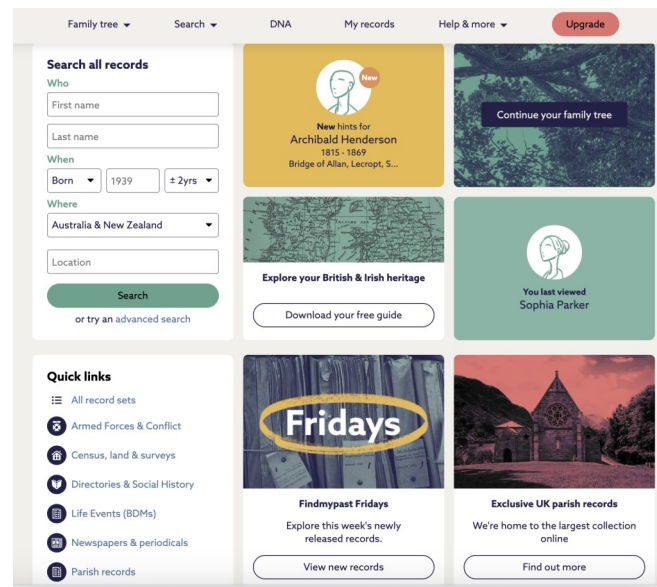

Researching Polish Immigrants to New Zealand

Our speaker at the February evening meeting, Irena Lowe, is the Administrator for the 'Kresy-Siberia Virtual Museum' and Vice-president of the Polish Association in New Zealand Inc.

I would like to thank and acknowledge Irena in sharing the following information with our members.

Irena's interesting fact-filled presentation kept us all spellbound, whether or not we have Polish ancestry. With the aid of various maps, she gave us an understanding of how the borders of Poland have constantly changed throughout history and how this affected her family's life during WW2 in particular.

When researching the Eastern Borderlands, it's important to understand the historical context -

- On 1st September 1939 Poland was invaded by Nazi Germany, then on 17th September Poland was invaded by the Soviet Union under what was known as "the secret Molotov-Ribbentrop pact".
- In Soviet occupied Poland (known as the Kresy region – Poland's Eastern Borderlands) arrests began, including those of 20,000+ Polish Officers returning from the German frontlines. They disappeared into mass graves, a tragedy now commonly known as the "Katyn massacre".
- On 10th February 1940, the first wave of deportations to Siberian slave labour camps, and prisons commenced. This was followed by three more, culminating in the deportation of approximately 1.5 million Polish citizens.

Searching for Family from Kresy (Eastern Borderlands), can be difficult because -

- many birth and death records were destroyed during the war against Russia and Germany
- remaining documents have been moved to Archives in Lviv, Minsk and Nowogrodno

Email queries may be sent in English, but are answered in Russian or Ukrainian (Russian Script), so you will need to use Google Translate.

Other research methods to consider are: -

- talk to those still living
- read similar personal histories
- join Facebook groups and ask questions
- join the Kresy-Siberia Group Facebook page
- Kresy-Siberia Family Research. Pdf
- search on the internet

Military Service Records for Polish Forces in the West were under British Command and every soldier who was enrolled had their military records saved by the UK Ministry of Defence.

There are also unclaimed medals that can still be claimed by next-of-kin.

Many names are missing, however many families are listed and details of where they resided or were moved to during their time in gulags

There is an evacuation list published in Polish newspapers in the West of those who were not enlisted in the military who arrived in Teheran (Persia) from USSR. - mostly women and their children, orphans and the elderly. It provides the name, birthplace and place registered in Persia/Iran.

Irena's story

Irena is the daughter of Polish parents who came to New Zealand as a direct consequence of World War 2. Her mother was living in Eastern Poland (now Belarus) and was deported by Stalin with her parents to Archangel, USSR in February 1940. Eventually she came to New Zealand in November 1944 as one of the 732 Polish Children settled in New Zealand.

Her father was born further south of Eastern Poland (now Ukraine) and as a young lad of 18 years was attacked by Ukrainian nationalists at the time of the invasion of Poland by USSR. He and a friend, being in the National Defence Volunteer Brigade of Stryj, spent an uneasy night hiding in cornfields before being picked up by the retreating Polish army and crossing the border to Hungary on 19th September 1939. Interned in Hungary in camps for 6 months, he was selected, along with other young men, and escaped Hungary via Yugoslavia and Greece to Syria where the Third Carpathian Independent Rifle Brigade was being formed.

The Brigade went on to fight at Tobruk and relieved the Australians during the battle. In gratitude to the Third Carpathian Independent Rifle brigade, the Australian government allowed these Polish soldiers to settle in Australia. In late 1947 her father found himself working on the dams in Tasmania.

After 2 years and gaining his Australian citizenship, he came to New Zealand to meet his pen pal friend, her mother. They married and he became a New Zealand citizen.

The two stories mentioned above were repeated (similar but different) by many Polish migrants to New Zealand and Australia and other western countries. Irena has spent her post-children years researching her parent's stories and early on, about 2010, came across the Kresy-Siberia Foundation who run a website "Kresy-Siberia.org". The website endeavours to collect information and stories about the men, women and children that found themselves shuffled around the globe.

In her talk she provided direction on how people can search for information about these families that were broken up by World War 2. Through records that are available, it is possible to delve a bit further back to discover information about families of the past.

Computer Password at the APFHC

The APFHC computer password changes regularly: check the red Computer Help folder in the top drawer.

Please sign the red signing-in book found in the top drawer.

Keyboards are in the lowest drawer.

Replace the cover on the computer when you leave and lock the keyboard in the cupboard.

All six computers have subscriptions to Ancestry, FindMyPast and access to The Genealogist and Roots Ireland as well as free sites like FamilySearch. (Use your own log-in to FamilySearch).

NB. Please do **NOT** sign out of RootsIreland, FindMyPast or TheGenealogist.

A microfiche is available and there are books on a variety of topics which can be borrowed. Boxes of copies of 'Who do you think you are' and 'Family Tree' are on the shelf. The Paraparaumu library also has copies of 'Family Tree' on their magazine shelves.

You are encouraged to save the results of your searches on a USB memory stick or send them to your own email address.

We have a printer if you wish to print a hard copy. Please put 10c per copy in the honesty box on the cupboard door.

Please **do not switch off** the printer.

Like Ancestry (and FamilySearch) there's also an app for your tablet/ipad which is fully integrated with your online tree.
